Clifford Hart announced this week that a new drive-in restaurant which he and his wife are constructing on north Highway 277 in Bronte will be completed in the next couple of weeks.

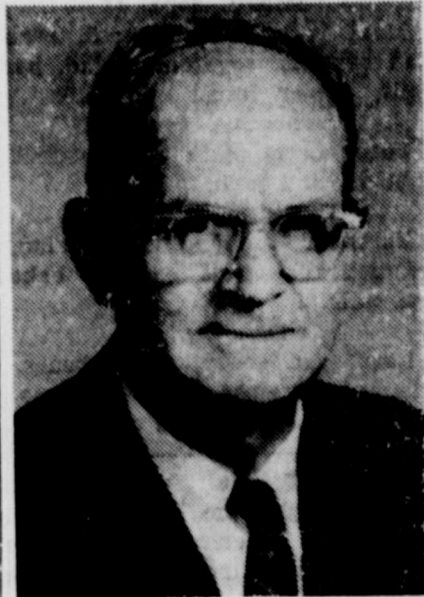
The new eating establishment will be mainly for drive-in curb service, but a dining room will be provided for those who wish to eat inside.

Missionary Will Be Featured Speaker

The Rev. Hubert L. Sone will speak at the First Methodist Church Saturday, Sept. 15, at 7:30 p.m.

Dr. Sone was a missionary in China from 1920 until 1951 when the Christian missionaries were forced out of the country by the communists. The Rev. Austin Masterson, pastor of the church, said that Mr. Sone will show color slides and color-sound movies as he speaks of his experiences. From 1951 to 1962 he was professor of Old Testament and president of the Trinity Theological College, Singapore, Malaya. For 29 years he taught in theological seminaries both in China and Malaya. He retired in 1962.

Dr. Sone is a Texan; born at Denton and his home is now at Fort Worth. During the past year he has been speaking in churches in Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, Oklahoma, Kansas, Illinois, and Wisconsin, under the auspices of the Field Cultivation Department of the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church. Mr. Masterson said that the Methodist Church and Board of Missions called Dr. Sone "out of retirement" to help inform, educate, and inspire church members everywhere to become more understanding and more interested in the general program of missions and to encourage the church people to lend their support to this missionary effort of the church.

The pastor said that a free-will offering will be taken at the meeting Saturday night and that the general public is most cordially invited to attend. The program which Dr. Sone present is just as attractive to children and young people as it is to adults, he added.

Longhorns and Lions Tangle Friday Night

Bronte Longhorns have been hard at it this week in preparation for their game this Friday night with the powerful Class A Ozona Lions. With spirits running high after their 14-14 tie with, and moral victory over, Rankin last Friday, the Longhorns will tackle the Lions at Ozona looking for

their first victory from the host team since 1960.

The Longhorns looked good against Rankin in the season opener, and dopesters say they've improved some this week, so local fans who make the journey to Ozona can look forward to a good show.

Ozona was defeated by McCamey 6-0, when the Lions opened their season last Friday. The Badgers made almost three times as much yardage as the Lions on the ground, but Ozona was superior in its aerial attack.

Kickoff time will be 8 p.m., with the team leaving here about 2:30 p.m. The band bus will depart for Ozona about 4 p.m.

The Longhorns have not had a victory over the Lions since 1960 when they won by a 29-24 score. In 1961, they lost 22-6, and in 1962 were slaughtered 36-0.

Coaches N. M. Curlee and Cecil Tolliver will have their squad at full strength Friday night. Two boys, Alvaro Martinez and Lee Ray Revell, have been dropped from the squad, and two others, Carl Dunklin and Darvin Bradley, have been added to the roster.

Last Rites Held For Mrs. Bennett

Funeral services for Mrs. Cova Clark Bennett, 66, of San Antonio were held Monday at 10 a.m. from First Baptist Church in Bronte. The Rev. Murrell Johns, pastor, officiated. He was assisted by the Rev. Austin Masterson, local Methodist pastor. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery, under direction of Clift Funeral Home of Bronte.

Mrs. Bennett died Saturday at 2 p.m. at her home in San Antonio, following a long illness.

She was born in Bronte April 7, 1897. She was the daughter of a Bronte pioneer physician, Dr. J. F. Clark, and Louvenia Carroll Clark. She graduated from the Bronte schools and attended Simmons College in Abilene.

In 1920, she married Frank R. Petty. Mr. Petty died in 1928, and in 1940, she married Russell M. Bennett. Mr. Bennett died in 1962. Mrs. Bennett, after her first marriage, lived at Necessity and Breckenridge, Texas, and at Okmulgee, Ardmore and other oil field towns in Oklahoma, as her husband was in the drilling business. During World War II she worked as a supervisor in the aviation repair department at Kelly Field, San Antonio.

Mrs. Bennett was a member of the Baptist Church. She was a talented artist and pianist and excelled in handicrafts.

Survivors include one son, Carroll Petty of San Antonio; two sisters, Mrs. Robert Knierim of Bronte and Miss Hettie Clark of San Antonio; two brothers, W. C. Clark of Bronte and Riley G. Clark of Austin; and one granddaughter.

Longhorns Tie Red Devils, 14-14, in Thriller

A rejuvenated bunch of Longhorns took to the field Friday night when the Rankin Red Devils visited here for the season's opening game. The Longhorns didn't beat the Rankin lads but they did hold them to a 14-14 tie, which upset all the dope buckets, as Class A Rankin was highly favored to defeat Bronte.

The Red Devils were superior to the Longhorns on the ground, and the Bronte boys were stand outs in their air attack, which pretty well evened up things. The visitors showed more yards gained at the end of the game, but most of the difference was made in the last ground attack by Rankin, and some passing yardage was added to their total on the last play when they completed a desperation pass, but failed to make it to the goal line.

