Commissioners Call Election on Keeping Tax

The Commissioners Court Monday called an election to determine whether or not the present ad valorem tax for flood control and farm to market roads shall be renewed or discontinued.

The following information on this tax is furnished by County Judge W. W. Thetford.

The election is to be held at the same time as the election on the state constitutional amendments.

In September 1944 the Upper Colorado River Authority was created by act of the Legislature and the state ad valorem tax from Coke County and Tom Green County was remitted to the Authority for a period of 20 years from that date.

In November 1948 the Legislature submitted a constitutional amendment, which was subsequently ratified by the voters, providing that on or after January 1, 1951, the state tax was abolished. At its regular session in 1949 the Legislature enacted the law putting this into effect, being Article 7048a.

Both the constitutional amendment and this law provided that by vote of its qualified voters a county could continue to collect this tax and the revenues should be used solely for construction and maintenance of farm to market and lateral roads or flood control.

Until all tax remissions similar to that made to the UCRA had expired the tax continued to be collected and the remissions made, but any excess due to in-

Bangs Falls to Longhorns, 14-6

The Longhorn offense completely dominated the first half of the ball game last Saturday at Bangs, ending the half with a 14-0 score. The Dragons roared back after long halftime activities to control the ball most of the second half but able to make only one counter.

It was homecoming for the Bangs folks, and the 14-6 loss on the gridiron was a disappointment to the huge crowd.

Bronte's first TD came on a 10½ yard jaunt by Glenn Sims and Barry Curlee carried over from the 7 yard line for two extra points after the Longhorns were penalized for illegal procedure. The second counter came when Lester Mayberry intercepted a Dragon pass and outran all his pursuers for 50 yards to the double stripe.

Bangs lone touchdown came in the third quarter when Jim Rust bounded over the goal line from the 13 yard line.

First Half

Jim Morrow's kickoff started the ball game with the Dragons starting from their own 30 yard line on the first series of downs. They couldn't move the ball the required 10 yards and backed up to punt. A fumble by the kicker gave the Longhorns a break with possession of the ball on the Dragon 39. Curlee made a 1st down on the first play from scrimmage. Both sides suffered five yard penalties in the next series, but Sims and Curlee moved the ball to the 10½ yard line, from where Sims carried it over for at touchdown right at the start of the ball game. Curlee made the extra points in spite of having to overcome a five yard penalty to get across the goal line.

Once again Morrow kicked off, this time to Henry Ramsey, who got up to his 22 before Curlee nailed him. The Dragons were plagued with penalties and could not go, so they punted on 4th

down. The Longhorns started again and went great guns, with Curlee made a 1st on the Bangs 37, and Sims picking up 9 on the next play. Jimmy Wells kept the ball and went a yard for another 1st. Sims picked up another 4 and Curlee moved for another first. Then Royce Lee got loose for a touchdown, but it was called back and the Longhorns were penalized 15 for holding, making the down 2nd and 2 to go. The local lads were unable to overcome the penalty and the ball went over to the Dragons on their 19.

The Dragons got down to business and moved the ball up the field and across the 50 to Bronte's 45 for a first down. Rust made a short gain, but the play was called back and Bangs was penalized 15 for holding. A pass from Allen to Rust regained 10 of the loss and Rust ran 5 more to make it 3rd and 10 on Bronte's 45 yard line.

A while ago, Wanamaker's Department store, an old landmark in New York, closed its doors. An anonymous, but apparently nostalgic, student dug back into records and found this copy of a notice that appeared on the bulletin board of the store in 1854:

"Store must be open at 6:30 a.m., and remain open until 9:00 p.m. the year round.

"The store must be swept, counters, base shelves and show cases dusted. Lamps trimmed, filled and the chimneys cleaned; pens made; doors and windows opened; a pail of water and a scuttle of coal must be brought in by each clerk, before breakfast if there is time to do so, and attend to customers who call.

"The store must not be open on the Sabbath day unless absolutely necessary, and then only for a few minutes. Any employee who is in the habit of smoking Spanish cigars, getting shaved at the barber shop, going to dances and other places of amusement will surely give his employer reason to be suspicious of his integrity and all-around honesty.

