Regional play offs for Teen-age Baseball will begin at the Bronte Park Monday night at 8 o'clock. The Bronte Teen Age team will go up against the winner of the Midland league in a best two out of three series. The second game will be Tuesday night, and if a third game is necessary, it will be played Thursday night. All games will be played here.

The Bronte team and their managers, Clyde Lee and Jacob Morrow, are looking for some stiff competition in the Midland team, but have reason to believe, after winning the Abilene Colt League Invitational All-Star Tournament that they will be able to make a good showing in the regional play-offs.

Admission prices for the games will be 75 cents for adults and 15 cents for students. Morrow and Lee said Wednesday morning that funds of the Teen Agers are pretty badly in arrears at this time, but they believe the large crowds expected for the games next week will take care of the financial situation. Of course, they pointed out, if the locals win and become eligible to go on to the state contest in Fort Worth, some more money raising may become necessary.

Boys on the squad who will go up against the Midland champs are: Lynn White, Royce Lee, David Prince, Jim Morrow, Ronnie Johns, Robby Cook, Terry Thetford, Pistol Hood, Bob Carruthers, Robert Verden and Rusty Dodson. Tad Richards is bat boy for the Bronte team.

The boys and their managers have promised fans some good baseball in the upcoming games, and everyone in the entire area of West Texas is invited. Midland is expected to bring a large delegation of fans.

Teen Agers Champs In Abilene Tourney

Bronte's Teen Age baseball club came home Tuesday night in a blaze of glory after winning a double header and taking first place in the Abilene Colt League Invitational All Star Tournament. Tournament play started July 15 and ended July 23. In six games played in the double elimination tourney, the local lads lost only one, to Hamlin. They won over Clyde, Blackwell-Wingate, Baird and two over Abilene.

In the opener Tuesday night with Baird, Terry Thetford and Pistol Hood did the pitching, giving up six hits to the Callahan County team. Baird's hurrier let the Bronte boys have eight hits but they managed to get 12 runs out of it. Lynn White hit two home runs and Jim Morrow hit one over the fence. Score 12-11.

The 9 p.m. game with Abilene was to tell the tale as to whether or not the Bronte boys took home first or second place honors. With Robby Cook on the mound, the first six innings, Bronte had the host town's team 7-0 going into the seventh. Cook's record in the first six was perfect, with no hits, but he had to be pulled because he had pitched the allowed number of innings in the tourney. David Prince took over the mound chores in the seventh and gave up three hits. Abilene scored six runs. Abilene put up six pitchers against the Bronte team in the final game. Jim Morrow and Pistol Hood knocked home runs for the locals. Final score was 7-6, Bronte.

All the boys and managers Jacob Morrow and Clyde Lee were presented individual trophies for winning first place honors in the All Star contest.

In earlier games, Bronte went up against Clyde in the opener on July 15, to take a close 2-1 victory. Robert Verden was pitcher, and went the full seven innings plus an extra to break a 1-1 tie.

Play resumed Thursday, July 18, when Bronte suffered its only defeat. Hamlin squeaked by the locals, 7-6. Thetford and Cook were on the mound for Bronte.

On Friday night, July 19, the Bronte boys went into the loser's bracket of play against Blackwell-Wingate, but got back in the winner's column with an 11-4 victory. Morrow and Cook were on the mound.

Monday night put the Bronte Teen Agers up against Abilene, who was undefeated at that time. The locals blasted their hosts 4-1. Verden was pitcher and gave up only two hits, to set up the Bronte boys for the Tuesday night contests with Baird and Abilene.

The managers were loud in their praise of the team, saying they came through like "we thought they would."

The Teen-agers are now ready for regional playoffs with Midland which will start here Monday night. Information on these games is contained in another story in this week's Enterprise.

grass was a little ahead in this race, but them figgers from the Tax Foundation shows the Department of Agriculture is closing the gap fast.

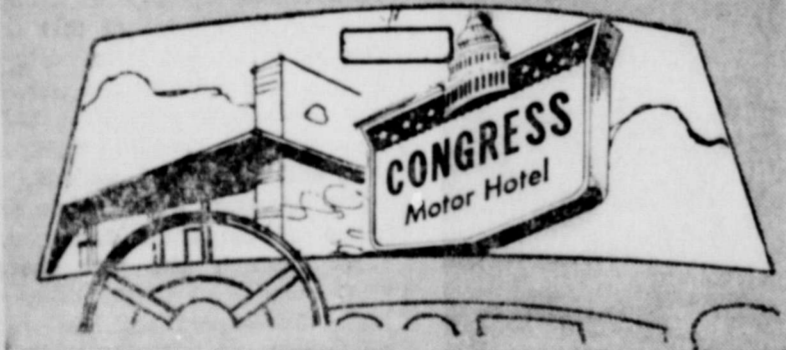

Committee Named for Center's Round-Up

C. A. (Charlie) Morris, chairman of the Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children, has announced the appointment of members of the Round-Up committee.

