Crowd Expected for Annual Barbecue

Everything is ready for the big Labor Day barbecue, scheduled to start at 6 p.m. Monday in the Bronte County Park.

That's the word from A. Z. Denman, caretaker of the park, who is general supervisor of seeing that the annual event is carried out successfully.

The Labor Day barbecue is a big occasion in Bronte, and a large crowd is expected to be on hand to partake of the old fashioned barbecue, to visit with friends and neighbors, and to witness the water show.

Sponsored by merchants of Bronte and Tennyson, the barbecue

is expected to attract about 800 persons this year. More than 700 attended last year, and, according to Denman, the "crowd gets a little bigger each year."

Everything will be "on the house" with the exception of desserts, and women of the community are asked to bring cakes, pies,

etc., to be used as the final course of the meal.

Main item on the menu, of course, is the barbecue which will undergo slow cooking most of the day. It will be supplemented with generous servings of red beans, tossed green salad, onions, pickles, bread, iced tea and coffee.

Merchants foot the bill for the barbecue each year as an expression of their thanks to the people of this area for their patronage and friendship.

The water show, which is being worked up by Jeanna Denman and Ann Harris, will feature swimming

exhibitions by students who have taken part in the various courses of instruction held this summer. The water show will begin at 7:30 p.m., giving the crowd ample time for eating and visiting after serving begins at 6 p.m.

Denman emphasized that everybody in this entire area is invited to attend the barbecue.

Bronte School Kids Start Back Tuesday to 9 Months of Classes

San Marcos Firm Is Low Bidder on 6th Kickapoo Dam

H. F. Construction Co. of San Marcos was low bidder when bids were opened Tuesday on proposals to build the last of six dams on the Kickapoo Creek watershed. The San Marcos firm submitted a bid of \$137,037.50. Ten bids were submitted with the highest of the ten being \$205,845.10.

Officers of the Kickapoo Water Control and Improvement District were pleased with the bid, since the engineer's estimate was \$160,175.

This dam will be located on what is known as Site No. 2. It will be approximately 3½ miles northwest of Bronte on property of Mrs. Eva Keeney. A small portion of the structure will reach across from Mrs. Keeney's land onto Louis Galloway's place, and at the other end a place belonging to T. B. Hicks. At Flood stage water will back up on Galloway, Ray Coalson and Mrs. S. O. Jackson. The entire lake, when the water level is standing on the draw-down tube, will be on the Keeney place.

Work is almost completed on Site No. 5, located on land belonging to Edward Rawlings. Construction is being done by T. L. Free Construction Co. When it is finished, the dam on Mrs. Keeney's land will be the only one in the series of six which is not complete. Lyle & Davis had the contract on the first four structures.

The bid of H. F. Company has to be approved by the State Soil Conservation Service office in Temple, after which it will be officially awarded by the water district. The contractor is allowed 308 days for completion of the structure after notification of acceptance of his bid. Cleal T. Watts is president of the company.

Longhorn, Eden Scrimmage Set Friday Night

The only pre-season scrimmage with an outside school is set for 6 p.m. Friday, when the Eden Bulldogs will come here to give the 1963 Longhorns a try.

The Longhorns have been working out morning and evening since practice started. They are coming along nicely, according to Coach N. M. Curlee. A few injuries have clouded the picture, but most of them are not considered serious.

Gary Don Allen, freshman, who is hospitalized reportedly with a tear in his liver, has received the most serious injury. Jimmy Wells is also hospitalized with a knee injury. Both boys have been transferred to San Angelo after being treated here.

Low explained that each team will consist of three players and the best ball hit by any member of a team will be counted. Each player will place his ball at the spot closest to the hole for any necessary subsequent strokes. Eight holes will be played in the contest.

All persons who are going to participate in the water show at the Bronte Park Monday evening are requested to be on hand tonight (Thursday) at 7:30.

The practice session tonight will be the last before the show, according to Mrs. A. Z. Denman. She urged everyone who plans to take part to be present.

The water show will be held at 7:30 p.m. following the barbecue. The show will conclude activities at the local pool for this season.

