## Cancer Crusade Now Underway in Area

A meeting was held Wednesday afternoon to organize the 1963 Cancer Crusade in this area. Meeting at the Cactus Cafe, a group of volunteers made plans to canvass the east side of the county within the next several days.

Mrs. Conda Richards is chairman of the drive here and Mrs. J. O. Rudd of Robert Lee is chairman for the entire county.

Mrs. Richards announced that the following persons have agreed to be in charge of the drive in their areas; Mrs. Ralph Richards, Fort Chadbourne; Mrs. Oscar Shurley, Bronte residential area; J. B. Mackey, Bronte business district.

The month of April is the date each year for the annual Cancer Crusade, and drives are made over the entire country to raise money for the American Cancer Society.

Primary use of the funds is to finance research, but part of the money is used for educational purposes and for helping persons who have cancer.

Mrs. Richards urged that all residents of this area to give generously to the Cancer Crusade. She said, "tremendous gains are being made in the control of cancer, and it is only through money raised in the Cancer Crusade that this work can be continued."

### How Money is Spent

Mrs. Richards pointed out that the American Cancer Society will spend in Texas this year total funds amounting to 95.3 per cent of the total raised during the 1962 Crusade.

These dollars for cancer control in Texas will be spent as follows:

33c for cancer research.

20c for professional education and services.

23c for public education, informing Texans of the danger signals in order that they may guard themselves and their families against cancer.

11c for service to patients.

5c for development of program and administration.

8c for campaign to provide materials to reach three million Texas families during the crusade.

The family lived at Norton and Hayrick communities for varying lengths of time, and moved to Dumont in Dickens County in 1924. They moved back in 1953, and had lived here since that time.

Word was received here Wednesday just before noon that Don Andrews was seriously burned a short time before when he came in contact with a live electric wire.

He was working for L&F Line Construction Company on a job near San Angelo when the accident occurred. He was taken to Shannon Hospital for emergency treatment.

It was reported that he was on a pole working on a line when the power was turned on and he accidentally came in contact with a live wire. The line carried 7200 volts and knocked him from the pole. He fell about 30 feet, but suffered no broken bones. He landed on his back.

It was reported that he received burns about the shoulder, stomach, feet and hands.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. R. M. Andrews of Bronte, Don has been employed in power line construction for several months.

## VACCINATION PROGRAM SET

Blanks will be sent out in the next few days to parents of Bronte school children to determine how many of them will participate in a school vaccination program.

The date of the vaccination will be set some time in May just as soon as it can be determined how many children will participate. Dr. John R. Harris will donate his time and facilities to administer the medicine and the PTA will pay for vaccine used.

The program seeks to give the whooping cough-tetanus-diphtheria booster shots to all children, and a smallpox vaccination to all children who haven't had one in the last five years.

The program is purely voluntary, except for children in the first and second grades, who are required to have smallpox inoculations. Parents are asked to fill out and return the blanks to the school, whether or not they plan to participate in the program.

## Suzanne Brunson Struck by Auto, Seriously Injured

Suzanne Brunson, 2 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Brunson, was reported Wednesday "to be holding her own" after she was seriously injured when struck by a car Monday about 11:30 a.m. The accident occurred in front of her home near the Bronte School.

The child was given emergency treatment at Bronte Hospital and was sent on to a specialist in San Angelo. She is in Shannon Hospital.

The accident occurred after the baby's mother and Mrs. Gene Halamiczek, together with Suzanne and her two brothers, returned to the Brunson home after attending a Home Demonstration club meeting. The children reportedly got out of the car and the boys went into the house, but the girl went around in front of the car and was no visible from the driver's seat. After the women talked for a few minutes, Mrs. Halamiczek started the car to moving, not knowing that the child was in front of it.

Several stitches were required on a head wound, but Suzanne's most serious injury was to an arm, relatives said. They reported that extent of the damage done by a deep cut had not been determined.

## Untreated Wounds Hamper Program

Mission — Screwworm cases now being reported in many counties throughout the area where sterile flies are being dispersed could lead to widespread infestation such as that experienced in 1962, unless livestock producers conscientiously follow precautions in handling their livestock.

Reports being received by eradication officials indicate that many producers feel the program has progressed to a point that individual screwworm control measures are no longer required. This attitude, if left unchanged, could seriously hamper eradication efforts, authorities state.

For that reason, eradication officials have issued an urgent appeal to producers, asking them to treat animals with approved smears and sprays that will prevent screwworm attacks and collect and submit samples from all infestations detected.

Eradication workers point out while an increasing number of counties are reporting infestations, as yet no large build-up of native screwworms is evident. They feel if producers will make

every effort to treat open wounds before screwworm flies are attracted to them, the native flies can be overwhelmed through the release of sterile flies. Screwworm flies will lay eggs only on open wounds.

C. G. Scruggs, president of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, said recently

it would be traitorous for anyone not to do all in his power to prevent the development of a screwworm case.

# County Agents News Column

The screwworm made a noticeable advance last week, in numbers and advance northward. We need to keep close watch in the coming weeks to avoid any undetected build-ups here.

Over the state, 59 cases were reported week before last. No one area reported many—Hidalgo County had ten cases, Brooks four cases and Uvalde County four cases. All the others were ones, twos and threes.

I hope every stock owner noticed in Sunday's San Angelo Standard-Times or heard about the case that was found in Iron County. This is a big jump northward and is getting close to home.

