Almost any one of us who has had occasion to drive many miles in the past has picked up a traid THIRTIETH YEAR fic violation ticket. He who hasn't is mighty lucky.

Sometime the infraction isn't great and everyone but the cop would agree a ticket shouldn't be necessary. But deserved or not, the bearer of one of the little pink slips issued by the State Department of Public Safety had better be prepared to make amends with he justice of the peace in the where the violation took

And that is the subject of our sermon this week. Texas is bountifully blessed with 1,439 courts (1952 count) of one kind or the other, but not one (we repeat, not one) of these is set op to administer justice exclusively to breakers of the public highway laws.

Under our court system, the Justice of the Peace Court is used for handling traffic violations. I a Castro County driver, for in stance, is picked up for a viola tion while passing through Dallas County at night, he will ultimatel pay his fine to one of the justices of the peace there either in person or by mail. The spirit of the law implies that a person charged will appear before the court personally, bue fortunately a plea of guilty will usually let a motorist handle these things by mail. The JP court has jurisdiction since they handle criminal cases where the fine does not exceed \$200. A traffic violator is by definition a criminal and his fine is usually less than \$200, consequently his trial comes
