Fine Rains Improve Bronte Area Outlook

Rains measuring up to more than five inches have drenched this area since Sunday night. Some hail damage was reported northwest of town and hard winds accompanied the rain Wednesday

Bronte's County Swimming Pool To Open Friday

Bronte's county swimming pool will open Friday, to start another season which will see thousands of persons enjoying the water and the adjacent park facilities.

The park and pool are the center for many recreational activities each year for residents of the town and a wide area of outlying communities.

In addition to the pool, the park contains tennis courts, volley ball court and basketball backboards. There are also eight large picnic tables, some with awnings and barbecue pit facilities. The park is used for many picnics, family reunions and other gatherings. The park has the best facilities in this area for such gatherings.

The Bronte Park area has beautiful sloping lawns in the picnic and play areas, and playground equipment is provided for children. Site of much beauty this summer for the first time will be a new flower bed, stretching across the center of the park, located in the ditch which was formerly used to drain water from Lake Knierim. The projects was sponsored by the Women's Progressive, Diversity and Sorosis Study Clubs, which planned and purchased the plants for the flower bed.

Around the lake east of the park is the new four-hole golf course being sponsored by the Coke County Golf Association. The organization has signed up 41 members and promises to be the scene of much additional activity in the park area.

Included in the park area is a baseball field, located across the creek from the park itself. It is the home for Little League and other baseball contests which are carried on almost every night during the summer months.

A. Z. Denman is caretaker of the park and baseball field. He emphasized that the park belongs to the people in this area and that they are always welcome to use all of its facilities. "All the equipment we have was put there for use of the people and we want them to use it," Denman said. He issued a special invitation to residents of neighboring communities to use the park facilities.

A paved road connects all around the park area and extends west to where it connects with Oliver Avenue. This gives an all

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morning. It was reported that Oak Creek Lake caught two feet of water from Tuesday afternoon and Wednesday morning rains in that area.

West of Bronte, Guy Strickland had an inch Sunday and two inches Wednesday morning for a total of three inches.

Louis Gallaway, who lives northwest of town, reported a half inch Sunday and two inches Wednesday morning, total 2½ inches.

Clifford Clark, in the Marie area, had two inches Sunday, a shower Monday and Tuesday, and 1½ Wednesday morning. Osmo Black, who also lives east of town, reported 4.2 inches altogether since the weekend.

Mrs. Merle Proctor, who lives in the Wilmeth community, said their rain gauge got fouled up in the wind storm, but they had at least six inches, and fields looked like lakes.

Marlin Mackey, who lives on the Ballinger highway a few miles from Bronte, reported two to three inches on his place Sunday. No report was available on the Wednesday morning rain.

Robert Lee also had good rains, receiving up to two inches. Mountain Creek Lake, from which Robert Lee gets its municipal water, caught 12 feet of water, relieving a situation which had grown serious and was being alleviated by pumping from two recently completed wells.

X-Ray Is Urged for All Positives in TB Tests

A total of 455 persons received the Heath test for tuberculosis in two sessions sponsored by the Bronte School PTA. The first tests were given May 10 and another opportunity was given last Sunday to those who missed the first tests. A total of 33 positive reactions were found in reading the results of both groups who received the tests.

DEAR MISTER EDITOR:

My cousin Hiram mailed me a clipping last week explaining all about the new Kennedy budget that the Congress is debating. This piece tells everthing in detail, four-square and gospel clear, it's the first time I've knowed fer certain what was heads and what was tails in this matter.

Hiram is a backwoods Republican, but the man doing the explaining in this piece is a White House expert named Walter Heller and I feel pritty shore he is a Harvard Democrat, so this balances off the piece and makes it non-partisan and a authority on the subject.

H D Agent's News Dept.

By FAY C. ROE

Fats serve important diet functions and should be kept in the diet, otherwise a person may run the risk of losing an essential nutrient and possibly the means of ridding the body of its excessive cholesterol.

The proper kind of fat in the diet may well be the cure and prevention of Atherosclerosis, or the closing up of arteries. It is not fat in the diet which is harmful, but rather an imbalance in the kinds of fat which may result in excess cholesterol.

What is needed is a balance of animal-type and vegetable-type fats. If the ratio of the amount of unsaturated fat to saturated fat is one or more, the level of blood cholesterol is not increased.