We have mentioned repeatedly, but want to reemphasize again, that all stock owners need to report any screwworm cases they find. Collect a sample and call me, one of the Vocational Agriculture teachers, or Marvin Bridges in Mission, Texas. Also, we must employ local control measures to help control insect build-ups and treat any cases that we sustain. Without local assistance, the program could fall flat on its face.

Several 4-H Club members are looking forward to the district judging contests to be held in San Angelo this Saturday. We have not had much time to practice, but the team members will be doing their best anyway. A letter received from the pasture specialist last week included the following statement that may interest a number of operators: "In general, Midland bermuda should be used on the High Plains. The only justification for using Midland is the possibility of some winter-killing of coastal bermuda in areas of high altitudes. Coastal bermuda does not normally winter-kill in areas of less than 3500 feet altitude and it produces more forage than Midland."

A new leaflet has been printed on Midland bermuda grass. We should have copies available by April 25.

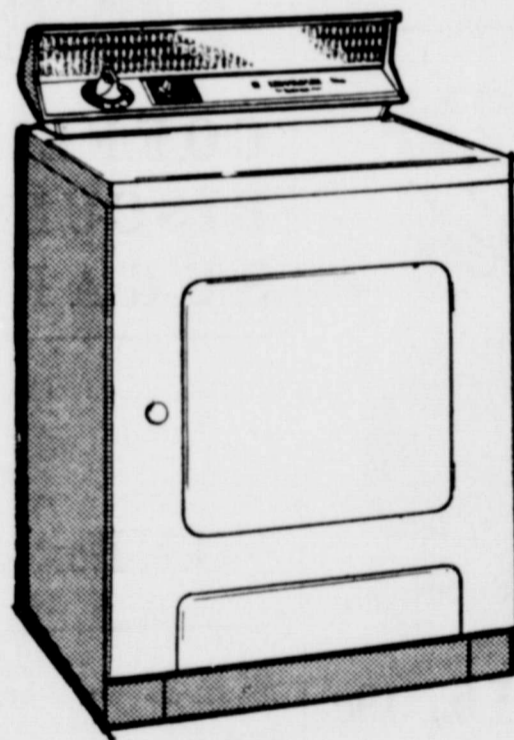

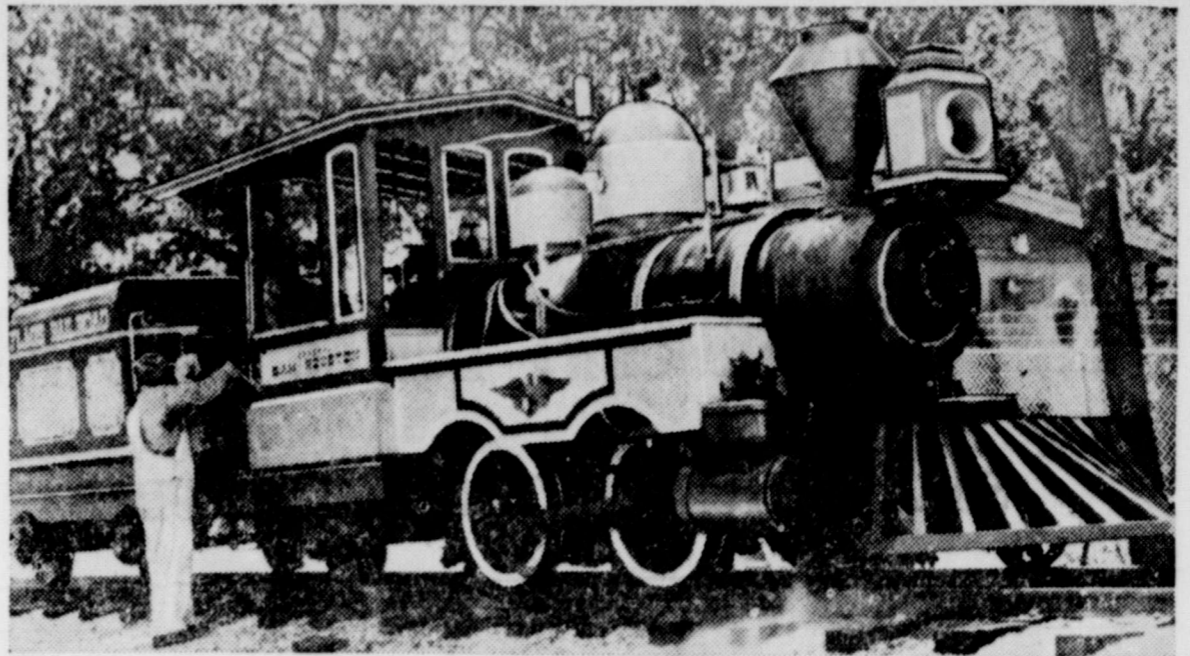

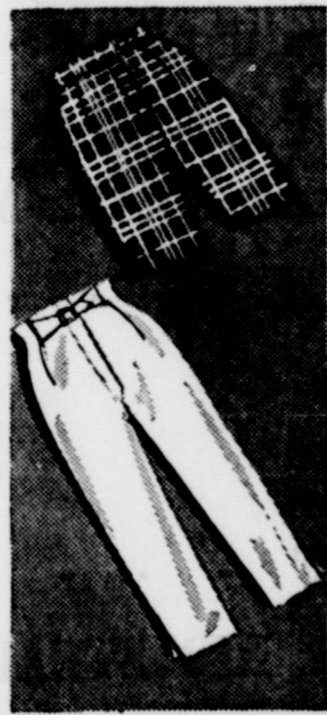
