\$697.50 Collected For Bronte Home

A total of \$697.50 has been collected or pledged for purchase of a site for a home for the aged in Bronte. Matthew Caperton, chairman of Bronte Lions Club's industrial committee, said Wednesday morning that contributions are coming in rapidly and that he hopes to have at least \$1,000 in the next few days.

An option has been secured from Mrs. Annie Wilkins for the land on which to build the home. It is located immediately south of Bronte proper and faces on Highway 277.

The Lions Club committee has pointed out that erection of the home here will provide employment for a number of Licensed Vocational Nurses, and will increase activity for the entire business community, as well as to provide comfortable and proper care for its residents.

Jerry J. Tidmore of Athens is interested in building the home and operating it. He operates a similar establishment in Athens.

Caperton said anyone who wishes to contribute to the fund to buy the site should deposit the money at First National Bank or leave it with him or any other member of the committee.

Memorial Day Holiday Today

Most Bronte business firms will close Thursday in observance of Memorial Day, which is a national holiday. The special day is set aside in order for U. S. citizens to honor their war dead.

Most firms on Bronte's main street will be closed, while a good many on U. S. Highway 277 will remain open to take care of holidays needs of local residents and travelers.

Workover Rig Is Destroyed in Fire

A workover rig belonging to Pool Well Service was destroyed in an oil field fire Tuesday on the Morrow lease northeast of Bronte. Bronte firemen answered a call to fight the fire about 11 o'clock Tuesday morning.

Jacob Bruce Morrow, who operates the place where the fire occurred, said that the workover crew was pulling the tubing when the well blew out and was ignited from a backfire of the truck exhaust. The well is known as Morrow 3, Tract 33, Humble.

Morrow said the work of Bronte firemen cooled the blaze so that workers were able to get up to and turn off the flow of fuel to the flames. Morrow said he knew of no serious injuries caused by the accident. One member of the workover crew suffered a sprained wrist.

Another unit was brought in and work was resumed on the well Wednesday.

MRS. KIKER HAS SURGERY TO MEND BROKEN HIP BONE

Mrs. S. A. Kiker fell last Wednesday in her room at Bronte Hospital, where she was a patient, and broke her hip. She was taken to a bone specialist in San Angelo and surgery was performed Thursday to pin the broken bone.

Her daughter, Mrs. B. E. Modgling, said Wednesday that Mrs. Kiker gets up a couple of times a day and is doing as well as can be expected. She is 89 years of age. Her doctor hopes that she will be able to return to Bronte Hospital Monday.

Audit Shows City Funds Are in Good Condition

An audit of the books of the City of Bronte appears in this week's Enterprise, and shows the city to be holding its own on finances, in spite of some unusual expense the past year in building the new city hall and purchasing a new fire truck. The audit covers the city fiscal year, from April 1, 1962 through March 31, 1963. It was prepared by Mrs. Helen Kirkland, city secretary, and reconciled with bank statements by an auditing committee made up of E. F. Glenn and B. D. Snead, officers in the First National Bank in Bronte.

The city's surplus in all funds for the past year is about \$600 less than that of the previous year, the figures being \$17,944.49 for FY 1961 and \$17,343.89 for FY 1962.

The city's bonded indebtedness was increased the past year on account of the sale of \$18,000 in bonds to build the new city hall. Old bond accounts, on waterworks and sewer system were reduced by \$3,000, leaving a total increase of \$15,000.

Coke County came to the aid of the city and paid off a note for \$3,725 on the new fire truck, but even so funds carried on the city's books, mostly contributions from local citizens, in the amount of \$2,351.12 was paid on the new truck and equipment.

In spite of the fact that this money was paid on the fire truck and that the bid on the city hall was some \$1,700 more than the

bond issue, the city funds held up almost to the year before.

Money owed the Upper Colorado River Authority on Bronte's water line from Oak Creek Lake, the filter plant and other improvements was also reduced almost \$9,000, from \$160,587.98 to \$151,687.98.

Members of the city council urged that all local citizens study the report, as it represents the use they have made of city tax money, water and sewer revenue and miscellaneous sources of income.

State law requires publication of the annual statement, so that residents of a city may know how their money is spent.

Freezing is one of the simplest and fastest methods of preserving foods at home. It keeps the natural color, fresh flavor and food values of most fruits, vegetables and meats better than any other method of food preservation.

There are some things everyone who is trying to freeze food should know. These points of success are:

1. Good quality — careful selection of good food should be made.

2. Careful preparation — speed in preparation and careful handling to retain quality.

3. Proper packaging — should be wrapped or packaged to keep it from drying out to preserve food value, flavor, color and texture.

4. Storage — foods should be stored at right temperature and should not be stored too long.

To prevent discoloration of certain fruits use powdered or crystalline ascorbic acid dissolved in syrup just before pouring over fruit. Use ½ teaspoon per quart.

The latest screwworm report shows a slight increase in the number of cases over the previous week. But the percentage increase compared to last year is much smaller.

The report shows 111 cases for Texas, 15 more than the previous week. The corresponding week in 1962 had 1137 cases reported or about 10 times as many. We hope the authorities can continue to stay abreast of the situation with the spot treatment.

Coke County had one more case identified last week. Bill Matlock submitted a sample from the northwest corner of the county that was confirmed as screwworm.

A note on the more optimistic side—several fly boxes were found along the river last week. Oscar Kresta reported finding two boxes in his field adjacent to the river. R. C. Patterson found one further up in the Friendship community.

The rains have been wonderful. The pastures have taken on a new look, the stock tanks have more water than they have held in quite awhile. And, with the amount of moisture we received, I believe it has penetrated deep enough to stimulate roots to move downward. If this happens, the hot, dry weather that is sure to come a little later will not be so devastating. A well-rooted plant with roots deep in the soil can withstand dry periods much better than a shallow-rooted plant.

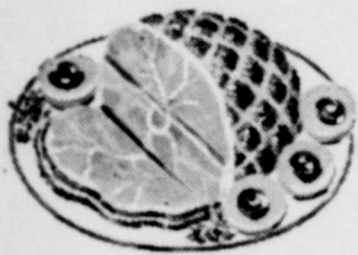

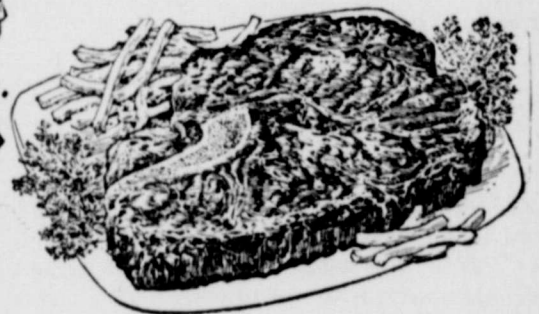