"Each employee must not pay less than \$5.00 per year to the church and must attend Sunday School every Sunday.

"Men employees are given one evening a week for courting purposes, and two if they go to prayer meeting regularly.

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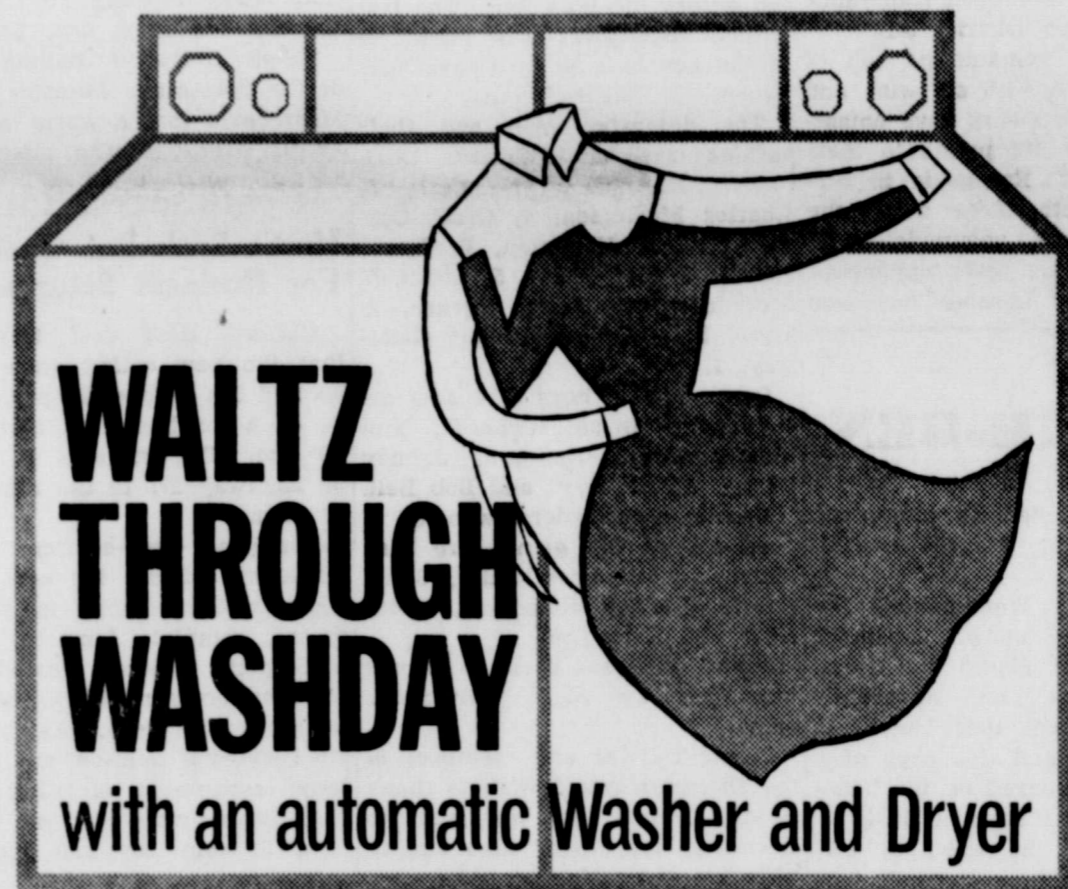

WHEREAS, by an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas adopted at an election on November 2, 1948, being Section 1a of Article 8 of said Constitution, it was among other things provided that from and after January 1, 1951, no State ad valorem tax shall be levied upon any property within the State of Texas for general revenue purposes, and that from and after said date the several counties of said State shall be authorized to levy ad valorem taxes upon all taxable property within their respective boundaries for county purposes, except the first THREE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$3,000) valuation of residential homesteads, not to exceed THIRTY CENTS (30c) on each ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$100) valuation, in addition to all other ad valorem taxes authorized by the Constitution of this State, provided the revenues derived therefrom shall be used for the construction and maintenance of farm-to-market roads or for flood control; and,

