Six candidates for three positions make up the ballot for the Bronte Independent School District election to be held Saturday. Two polling places will be set up,

### Fancher, Bruton Back on Council

C. E. Bruton and Royce Fancher were returned as members of the Bronte city council in an election Tuesday. Just about a record low turnout voted in the uncontested election.

Bruton received 35 votes and Fancher got 33. E. F. Glenn received one write-in vote. Noah Pruitt was election judge and Mrs. Olive Keeney and Mrs. Dwain Pruitt were clerks.

Other members of the city council include Mayor Norman R. Kiker and Councilmen Cecil Kemp, Bill Luckett and Matthew Caperton.

### Bronte Takes First Place in District Tennis

Bronte tennis players took first place in the district meet at San Angelo Tuesday afternoon and qualified three high school players to participate in the regional competition April 19 at Odessa.

Bronte players scored a total of 40 points in the meet to 30 for Christoval and 10 each for Robert Lee, Miles and Wall.

Taking first place and qualifying for the regional meet were Marla Rees in senior girls singles, and Jeanna Denman and Jan Wilkins in senior girls doubles. Marla defeated Donna Wyatt of Miles in the finals, 6-1 and 6-2. Jan and Jeanna took their finals match 6-3 and 6-3 from Darlene and Charlene Pate of Wall.

Royce Lee also racked up a first place in the junior boys singles. He defeated Mike Salling of Miles, 6-2, 6-1, 6-2. The junior winners, however do not compete at the regional meet.

Mrs. Hickman, a resident of Bronte until 1956, died about 5:30 a.m. at her home in Fort Worth. She was 82 years old.

Burial will be in Fairview Cemetery under direction of Cliff Funeral Home. Pallbearers will be J. B. Mackey, Edward Cumbie, T. F. Sims, E. F. Glenn, Matthew Caperton and W. H. Maxwell.

Mrs. Hickman was the former Daisy Hallmark of Llano. She and her late husband were married there in 1899 and moved to Bronte in 1900. They lived here a few years and then moved to Robert Lee when Mr. Hickman was elected sheriff of Coke County. After he retired they moved back to Bronte. He died in 1915.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Jewell Hollis and Mrs. Gordy Haile, both of Fort Worth; one granddaughter, two great grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