Rail Strike Would Affect Local Mail Service

Postmaster Noah Pruitt, Jr. announced today that planes, trucks, and buses will be pressed into service to move air and first class mail to its destination and to move other classes of mail within 150 miles of the Bronte post office in the event of a nation wide rail strike. Pruitt said he had received instructions not to accept mailings other than first class, air mail and air parcel post which are destined for points farther than the second postal zone, which is generally about 150 miles from Bronte, for the duration of the strike, if it occurs.

"We are prepared to handle any letters or parcels addressed to any point provided first class or air mail postage is paid on them."

He cautioned that service will be temporarily suspended on second class magazines and newspapers, third class matter and fourth class parcel post packages addressed to points beyond the second parcel post zone as part of the national post office contingency plan for operating under the rail strike emergency.

Pruitt advised that any emergency shipment, such as medicine or badly needed spare parts, should be sent first class or air mail during the strike, if it occurs, and if the shipment demands delivery beyond the second postal zone. Perishable items should not be mailed for the duration of the strike.

Mailing items covered by the temporary and limited service suspension, deposited at post offices im-

mediately prior to the strike, will be made at the risk of the mailer. The Department cannot guarantee early delivery of perishable items and other than first class and air mail parcels, letters and other matter if they are in transit at the time the strike commences.

Pruitt noted that Kerrville, Lubbock, Fort Stockton and Big Spring (the 150 mile radius) are among cities within the second postal zone of Bronte which will continue to get full mail service from this office if and when the rail strike occurs.

Anyone desiring detailed information or answers to technical questions are invited to call on postal employees for assistance with their mailing problems.

"Doing for people what they can and ought to do for themselves is a dangerous experiment. In the last analysis, the welfare of the workers depends upon their own initiative.

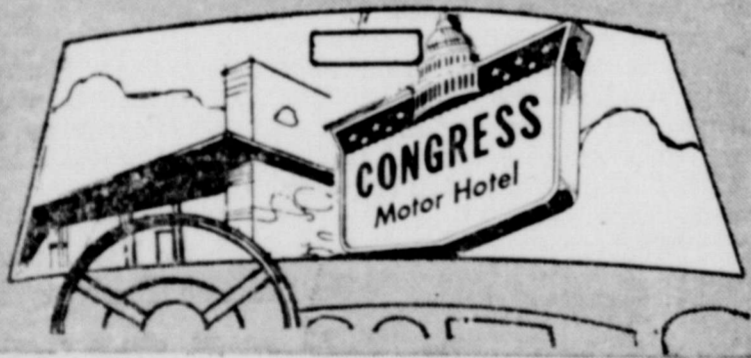
"Whatever is done under the guise of philanthropy or social morality which in any way lessens initiative is the greatest crime that can be committed against the toilers.

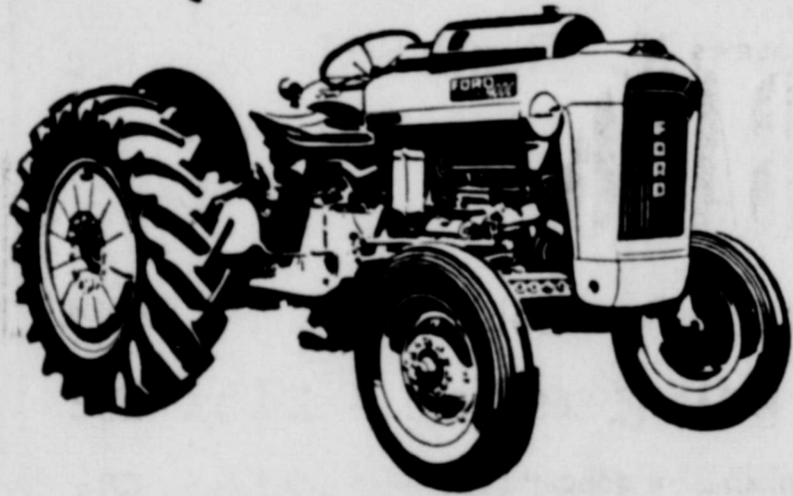

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE LICENSING, TAXATION, INSPECTION, SUPERVISION AND REGULATION OF THE OWNING AND OPERATION FOR PROFIT OF ANY POOL OR BILLIARD TABLE OR TABLES WITHIN THE CITY OF BRONTE, TEXAS

