The charter was presented to Wayne Dunnam, Bronte president, by Grant. Henry presented Dunnam with a gavel which he made. Dunnam talked to the group about prospective projects to be undertaken by the local group.

James Franklin, inter-club director for the Haskell chapter, spoke briefly to the crowd and welcomed the Bronte chapter into the Texas organization. A word of welcome was also given by President Tate in his address. Tate said there are more than 275 Jaycee Chapters in Texas, the largest number of any state in the U. S.

# Bronte, R-Lee Meet Friday

Bronte Longhorns and Robert Lee Steers, traditionally strong rivals on the football gridiron, will meet here at 7:30 p.m. Friday in the last game of the season for both teams.

The Steers are heavily favored to win the ball game, as this year they are fielding one of the strongest teams ever to come from this area. They have worn the No. 1 B team in the state brand almost from the start of the 1963 season.

Upsets are popular in the annual Bronte-Robert Lee rivalry but one is not expected this year.

The Longhorns have been plagued with injuries the past several weeks, and only last week, Quarterback Royce Lee and Halfback Barry Curlee had to be taken out of the game with Trent due to leg injuries.

A report from school Wednesday afternoon said that Curlee and Glenn Sims will definitely be out when the Steers invade the local field. Lee expects to be ready to start in spite of his injuries.

Robert Lee holds first place in District 8-B by virtue of a 16-12 defeat last week of the Loraine Bulldogs. In season play, they have racked up 371 points to their opponents' 33. In district they have made 88 to the oppositions 12, Loraine being the only 8-B team to score against them.

Bronte leads opponents in season play by 138-122, and in district contests the Longhorns have made 54 points to their opponents' 50. Bronte and Trent are tied for third place in District 8-B.

# Shorthorns District 8-B Champs

The mighty Bronte Shorthorns came through in their usual fine style Monday night in the last game of the season by defeating the Robert Lee Dogies 24-8 and keeping in tact their perfect record of no ties and no defeats. The Shorthorns won the District 8-B junior high championship when they downed the Dogies.

Robert Lee drew first blood when Gary Sam Williams com-

pleted a pass and ran half the length of the field for a Robert Lee touchdown. A pass play was good for the extra points and the Steers went ahead 8-0.

The Shorthorns were quick to counter attack however, and Jerry Parker caught a pass from David Glenn to open the Bronte scoring with a 23 yard play and a touchdown. Doug McCutchen rambled over for the extra points

which tied up the ball game. The score remained at 8-all through the first half.

The second counter came on the same play as did the first, with Glenn tossing to Parker who made it across the double stripe. McCutchen scooted around right end for the conversion. The score stood at 16-8.

The third tally came on a dive play by McCutchen, and Glenn ran across for the extra points, to make the score 24-8. The Longhorns held for the remainder of the game in spite of a desperate passing attack by the Dogies.

Two of the top defensive men for the Shorthorns were David Gentry and Davis Corley. However the entire squad turned in an outstanding performance and all the team members got to play in this final and championship game.

The Bronte Junior High Band accompanied the team to Robert Lee and played during the game. It was their first out-of-town appearance.

1¼ cups of milk  
3 cups of Bisquick  
1½ cups of chopped nuts (1 cup of pecan, ½ cup unsalted peanuts)  
Heat oven to 350°.  
Mix in first four ingredients. Beat well. Stir in nuts. Bake 45 to 50 minutes, until tooth pick

stuck into center comes out clean. Crack in top is typical. Cool before slicing.