The total calories should not be excessive and the diet should contain adequate balance of protein and other protective foods, thus the total permissible calories from fat are reduced to less than 35 per cent. This represents about 15 per cent from saturated fat and 15 per cent from polyunsaturated fat.

The above information relative to fats in the diet was a part of the talk given to the Human Nutrition Workshop participants by Dr. Raymond Reiser. Dr. Reiser is professor in the biochemistry and nutrition department of Texas A & M College.

I hope to give bits of pertinent information from the workshop which I attended early in May, from time to time in my column. If any of you have questions relative to nutrition and the material I use, please let me hear from you.

Dear Sir:

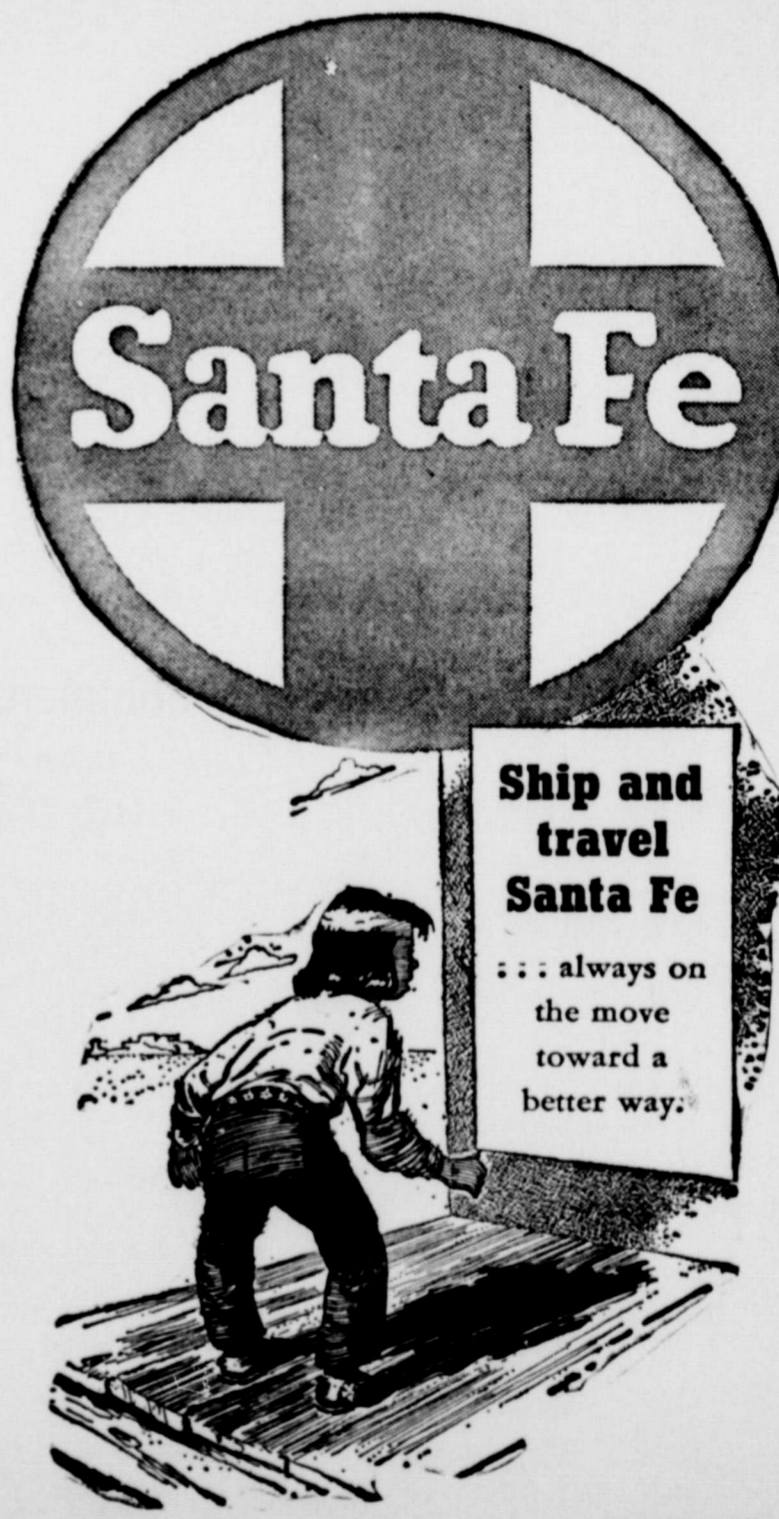
I shall appreciate the placement in your newspaper a notice which expresses the following ideas. If there is any charge for this notice, you may send me a bill.

