

TML Population Comparisons Show Dimmitt High in Rate of Growth

Dimmitt, in gaining an increase in population from 1,461 in 1950 to 2,935 in 1960 advanced to number 280th in size according to a report made public this week by the publication of "Texas Town and City". Dimmitt had formerly ranked 371st in the 1950 population tabulations.

Probably the most significant figures to come from the Texas Municipal League's publication showed that Dimmitt ranked 46th in the state in rate of growth. The only High Plains or Panhandle city to exceed Dimmitt's rate of growth was Earth, which ranked 45th. Dimmitt had a 100.9 percent increase while Earth had 104.8 percent more people in 1960 than 1950. Earth increased from 539 in 1950 to 1,104 in 1960.

Irving led the state with a 1,654.5 percent increase — from 2,621 in 1950 to 45,985 in 1960. Mesquite, Richardson and Farmers Branch — all towns with considerably less than 2,000 population in 1950 —

reported gains of more than a thousand percent in population. These tremendous growths were triggered mostly by decentralization of industrial areas. Irving, Mesquite, Farmers Branch and Richardson are all in Dallas county, a standard industrial area.

Amarillo Weather Bureau Relates Severe Weather Warning Program

The Amarillo Weather Bureau this week announced a detailed plan for warning Panhandle residents in case of severe weather.

A storm does develop in the immediate vicinity. After the severe weather forecasts area residents should make arrangements to receive follow-up broadcasts on radio or T.V.

The announcement came at a meeting at Amarillo Monday evening attended by Edwin (Goose) Ramey and Howard Cook, local weather bureau reporter.

The severe weather warning comes when severe local weather conditions are already in existence or immediately imminent. This warning will contain information about the exact location and direction of movement of the destructive storm.

Radio stations in this area participating in the severe weather forecast plan were announced as KPAN, Hereford; KTUE, Tulia; and Amarillo stations KGNC, KFDA, KBUY, KIZX, and KRAY.

Residents in the path of a severe weather warning should take cover immediately the Weather Bureau warned.

The weather Bureau emphasized that all warnings and forecasts of severe weather must originate with the Amarillo Weather Bureau to avoid confusion. The Bureau is the only agency that can warn of weather threatening a general area.

Outside of the local storm network of the bureau a supplemental procedure — which includes Castro County — will be placed in effect. When this happens severe weather forecasts, and if required, severe weather warnings, will be released by emergency broadcast procedure over radio and TV plus local area radio stations in affected areas.

Severe weather forecasts are released by the Weather Bureau to alert the public to possible development of severe local weather conditions. These forecasts serve to alert those people directly responsible for the safety of their communities. The Weather Bureau will maintain constant radar search and recall sufficient personnel to issue warnings if such should be needed.

The Weather Bureau said that this plan was developed to more effectively inform and warn residents of the Texas Panhandle whenever there is danger of a tornado or other severe weather conditions. It is also for the purpose of avoiding public confusion caused by unfounded rumors and incomplete information.

The general public should take no action upon receiving a severe weather forecast except to take whatever action necessary in case of a severe weather warning.

From Bare Prairie to Place of Beauty is History of Local Cemetery

(Ed. note — The dream of a permanent and ample water supply at Castro Memorial Gardens came close to reality this week as workmen finished laying the pipe from Dimmitt to the cemetery. Plans are for the perpetual care cemetery to be turned into a place of lasting beauty. From a few small markers over lonely graves on the prairie south of the tiny town of Dimmitt, the local cemetery has emerged as the well kept final resting place of hundreds of people near a growing city. To commemorate the improvements being made at Castro Memorial Gardens, Mrs. Pearl Mapes, widow of early-day cattleman C. J. Mapes has written a history of the cemetery. It is presented here.)

ber hour, sad vigil. Burials, in those days, were simple and meaningful. Black material covered the hand-made casket. Friends sometimes spent the entire night digging a grave in the unyielding earth, only to have to cover it in the morning to wait out a driving rainstorm.

slow procession toward the cemetery. For the immediate survivors, cane bottomed chairs were placed in a circle around the open grave. No floral offerings graced the raw earth. After the casket was lowered into place, every man took his turn with the shovel until the grave was mounded, and man, woman and child stayed until the last bit of earth was firmly in place. Afterwards it was the custom to visit other graves, and those needing attention were cared for on the spot.

When J. W. Alexander purchased the five acre plot in 1903 for use as a cemetery, a barbed wire fence was erected, which stood until 1945. 1931 saw the purchase of an additional half-acre from the W. A. Murphys, deeded to the Dimmitt Cemetery Association in the names of Bruce McLean, Mark Cowsett and J. C. Tate as Trustees.