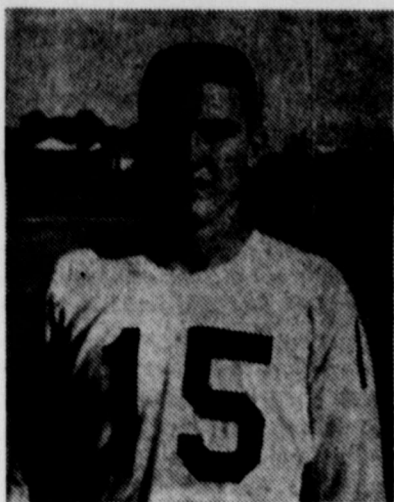

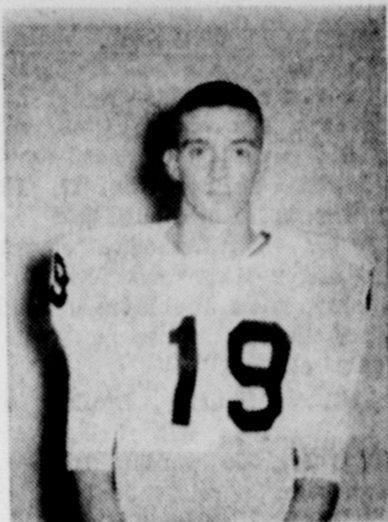

Coke County went along with the rest of the State of Texas last Saturday in a special election to give a majority to only one of the four amendments on which voters balloted. A second special election was also held in this county and voters decided to keep the 30 cent ad valorem tax which has been in effect for 20 years.

A light turnout voted heaviest against the amendment to abolish the poll tax as a requirement for voting. The count on this first amendment on the ballot was 146 for and 312 against. The second amendment, to provide more money for assistance to the aged and others, was the only one that passed in this county as well as over the entire state. The count was 248 for and 190 against.

The third amendment, to per-

mit subdivisions of Jefferson County to set up a pension plan for employees, was defeated here, 127-257. The fourth amendment on the ballot, which would have provided for issuance of \$150,000,000 in additional bonds to finance the Veterans Lang Program, almost passed in Coke County, with 206 voting for and 213 against.

The election to continue collecting a 30 cent ad valorem tax in this county, carried better than two to one, with 292 voting for it and 137 against. The money collected under this special tax provision is earmarked to be used only for road building and maintenance and flood control.

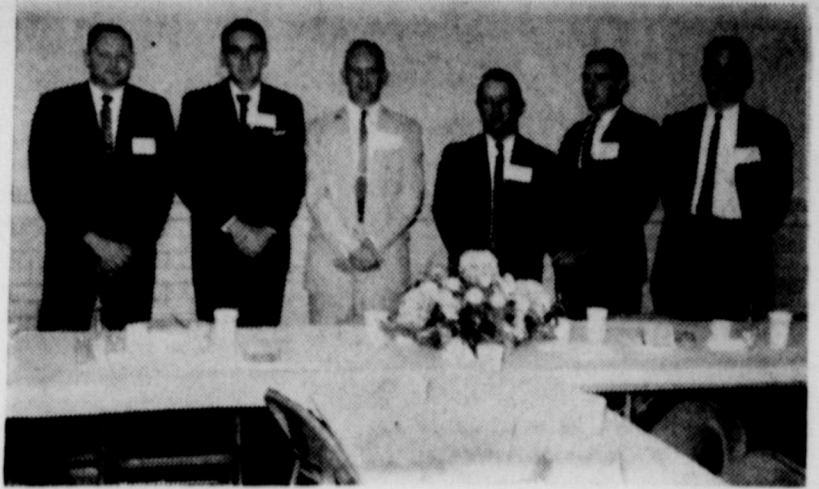
A reward is to be posted for apprehension and conviction of anyone stealing livestock, and the organization is to meet from time to time for consultation.

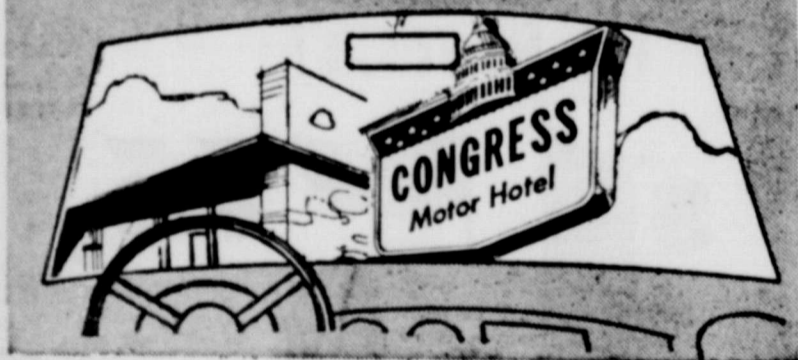

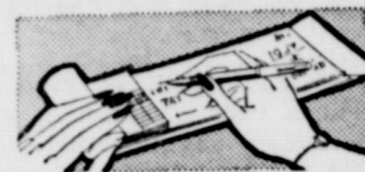
