Many people are concerned about the pecan nut casebearer when will they be doing damage to our pecan crip? This question has been asked frequently lately.

According to the signs that I have found over the county, the time to spray to prevent casebearer damage is not far away.

Knowing what has happened so far this spring is important in determining when to spray - so, we will start with there. First, the casebearer, according to all reports received from other areas, is 7-12 days earlier than normal. I think that pattern is true here, also.