The purchase of an additional and adjoining five acres in 1945 by H. T. Bartlett was a fortunate step forward. Ultimately his foresight and generosity was responsible not only for this valuable and being deeded to the cemetery association, but for the purchase of an iron lung for the local hospital as well.

This cemetery, founded in the time and the spirit of the Old West, has survived and surmounted many obstacles. Due to a lower water level, the old cemetery with mill has become inoperable. Friends, local and from afar, have contributed funds in an amount sufficient to justify the Board of Directors to enter into a contract for the laying of a four inch water line from Dimmitt to the cemetery.

The present officers of the Dimmitt Cemetery Association consist of Jack Summers, president; E. J. Wright, vice-president; and directors Swain Burkett, Bob McLean, Elmer Dixon, Jack Cowsett and Edwin Ramey.

by Mrs. C. J. Mapes The penciled inscription on the wooden stake read "Joe Franks — died 1890." He was buried close to the place where his horse had dragged him to death. Later that year an orphan who worked for pioneer J. W. Carter, died, and a second wooden marker was inscribed with the name of Paskil Brakefield. In 1894 William Johnson, a brother of the late Mack and Tom Johnson, died. A third marker was added. When a shepherd met his death by freezing, he became the fourth man to be buried in Dimmitt's first cemetery. Driving rain and snow soon obliterated the penciled name on his marker. Had interested citizens not placed cement markers on these early graves, they, too, would have passed out of sight and mind, and the entombed have become anonymous forever.

Somewhere in the cemetery, a small unmarked mound is the final resting place for a five year old boy who was run over by a wagon in a caravan bound for New Mexico. For many years his grief-stricken mother returned to visit his grave, and many of us remember her sad vigil.

CEMETERY WATER SYSTEM—This ditch was completed early this week and pipe installed which will bring the much-needed water to Castro Memorial Gardens for irrigating plants, flowers and grass in the future. This is a big step forward in the board of director's plans for eventual perpetual adequate care for the cemetery located one mile south of Dimmitt.

Installation of a water line from Dimmitt, to Castro Memorial Gardens neared completion this week. The \$8,500 installation will furnish water in amounts suitable for proper care-taking at the cemetery. The old windmill, which had served this function for years, began to dry up with the advent of irrigation and it was soon unable to supply enough water.

This was one of the steps by the Cemetery Association Board of Directors towards long-range beautifying of the cemetery. A part-time caretaker has been hired for some time under the perpetual care program. Under this system donations are made to the Association to be invested. Interest from these investments is used to pay expenses of caring for the cemetery. Many families have been paying \$50 per grave for this perpetual care and others \$2 per year for annual care. These funds, with donations, supply the money necessary for maintenance.

In a spirit that begat personal service and self-reliance, friend too numerous to mention have contributed time, labor and money to the preservation and development of the cemetery property. And in a spirit that nurtures undying pride in their locale and people, they will go on doing so with continuing results.

SCS Service to Sponsor Contest In Land Judging for Youngsters

The Running Water Soil Conservation District will sponsor a land judging contest for area 4-H and FFA boys on April 15. It was announced this week by Wade Mills, SCS chairman.

come out and match wits with these boys and go through the contest with them although prizes are being offered only to winning FFA and 4-H teams and individuals. The value of examining one's own knowledge could be worth the time.

This contest, open to all 4-H clubs and FFA chapters in this and surrounding counties, is the first of what is planned to be an annual affair. It is expected that 12 to 15 4-H and FFA teams will be in Dimmitt for the contest.

Land judging contests are a part of the Soil Conservation District's educational program. "If considered only for the benefit of competition, the value of such contests are lessened a great deal," Mills said. "The true value can only be measured by the amount of preparation that the contestants put into it. To be able to give a good account of himself in a contest such as this, a contestant must study and receive training in identifying the characteristics of soils, their present problems, their potential problems and the type of conservation treatment that is necessary to cure or prevent these problems. He also must learn the limitations imposed on various types of soils from various factors such as climate, irrigation, erodibility, and so forth," Mills continued.

"So it is actually the training that these young men must receive to make them eligible to contest that is so important. The contest itself only provides the incentive and a way of testing one's knowledge."

