



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

Apparently that is the case, for to date not many serious threats have come, even from the NAACP, an organization for which we have little admira-

Many Negroes as well as many white people in this country need more opportunity, more freedom from ignorance, hunger and discrimination to live their lives to the fullest extent both for themselves and for this country. Administrations in Washington have seen this need for many years and much has been done to improve the lot of vast numbers of our citizens. No political party can take the credit (or blame, if you wish) for these changes. They have occurred in both the Demo-
