Untreated Wounds The Bronte Enterprise Hamper Program

Mission - Screwworm cases could lead to widespread infesta- open wounds. tion such as that experienced in 1962, unless livestock producers conscientiously follow precautions in handling their livestock.

Reports being received by eradication officials indicate that many producers feel the program has progressed to a point that individual screwworm control measures are no longer required. This attitude, if left unchanged, could seriously hamper eradications efforts, authorities state.

For that reason, eradication officials have issued an urgent appeal to producers, asking them to treat animals with approved smears and sprays that will prevent screwworm attacks and collect and submit samples from all infestations detected.

Eradication workers point out while an increasing number of counties are reporting infestations, as yet no large build-up of native screwworms is evident. They feel if producers will make