WHEREAS, by Chapter 464 Acts of the Fifty-first Legislature at its Regular Session in 1949, being Article 7048a, Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended, the said Legislature made definite and certain the manner and means by which the Commissioners' Court of the various counties of this State should be enabled to place into operation the authority granted by the aforesaid Constitutional provision; and,

WHEREAS, it has been found and determined that Coke County and no political subdivision or

defined area therein has heretofore been granted any tax donations by the State of Texas out of or from any State ad valorem tax; and,

WHEREAS, upon due consideration and investigation this Court has affirmatively found and determined that it will be to the best interest and general welfare of the County to call an election pursuant to the provisions of the aforesaid Article 7048a, for the purpose of determining whether the Commissioners' Court shall be authorized to levy, assess and collect additional County ad valorem taxes, the proceeds thereof to be used for the construction and maintenance of farm-to-market and lateral roads or for flood control, either or both, as the Commissioners' Court may determine; therefore,

**BE IT ORDERED BY THE

That a special election be held throughout said County on the 9th day of November, 1963, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation for their action thereupon:

"SHALL the Commissioners' Court of Coke County, Texas, be authorized to annually levy, assess and collect ad valorem taxes upon all taxable property within said County, except the first THREE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$3,000) valuation of residential homesteads, not to exceed THIRTY CENTS (30c) on each ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$100) valuation of taxable property in said County (until the amount of said maximum tax shall be changed as authorized by law), which tax shall be in addition to all other ad valorem taxes heretofore authorized by the Constitution of the State of Texas, provided the revenues therefrom shall be used for the construction and maintenance of farm-to-market and lateral roads, or for flood control or both, as the Commissioners' Court may determine, all in accordance with the provisions of Section 1a of Article 8 of the Texas Constitution, and Article 7048a, Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended?"

A pass was the Dragon's only hope, so they threw one, but this time Mayberry was in the way and snapped it up. He turned on the speed and outran the pursuing Dragons for 50 yards and the second counter of the evening. Curlee fumbled the ball on the EP try. Score: Bronte 14, Bangs 0. Morrow's kick went to Rust who ran it out to the 29, where he ran over an official, knocking them both to the ground. The next two plays saw Mayberry recover a Bangs fumble and then the Dragons recovered a Bronte fumble on the same spot. The Dragons threw an incomplete pass and then Ramsey carried and fumbled most advantageously for the Dragons. The ball rolled 10 yards for a first down and a Dragon recovered.

The Dragons made 8 yards on their next series, but the Longhorns held on the 4th down try and took possession on their own 48. Another 1 yard holding penalty was meted out to the Longhorns, but Lee made a nice end sweep to recover most of the loss and make it 3rd down and 7. Sims also made a nice gainer for a 1st on the Dragon 35. Manuel Reyes picked up 4 and Sims added another 3. Curlee tried for a 1st but was stopped inches short after gaining 3. The Longhorns didn't make the needed yards after Snider's kickoff so Reyes punted and the Dragons gave the locals a good threat on the drive ahead of them. They moved the ball to the 8 yard line and a 1st down. In the next four tries the Dragons made about 7 of the needed yards, but the Longhorn defense refused to yield, and the Bronte team took over the ball on their 1 yard line.

Bronte carried the ball back out past the midfield stripe, but a fumble gave it to Bangs. The ball game see-sawed back and forth with neither team seriously threatening until late in the fourth quarter, when the Dragons got down to the Bronte 17 before the Longhorn defense once again held. Bronte moved the ball back out in safer territory where it remained until the end of the game. Score: Bronte 14, Bangs 6.