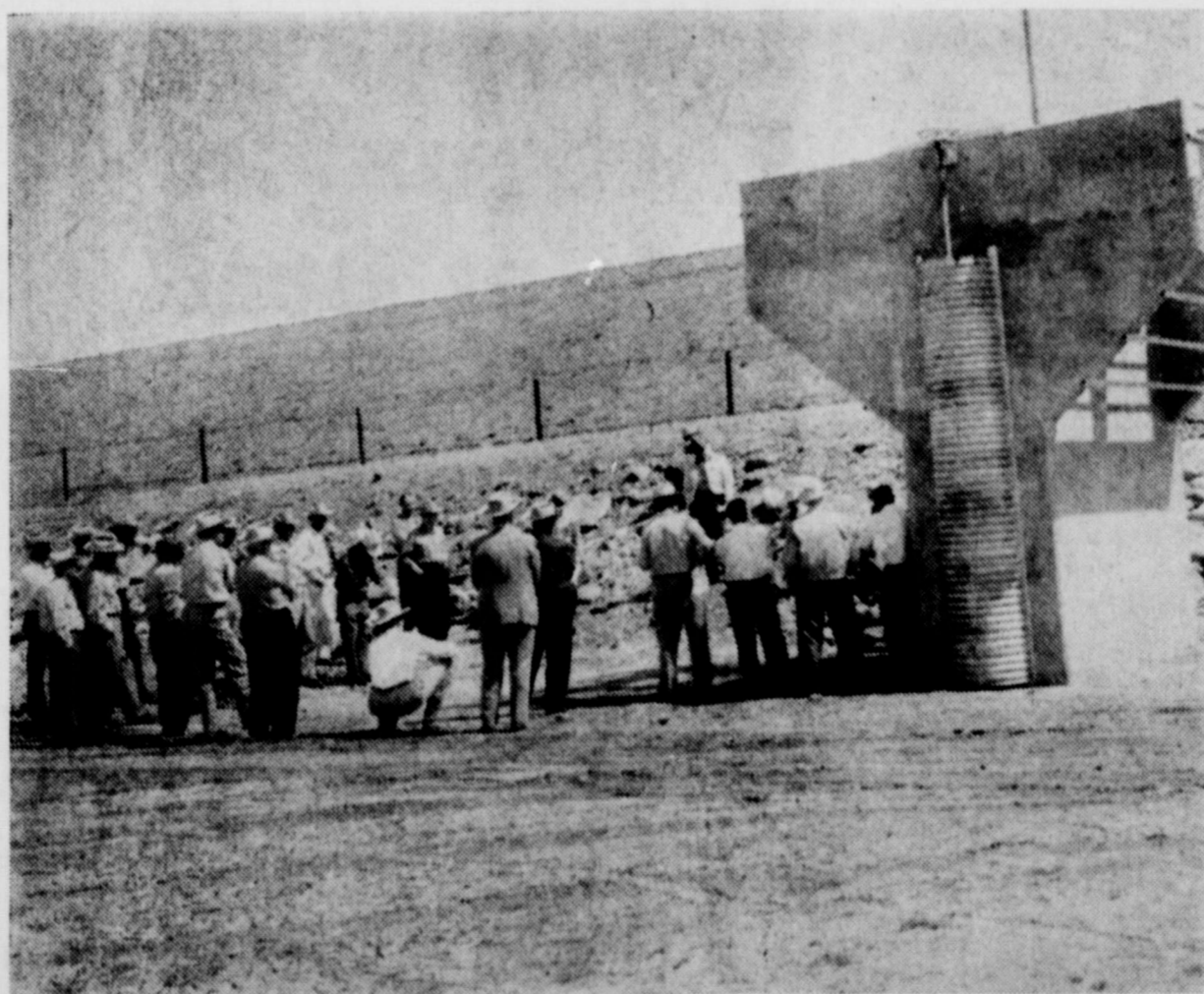

County Agents News Column

I received a report from the State Department of Public Health showing that 35 cases of rabies were found by laboratory examination last month (February) in Texas. Also, 302 heads were examined that were negative.

Skunks were the leading carriers along the 35 cases with 13 positive for rabies. Dogs were second with 12. Seven cases were found among fox and three in cattle.

Cameron County lead among counties having rabies with six cases -- all in dogs. Next came Irion and Kimble counties with three cases each.

The screwworm cases reported week before last dropped to 12. There were 15 cases the previous week. Most of the cases were found in the Valley, and South Texas, but one case was found in Kinney County, near Brackettville. You will recall Kinney County had one case of screwworms week before last also. The control authorities have "Hot Spot-

ted" that area and are seeding it with sterile flies. They do not intend for an outbreak to occur there.

I had an interesting conversation with Oscar Dorsey the other day. He is a former teacher at Bronte and now teaches in San Angelo College. He is an avid fox hunter and usually does his hunting in Coke County. He said that on a good night he and his party will get 20-25 fox. He said he could never recall killing a red fox however. They will not come close enough to be spotted.

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# 30,000 Ways to Earn a Living, Students Are Told at Career Day in Robert Lee

"There are 30,000 ways to earn a living in the United States today, somewhere there is one for you. The problem you have to face is how to find it. You need to open your eyes and look. No one can find it with eyes closed," said Mr. Frank Sheppard in the Career Day Program held Thursday in the Robert Lee School.

Sheppard said "the decision you as students have to make are:

"To get acquainted with yourself by finding what you can do best, what is challenging.

"Make your own measuring stick using goals, abilities, and what parents think

"Gather information or investigate.

"Summarize and compare.

"Make tentative choice.

"Get a taste or try the type work for awhile.

Plan ahead with a systematic plan. Choose college and plan now for housing."

High school students from Robert Lee, Bronte and Silver totaling 157 attended the County wide Career Program. Others attending were teachers, Home Demonstration members and consultants.

The morning session held in the High School auditorium with Mr. Douglas Dean as master of ceremonies, consisted of presentations by Sheppard, L. W. Keilers, Texas Employment office, San Angelo; Oscar Dorsey, science instructor, San Angelo College; John E. Robbins, General Telephone Company, San Angelo.

Others appearing on the program were Rev. Dempsey Salter, pastor Robert Lee Methodist church, Mrs. Frank Coalson, Marion Fikes, LaJan Kiker, Weldon Broussard, Ida Lee Parker, and Kathy Lawson.

"Planning for Military Service" was presented to boys by Petty Officer First Class E. N. Mitchell and Chief Petty Officer O'Keefe, United States Navy, San Angelo.

