Colorado City in the near future. if you will, look at the top kill on the mesquite sprayed on the Spade Ranch recently. The Spade Ranch intersects the highway about six miles north of Silver. The sprayed area is on the left hand side of the road for the most part.

That area, if you will recall, had heavy rains last August. Their overall stored moisture situation was much better than was ours at mesquite spraying time. The expected top kill varies in this area, whereas the top kill is almost 100 per cent in the area that must have had the more subsoil moisture.

We are anxious to see what difference there will be in the root or permanent kill in the two areas.



PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a require-ment for voting and so as to authorthe Legislature to provide for registration of all voters.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read, respectively, as follows:

to read, respectively, as follows: "Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disquali-fications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or com-ponent branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she rasided at the time of en-tering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces; and provided further, that hefore offering to vote at an elec-tion a voter shall have registered if required by law to do so. The Legis-lature may authorize absentee vot-ing. This Amendment shall take ef-fect on December 1, 1963.

"Section 4. In all elections by the people the vote shall be by secret bal-lot. The Legislature shall provide for the numbering of ballots and make such other regulations as may be necessary to detect and punish fraud and preserve the purity of elections, and may provide by law for the reg-istration of all voters. Should the Legislature enact a registration law in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such law shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipa-tory character." Section 2. The foregoing Consti-tutional Amendment shall be sub-mitted to a vote of the qualified elec-tors of the state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1963, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the amendment of the Con-

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 49-b. Art-lele III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so the same will here-after read as follows:

after read as follows: "Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a govern-mental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Vet-erans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Consti-tutional Amendments except as modi-fied herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the fiel herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one

"Said Veterans' Land Fund shall consist of any lands heretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board, until the sale price therefor, together with any interest and penalties due, have been received by said Board (although nothing herein shall be construed to prevent said Board from accepting full payment for a portion of any tract), and of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board which moneys so attributable shall include but shall not be limit-ed to the proceeds from the issu-ance and sale of such bonds; the moneys received from the sale or re-sale of any lands, or rights therein. sale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with such proceeds: the moneys received from the sale or re-sale of any lands, or rights therein. purchased with other moneys attributable to such bonds; the interest and penalties received from the sale or resale of such lands, or rights therein; the bonuses, income, rents, royalties, and any other pecuniary benefit received by said Board from benefit received by said Board from any such lands; sums received by way of indemnity or forfeiture for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such bonds to com-ply with his bid and accept and pay for such bonds or for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any lands comprising a part of said Fund to comply with his bid and accept and pay for any such lands; and interest received from invest-ments of any such moneys. The and interest received from invest-ments of any such moneys. The principal and interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the pay-ment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested! in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes. are needed for such purposes. "All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which por-tion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of re-tiring all such bonds, shall be de-posited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund thereafter shall like-wise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund. and in such installments as may be determined by said Board is and shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board bat the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the bonds issued and sold in any in-stallment of any bonds may not ex-ceed four and one-half percent (4½%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or pur-

All lands thus purchas-ed shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or here-after purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declar-ed to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual pur-chasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund. "The lands of the Veterans' Land

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such rules and regulaand under such rules and regula-tions as are now or may hereafter be

Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms. denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be pro-vided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places. and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the

"AGAINST the Amendment to Sec-tion 49-b of Article III of the Con-stitution of Texas to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$150,000,-000.00; said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955; such funds to be expended in necordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of same Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date set forth in said Amendment, and the Gover-nor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the neces-sary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this state.