SHOP BRONTE FIRST

County Agents News Column

We received reports last week on two cases identified as screw-worm. One on a sample of worms submitted by R. C. Lasswell, eight miles north of Bronte; the other from a sample submitted by Paul Coulter, 10 miles north of Water Valley. Sterile fly drops have started in the two areas. According to the present plan, flies will be dropped twice a week, for three weeks, then once a week for three more weeks in a five mile radius of the infested premises. State-wide, the infestations shown on the latest report changed very little—from 94 cases to 96 cases. The previous week was about the same, also. The number of cases north of the buffer zone in the hot-spotting areas has increased slightly.

Bottles for collecting and reporting cases have been left at the following places: Robert Lee State Bank and Key Feed Store in Robert Lee; First National Bank and Central Drug Store, in Bronte; and Green's Grocery, in Tennyson. If you need a sample bottle, call on us or one of the above-named places.

The pecan nut casebearer infes-

tation as a whole has been lighter than anticipated. From all indications the peak of the present generation has passed. Of the trees checked, most had very few eggs; none had heavy egg deposits. If you wish to spray, some benefit could still be derived. In most cases, the casebearer will move into another nutlet before completing his cycle. If this happens and the spray is on the nuts, he should be killed as he makes his entry.

This could materially help in that it would reduce the number that will be available for the third generation hatch. Normally this should occur in the last portion of June.

Be sure to add zinc sulfate to your spray. Zinc deficiencies are common among pecan trees in this area in the form of rosetted growth and limb dieback.

This is national soil stewardship week. We hope everyone recognizes the importance of soils to us and will strive to be soil stewards.

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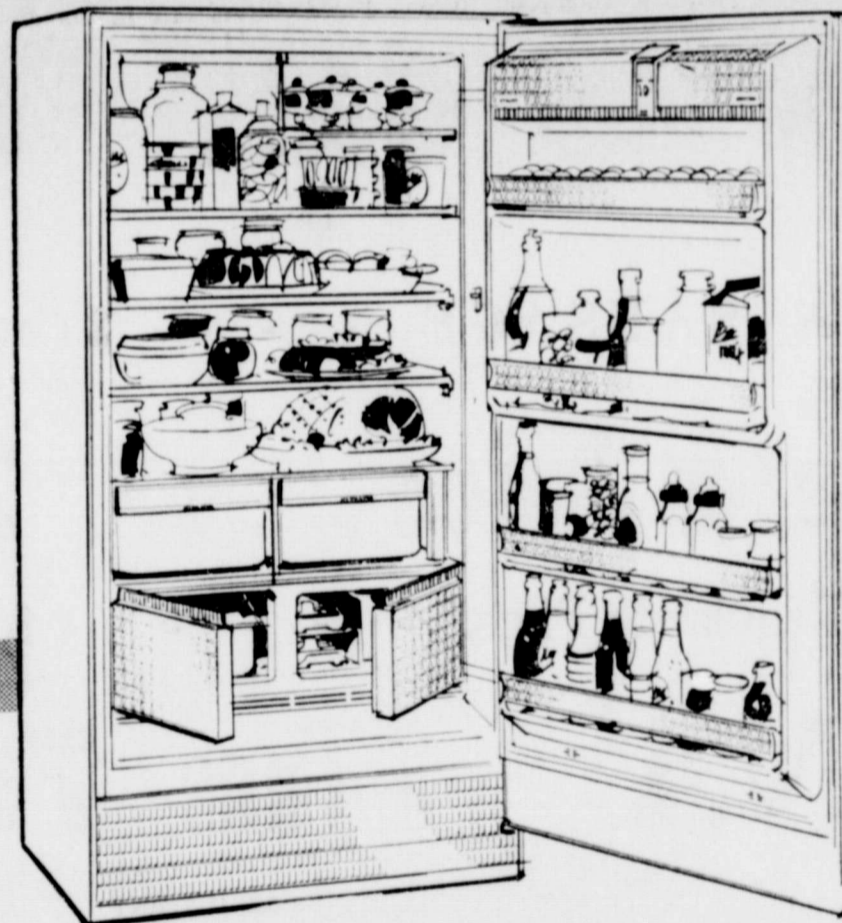
