Funeral services were held Saturday for William Henry Frazier, 88, who made his home in Bronte with his daughter, Mrs. Henry Walker. Mr. Frazier died late Thursday night at Pecan Grove Nursing Home in Sweetwater. He had been in ill health for a number of years.

Officiating at the final rites, which were conducted at First Methodist Church in Merkel, was Dr. D. D. Denison, pastor of First Methodist Church in Sweetwater. He was assisted by the Rev. Howard Marcon, pastor of the Merkel church. Burial was in Rose Hill cemetery at Merkel, under direction of Patterson Funeral Home of Sweetwater.

Mr. Frazier was born Feb. 17, 1875 at Belton and moved to the Merkel area when a young man. He was married to the former Fannie McNeese May 19, 1897, in Merkel. Mrs. Frazier died in 1947. Mr. Frazier was a former road contractor and had served as Taylor County Commissioner in the Merkel area.

Survivors include his daughter, Mrs. Walker; a granddaughter, Mrs. J. L. Perry of Austin, and three great-granddaughters.

A business meeting will be held following the supper.

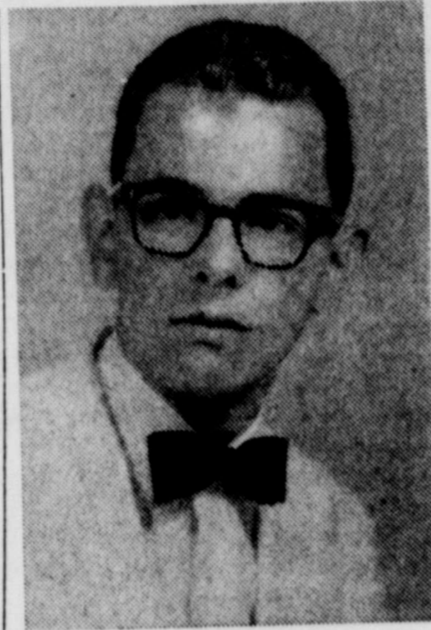

Longhorns Take 12-6 Win From Blanket

Despite the fact that they were penalized 95 yards, the Bronte Longhorns won a victory last Friday night over the Blanket Tigers. Played at Blanket, the game ended up with a 12-6 tally on the scoreboard.

The Longhorn defense had a new luster in the game, allowing the Tigers only 39 yards rushing and 32 in the air. Bronte's offense, in spite of making 233 yards on the ground and 43 passing wasn't able to cross the double stripe but two times. Penalties at critical times was perhaps a major cause of the low score.

Bronte's first counter came shortly after Barry Curlee took the opening kickoff on his 15 yard line and sped down the sideline to the Tiger 5 yard line where he stepped out of bounds. A couple of plays later he carried the ball over, with less than a minute of the game completed. The second counter came in the third quarter

Kenneth Caulder Dies in Accident, Funeral Sunday

Kenneth Edward Caulder, 21, was killed early last Saturday morning in a one-car accident about four miles north of Bronte. Young Caulder was thrown from an automobile being driven by Don Andrews when it turned over. Justice of the Peace J. T. Liles ruled that death was caused by head injuries and a broken neck.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at Central Baptist Church with the Rev. Wayne N. Stout, pastor, officiating. He was assisted by the Rev. Murrell Johns, pastor of First Baptist Church. Burial followed in Fairview Cemetery under direction of Clift Funeral Home.

Caulder was born Nov. 10, 1941, at Loraine. He grew up in Bronte and attended school here. He was married in San Angelo Jan. 8, 1961, to Miss Ava Dehnel. He was a member of Central Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife of Midland; a daughter, Cynthia Ann; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Caulder of Bronte; two sisters, Mrs. Shirley Shaffer of Midland and Jean Caulder of Bronte; three brothers, Doyle Caulder of Texas City, Earl and Wayne Caulder of Bronte; his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Onie Adams of Midland and his paternal grandmother, Mrs. Susie Caulder of Robert Lee.

The fatal accident occurred on a curve north of town. Apparently Andrews lost control of the car as it knocked down several guard posts and then turned over. Caulder was thrown from the vehicle and was about 20 feet from it when it came to a stop. Miss Georgia Owens was in the car with Andrews and Caulder at the time of the accident. She and Andrews were hospitalized at the Bronte Hospital. It is thought that neither was injured seriously. Andrews was released from the hospital Monday. The car was heavily damaged.

Mr. and Mrs. Caulder had another son killed in an accident in 1856. Raymond Caulder was serving in the Navy in Italy and was killed while riding a motorcycle which was in collision with a truck.

TREATMENT FOR SPOTS ON APRICOTS GIVEN

Many Bronte area residents have had lots of damage to apricots during the past few years. A number of persons had most of their apricot crops ruined by spots on the fruit.

Treatment for the trouble is given in a bulletin issued by Texas A & M as follows:

A mixture of 4 lbs. copper sulfate (bluestone) mixed with 100 gallons of water should be used to spray the trees, and at least an hour later the trees should be sprayed again, with hydrated lime, 4 lbs. to 100 gallons of water. The spraying should be done no more than two weeks after the first killing frost. Application of the lime mixture should always follow use of copper sulfate.
