The Bronte Longhorns will go into their second District 8-B football contest Friday night against the Loraine Bulldogs. The Loraine lads will probably be the stiffest competition the Longhorns

will have to meet until the last game of the season when district leading Robert Lee will invade the local field.

As was stated on the Bronte School's weekly schedule of activities issued Monday, "The Longhorns have to have this one," as the tilt Friday night will in all probability decide who will vie with Robert Lee for the conference championship.

Robert Lee was idle last Friday while Bronte was defeating the Hermleigh Cardinals 48-6, and while Loraine ran over the Trent Gorillas 22-8.

Besides the Bronte-Loraine contest next Friday games will include Hermleigh at Robert Lee and Trent at Rule in a non-conference tilt.

Bronte will miss the services of back Barry Curlee this week. He damaged a leg ligament in the Hermleigh game and is not expected to be ready or action.

DEAR MISTER EDITOR:

I see by th papers where 1964 will be a busy year fer the post offices in the nation. This item says they'll be 34 Senators and 435 House members running fer reelection and they'll mail free approximate 25 million pieces of political mail to their constituents. They just have it toted to the post office and post masters all over the country has to see that it goes to ever "patron" on the rural routes, city routes and to them having boxes. It will cost the taxpayers, this item says, \$1,500,000 to handle this political mail. Of course in these days and times a million and a half dollars is peanuts to the folks back home paying the bill, but they was one angle to this news item that bothers me. How come them Congressmen don't make the Washington post office come after this mail instead of taking it theirselves?

And I was reading another interesting piece from the General Service Administration that was dealing in orbit figgers. Fer example, last year the Congress passed a law that private shipyards had to git at least 35 per cent of the repair work on Navy ships. The Navy shipyards, wanting to hog all the business, spent \$197,000 of the taxpayers money to git a consulting firm to analyze the costs. The Navy was certain the figgers would show they was doing the job cheaper than the private shipyards. But the figgers showed private shipbuilders was doing the job much cheaper. Well, the Defense Department immediate classed the survey as top secret. The cat was let out of the bag when a reporter on a Baltimore paper accidental got hold of a copy and his paper printed it on the front page. Farthermore, when the thing got a little fresh air, it was discovered that the private shipbuilders had conducted the same survey fer \$20,000.

I reckon it would be a sight in this world how many of them 3 billion documents was put in the secret department to keep the taxpayers from knowing the truth. I always thought Government secrets was things we didn't want the enemy to know but it looks like them bureaucrats in Washington has got the taxpayers classed as enemy Number One.

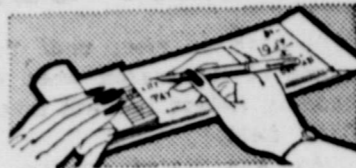

The Bronte Longhorns, in their District 8-B opener last Friday night, gave the Hermleigh Cardinals a good shellacking to the tune of 48-6. The Cardinals fielded the weakest team to come from Hermleigh in many years, and the Longhorns had no trouble with them. Everybody had a chance to get some experience on the field.

Bronte's first counter came early in the first period when Jimmy Wells went through the middle from the 5. Barry Curlee went around right end for 2 extra. Three plays after the start of the second quarter, Tommy Glenn Sims carried the ball over from the 11 for the second counter. Sims also ran the extra points. Quarterback Royce Lee kept the ball on the next touchdown play, going through the middle from the 1. Lee tossed a pass to Larry Corley for the two conversion points. A pass from Lee to Manuel Reyes covered 18 yards and a touchdown for the fourth counter. EP try failed. The first half ended with the score 30-0.

Lee made the fifth counter early in the third quarter when he went on a beautiful long run of 35 yards. Once again the Longhorns couldn't make the extra points. A short time before the end of the third quarter, Lee went through the 1 for another TD. Extra point try was no good. Lee made the final counter of the evening late in the fourth period when he went over the double stripe from the 6 yard line. Conversion failed.

The Hermleigh Cardinals made their lone tally late in the fourth period when Kubala ran from the 10 yard line for 6 points.