The afternoon session was devoted to four "free choice" ses-

sions with consultants. Each student attended these sessions. Consultants devoted the periods to the description of jobs in their area fields, the importance of the field, necessary educational preparation needed, special abilities, income expectations, advantages and disadvantages of jobs in area and opportunity locations. Each consultant allowed time for personal questions.

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
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# WASHINGTON CRIME IS DANGER TO VISITORS, CONGRESSMAN SAYS

THE CRIME RATE continues to mount in the District of Columbia. All tourists who visit their Nation's Capital are warned to exercise care and caution while here.

Serious crimes in Washington increased 17.4% in January over a year ago. The number of rapes doubled, robberies almost doubled, and there was a 42.2% jump in housebreakings. This rate of increase is the highest in the Nation. There were 2399 robberies here during the past year, compared with 1433 ten years ago.

THE CONGRESS has provided 4,000 policemen for the District—about all that can be used efficiently, according to the Police Department. A year ago a canine division was added, with trained German police dogs. But despite all this, crime marches on.

Observers attribute this sorry record to the influx of Negroes to the District, the exodus of whites, and the presence here of several very active civil rights agitation organizations. The total Negro population in D.C. is 54.8%. Of all person arrested for serious crimes in the District last year, 84.6% were colored.

The big crime increase became noticeable after school integration was ordered in 1954, and has been

increasing gradually since that time. Today 83.4% of all public-school pupils are Negroes.

Of the 4,251 illegitimate births listed by the District in 1961, there were 358 white and 3,893 colored. A large proportion of these were teen-agers. The unwed mothers start drawing monthly welfare checks. That fact is said to account for much of this.

TWO WEEKS AGO, at 5 p.m., a young pregnant woman alighted from a city bus. As she walked toward her nearby home a Negro ex-convict snatched her purse and ran. She pursued, joined by a patrolling police car. After a few blocks, the thief was stopped, but a police club failed to halt him. Finally, as a last resort, a policeman fired his pistol, which killed the robber.

A Court hearing exonerated the policeman, found he was acting in line of duty. But immediately CORE (Committee on Racial Equality) and NAACP, filed intemperate protests, claimed it was murder, with racial overtones.

Both white and right-thinking colored people support law enforcement. But the agitators encourage more crime by protesting police actions such as this.

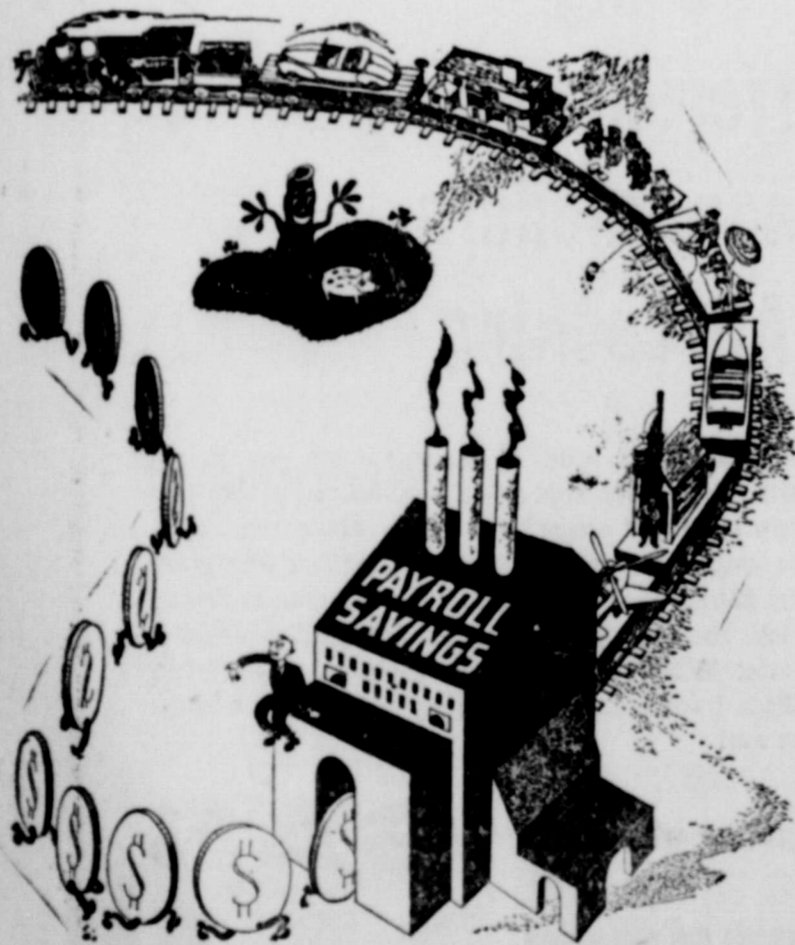
In boys doubles, Doug McCutchen and Craig Curlee lost, as did girls doubles players, Frances Glenn and Janie Collins.