The round-up, founded in 1961 by Coke County rancher Conda Wylie, is one of the main financial sponsors of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center in Abilene. He is a member of the arrangements committee for the round-up. Each year since its founding, Texas ranchers have donated livestock to the round-up which are sold with all profits going to the center. It provides over one-third of funds needed by the center.

The center serves 724 patients, with 110 patients receiving daily treatment. It is a private, non-profit organization dedicated to the rehabilitation of the handicapped. Most of the patients are victims of polio, strokes, cerebral palsy, muscular dystrophy, multiple sclerosis and other neurological or orthopedic disorders.

The round-up, one of the most unique auctions to be found, will be held Sept. 28, 1963 at the Abilene Livestock Auction, announced Morris. It is in conjunction with the "Best in the West" stocker feeder sale.

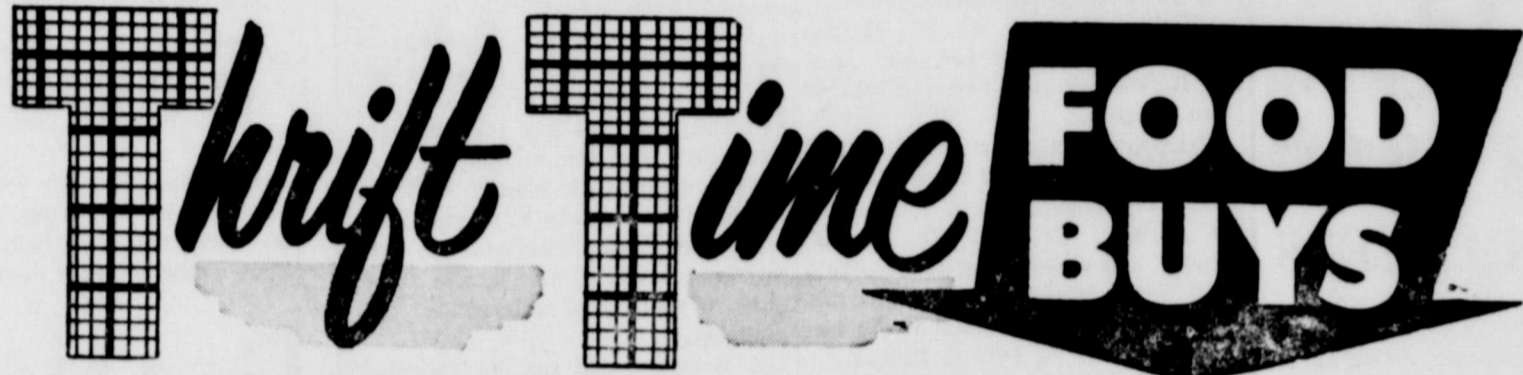

hand at coining a phrase with a long life.

It was part of a speech by Dwight Van Meter, vice president of N. W. Ayer & Son, Inc., a big advertising agency.

Mr. Van Meter's remarks in part, follow:

"As the father of two children... I am genuinely concerned about the future. I am concerned about what America will offer my children — 15, 25 or 40 years from now.

"I'm worried about what may happen to their moral fiber. I don't want my kids to be free-loaders. I don't want them to think the government owes them a living. I don't want them to grow up and live under any kind of statism. And that goes for

government paternalism, big brotherism, or any other kind of 'ism' for that matter.

"I want my children to be free; to have complete freedom of choice in a free economy — including the freedom of buying their kilowatt hours from a non-subsidized, profit-making corporation. And the freedom of choosing for themselves where, when and from whom they will buy their insurance.

"I believe it is their right to have that freedom!

"I want my kids to be free to earn an honest, independent dollar, and free to keep a little of it. I want them to be free to speak out when they think they are right, without fear of reprisal; to always have freedom from any kind of bureaucratic harrassment, or government oppression.

"I want these things for my children, deeply enough... to ask you without apology for your whole-hearted help in seeing to it that they get them."