First Half

Kubala started the ball game with his kickoff to Curlee who was stopped on his own 28 yard line. The Longhorns moved the ball steadily toward the Hermleigh goal line. Reyes, Curlee, Sims, Wells and Lee carried the ball for steady gains, with the longest of the march a 15 yard gain from the 20 to the 5 by Reyes. It was from that point that Wells made the first touchdown of the evening and Curlee ran over the two extra points. The Longhorns made four 1st downs in carrying the ball the 72 yards from the Hermleigh 28.

Jim Morrow's kick went to Kubala, but Wells brought him down on his 24 yard line. Smith and Kubala made short gains, but the Cardinals had to punt after three tries. Kubala kicked the ball to the Longhorn 20 where Curlee took it and ran it back 28 yards to the Cardinal 42.

Carl Dunklin, Curlee, Lee, Sims and Reyes covered the 38 yards to the double stripe in 11 plays, making three 1st downs in the effort. Sims carried the ball around left end from the 11 yard line, and then ran over the conversion, to make the score 16-0.

Morrow put his toe next to the ball and sent it down to Taylor who was stopped cold on the 21. Kubala then picked up 5, but on the next play the Cardinals fumbled the ball and Wells recovered for Bronte on the Hermleigh 31 yard line. Sims carried twice for a gain of 12 and a 1st down on the 20. A couple of short gains and a pass moved the ball to the 13. Reyes then carried the ball 12 yards for a 1st and goal on the one. Bronte drew a yard penalty, and Lee's pass to Ronnie Johns gained the lost 5 for a 2nd and goal on the 1. Lee carried the ball through the Cardinal middle for the TD. Lee's pass to Corley was good, and the score was 24-0.

Once again Morrow kicked the ball, this time to Chitsey. Line of scrimmage was marked at the 24. The Cardinals picked up 9 yards in three plays, but thanks to the efforts of Lester Mayberry, Corley, Ray Sissom and Charles Coppock, they were forced to punt. The ball came to rest on the Bronte 4 with no return.

The Longhorns started another scoring march, with Sims, Wells and Reyes making good gains. Eight plays netted the Longhorns three 1st downs, the last one being on the Cardinal 18. The Longhorns decided to try the passing route, but two of Lee's tosses went incomplete. On the third try, however, he connected with Reyes who went on in for the end zone for another touchdown. Wells EP try was short. The score stood at 30-0.

Morrow got off his kick and the Cardinals ran two plays before the end of the first half.

Second Half

Morrow kicked off to Brown to start the second half of the football game. Brown was stopped on his 25. The Cardinals were held short by Sims, Bob Strickland, Mayberry, Coppock, Sissom and Morrow in their first three efforts after the kickoff. Kubala punted to Lee, but the play was called back and Bronte was penalized 15 for roughing the kicker. This gave the Cardinals a 1st down on their 45 yard line.

The Cardinals made 9 yards in three carries and decided to try for the 1st. It came up short and Bronte took over the ball on their own 45. Longhorns responsible for

tackles in the series were Mayberry, Strickland, Mike McKown, Morrow, Wells and Sissom.

Wells and Reyes picked up short gains and then Sims got loose for a 13 yard run to the Cardinal 35 and a 1st down. On the next play Lee followed some good blocking and evaded his pursuers long enough to cover 35 yards and cross the goal line. Extra point try failed. Score: Bronte 36, Hermleigh 0.

Morrow kicked to Roemisch, who was brought down by Jerry Don Holcombe. After making 4 yards on the ground, the Cardinals tried a pass, but it was intercepted by McKown who was downed on the 39 yard line of the visitors.

The Longhorns lost a couple of yards, then Hermleigh was penalized 5, putting the ball on the 36 yard line. Lee kept the ball and ran 21 yards for a 1st on the visitors' 15 yard line. Lee then tossed a pass to Corley for another 1st on the 6. Kenny Mayben made 3 yards and Dunklin added two more. Lee then went through the middle from the 1 for the counter. No extra points were made. Score: 42-0.