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JayCees to Stage Easter Egg Hunt

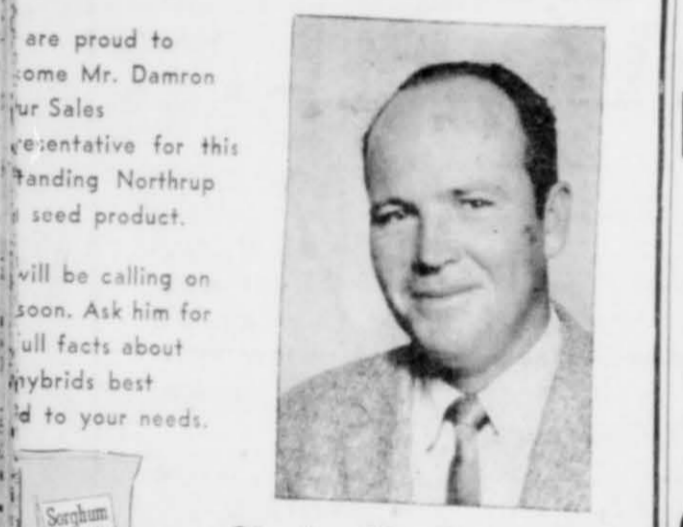

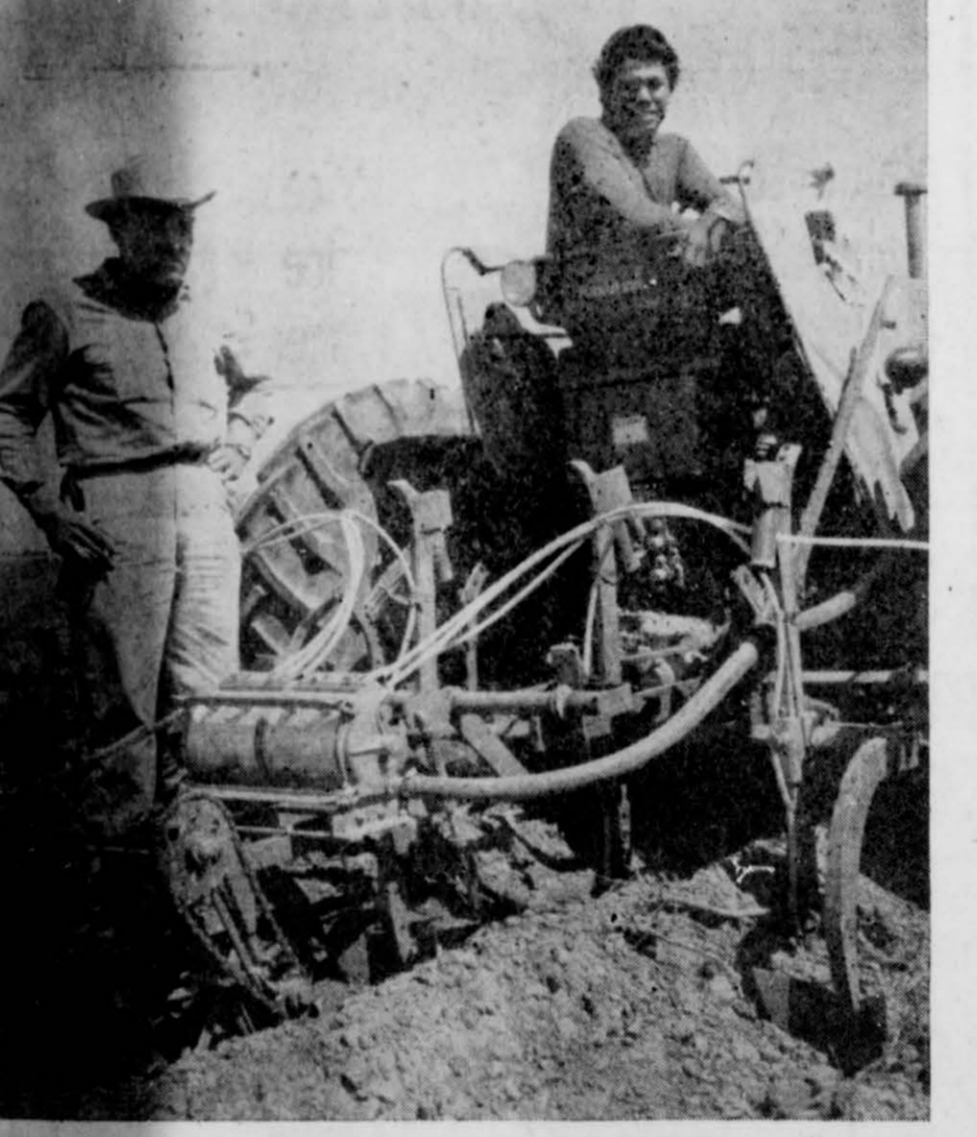