**SHOP BRONTE FIRST**

**Farm Bureau Directors Have Meeting at Bronte**

The quarterly meeting of directors of the Coke County Farm Bureau was held Tuesday night in the Fellowship hall of First Methodist Church in Bronte. Wives of directors were guests at the dinner and business session which followed.

A discussion of the proposed wheat control program was led by President Ben Boykin. He explained that the Farm Bureau is not opposed to those agricultural programs which are controlled by Congress and voted on by farmers and ranchmen themselves. However, it is opposed to any measures which will further remove control of agriculture from the hands of farmers themselves and turn it over to governmental bureaus.

Boykin brought out in the discussion that Farm Bureau has consistently favored such measures as Rural Electrification, Farm Home Administration, Commodity Credit Corporation loans etc., but has just as consistently opposed any measure which would control any segment of American industry in the hands of the federal government.

A number of meetings are being held throughout the state to discuss and explain to farmers the full implications of the coming wheat referendum. The organization feels that the Department of Agriculture has presented a biased picture of the effects, pro and con, if farmers vote down this measure.

It was also brought out at the meeting that Farm Bureau is also opposed to federal aid and subsequent control of the local educa-

tional systems of the country. Bureau building in Big Spring. A district meeting will be held Thursday, April 4, at the Farm. The president and several directors plan to attend.

It was pointed out that the American Cancer Society will spend in Texas this year total funds amounting to 95.3 per cent of the total raised during the 1962 crusade.

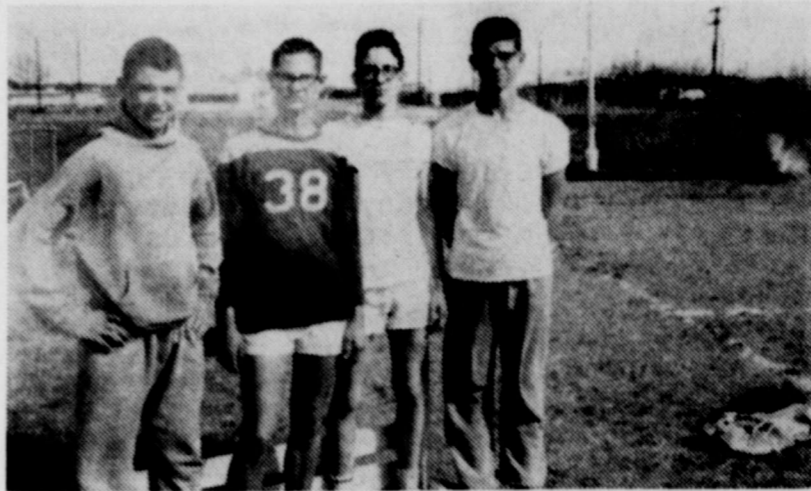

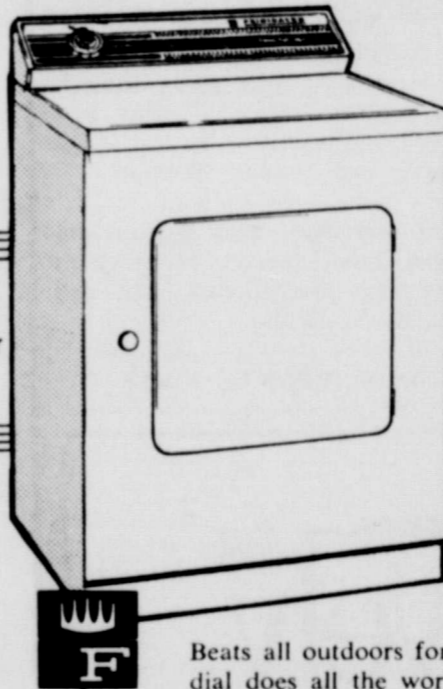

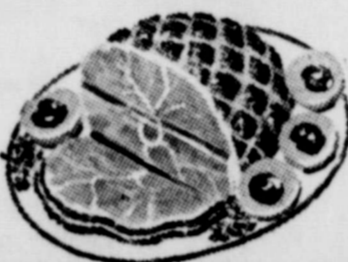