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF BRONTE, TEXAS:

SECTION I: That there is hereby adopted an Ordinance relating to the licensing, taxation, inspection, supervision and regulation of the owning and operation for profit of any pool or billiard table or tables within the City of Bronte, Texas, to read as follows:

"SECTION 1: Definition: The term "pool or billiard table" as used herein shall mean any table surrounded by a ledge or cushion, with or without pockets, upon which balls are propelled by a stick or cue.

"SECTION 2: License: It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association of persons, corporations or every organization, save and except religious, charitable or educational organizations, authorized by the laws of the State of Texas, to own and operate, for profit, any pool or billiard table or tables, as such terms are herein defined, within this City without having first obtained an appropriate license from the City Secretary as herein provided, which license shall at all times be displayed in some conspicuous place within the licensed place of business.

"SECTION 3: License Fee: The City Secretary is authorized to collect the following annual license fee for each location on which a pool or billiard table or tables is or are owned and operated for profit, to-wit, the sum of One Hundred and No/100 (\$100.00) Dollars for each license issued and a like sum for each renewal thereof.

"SECTION 4: Term of License: Any license issued pursuant to this Ordinance shall be for a term of one year and shall be non-transferable.

"SECTION 5: Tax: There is hereby levied an annual occupation tax of Two and 5/100 (\$2.50) Dollars for each pool or billiard table owned and operated for pro-

fit within this City by any person, firm, association of persons, corporations and every other organization, save and except religious, charitable and educational organizations, authorized under the laws of the State of Texas, and the tax levied herein shall be paid to the Tax Collector of the City who shall issue an occupation tax receipt; provided, however, that this tax does not apply and is not levied on any pool or billiard table where the player thereon does or is required to make a coin deposit causing an electrical connection of any nature or kind before such game may be actually commenced. Said occupation tax receipt shall specify the number of pool or billiard tables for which issued; the address of the building or premises in or on which such table or tables are located and shall bear the serial number or numbers, if any, of the particular table or tables. Such occupation tax shall have and bear no relation to any licenses or fees provided herein. Said license fee being required to provide proper official supervision, inspection and services for the premises.

"SECTION 6: Hours of Operation: Any person, firm, association of persons, corporations and every other organization, save and except religious, charitable or educational organizations, authorized by the laws of the State of Texas may engage in the operation for profit of any pool or billiard table or tables within this City on week days, that is, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of each week, between the hours of 8:00 o'clock A.M. and 11:00 o'clock P.M., on Saturdays between the hours of 8:00 o'clock A.M. and 12:00 o'clock midnight and on Sundays only between the hours of 1:00 o'clock P.M. and 6:00 o'clock P.M. No person, firm, association of persons, corporations and every other organization, save and except religious, charitable or educational organizations authorized under the laws of the State of Texas, may engage in the operation for profit of any pool or billiard table or tables within this City at any time except between the hours authorized herein.

"SECTION 7: Alcoholic Beverages: No person, firm, association of persons, corporations, and any other organizations authorized under the laws of the State of Texas, licensed hereunder, shall knowingly permit the sale, use or consumption of any kind of alcoholic beverage or beverages in or upon the premises for which a license has been issued, as provided in this ordinance. No such person, firm, association of persons, corporations, and any other organizations authorized under the laws of the State of Texas shall knowingly permit the presence of a person or persons under the influence of intoxicating liquor on a premises licensed hereunder.

"SECTION 8: Penalties: Any person, firm, association of persons, corporations or every other organization authorized under the laws of the State of Texas licensed hereunder violating any provision of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not more than Twenty-five and No/100 (\$25.00) Dollars. The penalties herein provided are cumulative of, and in addition to, the revocation powers provided in Section 9 hereof.