All the scoring was done in the

first half, with Bronte drawing first blood. Starting from their 34 after the opening kickoff the Longhorns marched up the field, mainly on a fine 33 yard run by Glenn Sims, to the Rankin 29. After one play Quarterback Royce Lee shot a pass to Jimmy Wells in the end zone for 6 points. They reversed the procedure on the extra points try, with Wells tossing to Lee for 2 points.

Rankin quickly came back after the kickoff with a ground drive to the Longhorns 33. From that point QB Roy Winters did a beautiful job of faking a handoff, but kept the ball and ran around his left end to the goal line without a Longhorn touching him. Winters ran over the extra points, also, making the score 8-8.

Shortly after the second quarter began, Rankin started a drive on their own 38. Moving the ball

consistently, Jerry McDonald, outstanding fullback, went over from the 2. McDonald tried to kick the conversion, but it was wide to the right.

With the score standing at 14-8, the Longhorns had some catching up to do, and did it in quick fashion. On the most spectacular play of the contest, Lee tossed a short pass over the line to Halfback Barry Curlee, who took the ball running. He raced up the north sideline, sidestepping and stiff-arming every Red Devil he met, to cross the double stripe and tie the score, 14-14. Sims' extra point run failed, and the score stood at the 14-14 mark for the rest of the game.

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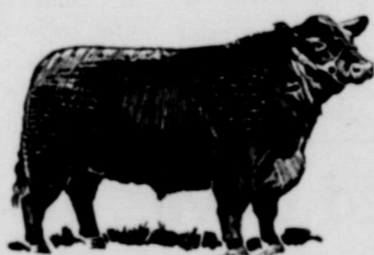

of the game led up to Lee's pass to Wells for the game's first TD, and Wells' pass to Lee for the conversion. Score 8-0, Bronte.

Morrow kicked off to Sammy Bean on the 25, from where the drive started for Rankin's first counter. McDonald, Robert Brummett, Winters and Bean all carried the ball to get it up to Bronte's 33 yard line, where Winters carried from for the TD, and the extra points. Score 8-8.

McDonald kicked off for Rankin. Wells got the ball and ran for good yardage to his own 45. Curlee then carried to the Rankin 46, but Bronte was penalized for offsides, making it 1st and 15 to go. After some unfortunate incidents, such as a fumble and an incompleting pass following the penalty, the Longhorns had to punt. Manuel Reyes got off a beauty that netted 38 yards and placed the ball on the Red Devil 29. The Longhorns almost recovered at that spot but Rankin managed to fall on the ball.

McDonald made 16 yards in two carries, then Winters let go with a pass to Larry Braden. The play gave the Rankin boys a 35 yard gain and a 1st down on the Bronte 20. Curlee got the tackle and prevented another Rankin TD. McDonald carried to the 13, to end the 1st quarter.

2nd Quarter

However, this drive was the one which led up to Rankin's second touchdown of the night, when McDonald went over from the two, but failed to convert. Score, 14-8, Rankin.

Braden kicked for Rankin. Sims took the ball out to the 46 before the Red Devil defenders got him. Lee tossed a long pass intended for Wells, but Brummett intercepted it on his 27. The Rankin team pushed the ball up to their own 48 before they were forced to punt. McDonald kicked the ball to the Longhorn 26. From that point, Curlee took Lee's pass and covered the 74 yards to pay dirt. Score, 14-14.

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Morrow kicked off into the end zone, and Rankin managed to run the ball out to the 20. The Red Devils racked up two more first downs before the end of the half, one on ground gains, and the other on the 19 yard pass.

Third Quarter

Morrow kicked off to Braden and the ball was put into play at the 30. After failing to make the necessary 10 yards, McDonald punted, but Lester Mayberry blocked the ball and covered it on the 22, giving Bronte possession. The Longhorns were in good scoring position and made a first down on the 11 on short gains by Sims, Curlee and Lee. It looked as though they had to score, but a ground loss of 4 and two incomplete passes left them with a 4th down and 14 yards to go. Lee tossed a short pass to Curlee on the 4th, but it was shy of the needed yardage, so the ball went over to Rankin on the 12.

Good ground gains and a 15 yard penalty helped the Red Devils to get up close to midfield. A fumble upset the drive, however, with Wells recovering for the Longhorns on the Bronte 48. The locals set out on a nice march, with Curlee making 7 in two carries, and Reyes carrying for 13 and a 1st on Rankin's 32. Curlee then added 3, Sims went up the middle for 5, and Lee on a keeper went 4 yards for the 1st on the 20. On the next play Sims fumbled the ball and Ronnie Thorn recovered for Rankin.

Braden, who had replaced McDonald at fullback, during the preceding Bronte drive, Bean and Winters took turns carrying the ball, and they did well. On 12 ground carries and a 17 yard pass from Winters to Brummett, they moved the ball down to the Longhorn 5 yard line, where Braden fumbled and Wells made his second recovery of the night for the Longhorns.

Taking over, the Longhorns quickly got the ball out of danger. Lee made 5, Sims added 2, then Curlee scampered 13 yards to the 24 and a 1st down. Reyes added 5, and Curlee and Sims put together enough yardage to give the Longhorns another 1st on the 36.

With the clock rapidly approaching the final second of the game, the Longhorns decided to try a long pass in a last minute effort to untie the game. Kellam Colquitt stepped in the way, however, and intercepted the ball for the Red Devils. Rankin called time out with 2 seconds left on the clock. On the final play of the game, Winters threw the ball to Braden, who headed for pay dirt, but Charles Coppock was in his way and stopped him on the 20 yard line to end the game. Score, 14-14.