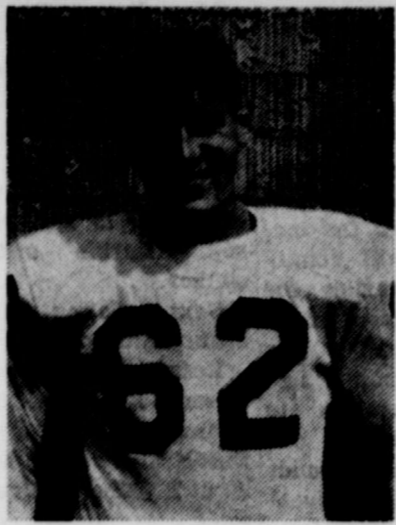

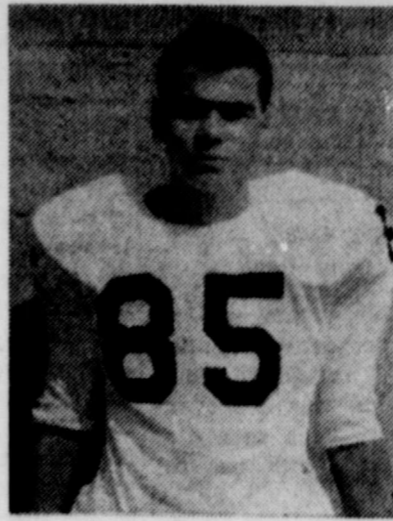

crease in taxable values was returned to the respective counties. In Coke and Tom Green Counties the remission was based upon the tax roll of each county as of 1947, and since our tax roll has increased substantially since that date the greater part of the money available to the county for its farm to market and lateral roads and for flood control has come from that source.

Since this tax remission has now expired, in order for the county to continue to receive these funds, it is necessary for the Commissioners' Court to call an election for that purpose.

Should this election result favorably, it simply means that the status of taxpayers in the county will not be changed in any

manner. The present tax rate will not be changed. Furthermore as in the past, the first \$3,000 valuation of residential homesteads will continue to be exempt from the tax. A taxpayer whose homestead is not rendered for more than \$3,000 and who owns no other taxable property has been and will continue to be wholly exempt from the tax. However, the county will continue to receive the revenues for farm to market and lateral roads and for flood control that it has been getting, plus that part which has heretofore been remitted to the UCRA, which no longer can continue to receive these funds whether the proposal is approved at the election or not. Therefore, the River Authority is in no way being deprived of any money it would otherwise receive.

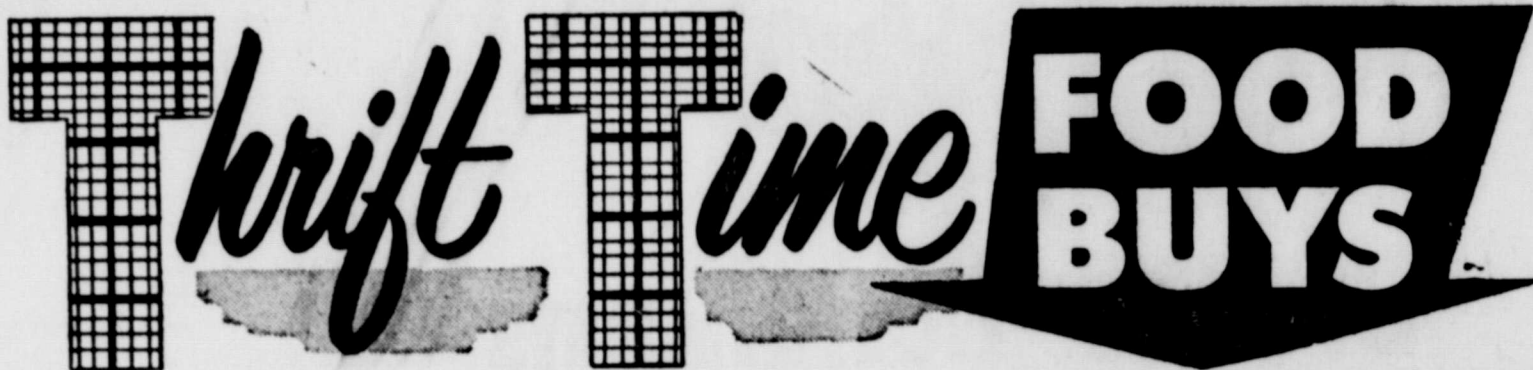