"SECTION 9: Revocation of License: City Council is hereby authorized and empowered to revoke or cancel the license of any person, firm, association of persons, corporations and every other organization authorized under the laws of the State of Texas, licensed hereunder to own and operate a pool or billiard table or tables, after giving such licensee ten (10) days notice of a hearing and after conducting such hearing for the purpose of determining wheth-

County Agents News Column

We have not qualified or rather re-qualified for certification as a modified-certified brucellosis-free county. We still lack a few herds. I do not have the exact count, but a close estimate is that we need (minimum) five or ten more of the herds that were free on the first go round three years ago and 15 of the suspect and reactor herds. We hope we can get these before this fall.

The regulations in the law state that for recertification we must submit 20 per cent of the herds from the previous test that were brucellosis free and all of the suspect and reactor herds. So far Mr. Gruehen has tested about 95 per cent of the required free herds and about 50 per cent of the suspect and reactor herds.

Several Coke County 4-H Club members completed and submitted records on their projects or demonstrations this year. Several of these entered in the district awards program judging.

We had two boys to place among the top three in the division and program in which they were entered. John Service, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Service Jr., Robert Lee, placed third in the Junior Achievement awards program. Jerry Parker, son of Mr. and Mrs. Truman Parker, Bronte, was one of four members selected to receive a Junior Santa Fe Award.

er such license should be revoked. Provided, however, that such power of cancellation and revocation shall be exercised only under the following conditions:

"(a) For the violation of any of the provisions of this Ordinance; and

"(b) For knowingly permitting the violation of the law or laws of the State of Texas or of the Ordinances of this City.

"SECTION 10: Inspections: The City Council shall appoint or designate an inspector, who may be a member of the City Council, to make periodic inspections of the licensed premises; whose duty shall be to determine compliance with the provisions of this ordinance.

"SECTION 11: If any section, sub-section, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase or word in this Ordinance or application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of the Ordinance and the City Council hereby declares it would have passed such remaining portions of the Ordinance despite such invalidity."

SECTION II: Emergency Clause: The importance of this Ordinance and the absence of any regulation relating to the owning and operation of a pool or billiard table or tables and the levying and collection of an occupation tax thereon creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity and requires that this Ordinance shall take effect and be enforced from and after its passage and it is so ordained.

When salt is withheld from the diets of animals their growth is impaired. Salt is used in the synthesis of protein in the animal's body and thus should be provided free choice to all animals daily.

The use of mulches on vegetables has long been recognized as beneficial in preventing moisture

losses and soil crusting. Mulches also prevent weed growth, results in cleaner vegetables, and holds down soil temperature. Such materials as leaves, rotted hay, straw, paper and plastic may be used.

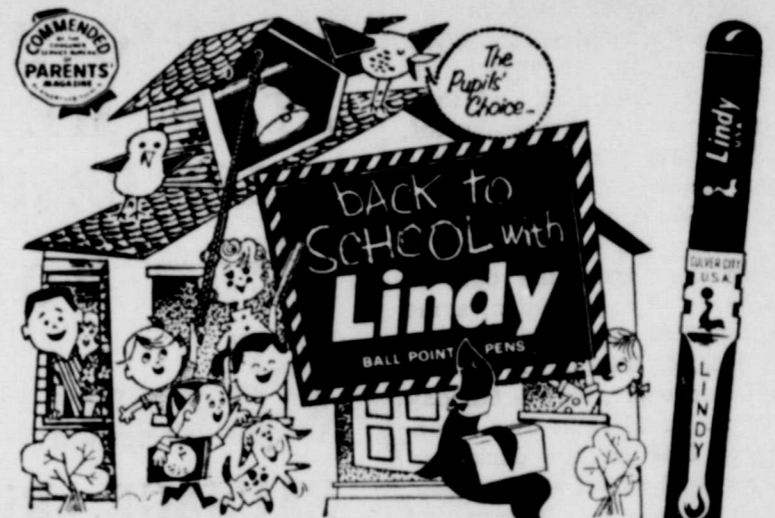