Morrow's kick was taken by Peterson who was stopped on his 33. On the first play of the series the Cardinals fumbled and Wayne Carlton recovered for the Longhorns on the 28 yard line. Holcombe made a couple of yards and then the Longhorns bogged down. The ball went over to Hermleigh after the locals lost yardage on plays and penalties.

The Cardinals took over the ball on the 42 and began their only scoring drive of the evening.

Brown, Kubala, Peterson and Taylor chalked up three 1st downs in their 42 yard march. Kubala went for the touchdown from his 10 yard line. Smith's extra point try was no good. Score: Bronte 42, Hermleigh 6.

Kubala kicked off, the ball going to Lee. He was stopped on his 38 yard line. Holcombe, Dunklin and Lee carried for the Longhorns but were unable to move the ball but 4 yards. Sims punted a beauty, with the ball rolling out of bounds on the Hermleigh 17 yard line. The Cardinals made three efforts but had to punt. The kick was blocked by Larry Corley, giving the ball to the Longhorns on the 13. A pass from Lee to Carlton was good for 6 and Mayben added another yard to put the ball on the 6. It was from there that Lee ran it over for the final tally of the game.

NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR ADDITIONAL COUNTY AD VALOREM TAXES THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF COKE

WHEREAS, upon due consideration and investigation this Court has affirmatively found and determined that it will be to the best interest and general welfare of the County to call an election pursuant to the provisions of the aforesaid Article 7048a, for the purpose of determining whether the Commissioners' Court shall be authorized to levy, assess and collect additional County ad valorem taxes, the proceeds thereof to be used for the construction and maintenance of farm-to-market and lateral roads or for flood control, either or both as the Commissioners' Court may determine, as provided by Section 1a of Article 8 of the Texas Constitution, and Article 7048a, Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended, in obedience to an order passed by the Commissioners' Court on the 14th day of October, 1963, and which order is in words and figures as follows:

ORDER FOR ELECTION FOR ADDITIONAL COUNTY AD VALOREM TAXES THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF COKE

ON THIS, the 14th day of October, 1963, the Commissioners' Court of Coke County, Texas, convened in regular session at the regular meeting place thereof in the Courthouse at Robert Lee, Texas, the following members of said Court, to-wit: W. W. THETFORD, COUNTY JUDGE, Presiding; and FERN HAVINS, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 1; HOWARD BROCK, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 2; FLOYD HARMON, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 3; JACK CORLEY, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 4; being present and participating, when among other proceedings had by said Court were the following:

Commissioner Havins introduced the following order: WHEREAS, by an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas adopted at an election on November 2, 1948, being Section 1a of Article 8 of said Constitution, it was among other things provided that from and after January 1, 1951, no State ad valorem tax shall be levied upon any property within the State of Texas for general revenue purposes, and that from and after said date the several counties of said State shall be authorized to levy ad valorem taxes upon all taxable property within their respective boundaries for county purposes, except the first THREE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$3,000) valuation of residential homesteads, not to exceed THIRTY CENTS (30c) on each ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$100) valuation, in addition to all other ad valorem taxes authorized by the Constitution of this State, provided the revenues derived therefrom shall be used for the construction and maintenance of farm-to-market roads or for flood control; and,

WHEREAS, by Chapter 464 Acts of the Fifty-first Legislature at its Regular Session in 1949, being Article 7048a, Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended, the said Legislature made definite and certain the manner and means by which the Commissioners' Court of the various counties of this State should be enabled to place into operation the authority granted by the aforesaid Constitutional provision; and,

WHEREAS, it has been found and determined that Coke County and no political subdivision or defined area therein has heretofore been granted any tax donations by the State of Texas out of or from any State ad valorem tax; and,

WHEREAS, upon due consideration and investigation this Court has affirmatively found and determined that it will be to the best interest and general welfare of the County to call an election pursuant to the provisions of the aforesaid Article 7048a, for the purpose of determining whether the Commissioners' Court shall be authorized to levy, assess and collect additional County ad valorem taxes, the proceeds thereof to be used for the construction and maintenance of farm-to-market and lateral roads or for flood control, either or both, as the Commissioners' Court may determine; therefore,

BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF COKE COUNTY, TEXAS:

That a special election be held throughout said County on the 9th day of November, 1963, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation for their action thereupon:

"SHALL the Commissioners' Court of Coke County, Texas, be authorized to annually levy, assess and collect ad valorem taxes upon all taxable property within said County, except the first THREE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$3,000) valuation of residential homesteads, not to exceed THIRTY CENTS (30c) on each ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$100) valuation of taxable property in said County (until the amount of said maximum tax shall be changed as authorized by law), which tax shall be in addition to all other ad valorem taxes heretofore authorized by the Constitution of the State of Texas, provided the revenues therefrom shall be used for the construction and maintenance of farm-to-market and lateral roads, or for flood control or both, as the Commissioners' Court may determine, all in accordance with the provisions of Section 1a of Article 8 of the Texas Constitution, and Article 7048a, Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended?"

That said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 464, Acts of the Fifty-first Legislature at its Regular Session in 1949, being Article 7048a, Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V. A. T. C. S. Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

"FOR THE TAX OF NOT EXCEEDING THIRTY CENTS (30c) ON EACH ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$100) VALUATION"

"AGAINST THE TAX OF NOT EXCEEDING THIRTY CENTS (30c) ON EACH ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$100) VALUATION"

AS TO THE foregoing proposition, each voter shall mark out the statement FOR the proposition or the statement AGAINST the proposition, so that the statement remaining shall indicate the way he wishes to vote.

NONE but those who are qualified property taxpaying voters in said County and who have duly rendered their property for taxation shall be entitled to vote at said election.

THE POLLING PLACES and presiding officers of said election shall be, respectively, as follows:

Precinct Number 1: Courthouse, Robert Lee, Texas; Jessie Yarbrough;

Precinct Number 2: City Hall, Bronte, Texas; Matthew Caperton;

Precinct Number 4: Schoolhouse, Tennyson Community; Bert Cornelius;

Precinct Number 5: Fred McCabe Ranch (Divide Community); Fred McCabe;

Precinct Number 7: Schoolhouse, Sanco Community; J. L. Carwile, Jr.;

Precinct Number 8: Schoolhouse, Silver Community; Robert Walker;

Precinct Number 9: Community Center, Green Mountain Community; Fennell Smith;

Precinct Number 11: R. V. Copeland Residence (Olga Community); R. V. Copeland;

Precinct Number 13: Schoolhouse, Lometa Community; Chester Harwell;

Precinct Number 15: Schoolhouse, Juniper Community; Homer Cornelius.

ABSENTEE VOTING shall be conducted at the County Clerk's Office in the Courthouse, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 424, Acts of the 58th Legislature, Regular Session, 1963.

THE COUNTY JUDGE shall cause notice of said election to be posted at the Courthouse door and at a public place in each voting precinct in said County not less than fourteen (14) days next before said election, and to be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said County, the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

A SUBSTANTIAL COPY of this order shall serve as proper notice of said election.

The above and foregoing order having been read in full, it was moved by Commissioner Corley and seconded by Commissioner Brock that the same do pass. Thereupon, the question being called for, the following members of the Court voted "AYE": Commissioners Havins, Brock, Harmon and Corley; and none voted "NO".

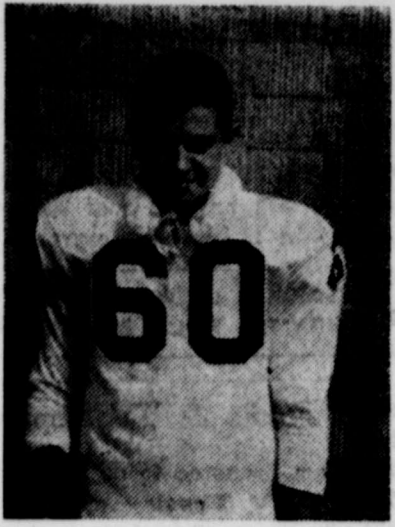
