Sam Williams Buys Funeral Homes at Bronte, Robert Lee

A deal was completed late last week whereby Sam Williams of Robert Lee became the owner of Clift Funeral Homes in Robert Lee and Bronte. Williams has been employed by Clift for the past eight years. Also included in the sale was Clift Ambulance Service.

W. B. Clift, who is presently a patient in a San Angelo hospital, operated the business in Robert Lee from 1935 until the present and bought out Frank Keeney in Bronte in 1947.

Mr. Clift, who grew up in the Fort Chadbourne area, went to Robert Lee as a young man and has been engaged in business there since that time. He worked for the W. K. Simpson Company and also operated a service station back during the depression.

Williams received his funeral director's license after completing a course of study at the Dallas Institute of Gupton-Jones College of Mortuary Science, in 1949.

Williams was born in Virginia, moved to Texas with his parents when he was about one year old. He has lived in Coke County the past 42 years. He is married to the former Ruth Casey, a Robert Lee native, and has two sons. Sherman lives at Silver, and Gary Sam, 14, is a student in Robert Lee Junior High. Williams has been a star route mail carrier between Robert Lee and Silver and Sanco the past several years.

County Receives TB Certification

A certificate has been received announcing Coke County's reaccreditation as a Modified Accredited Tuberculosis area, according to a press release from the office of Dr. R. G. Garrett, executive director of the Texas Animal Health Commission.

County Agent Sterling Lindsey has received the certificate, which is good for six years.

Dr. Garrett said, "The Commission wishes to express its appreciation to the people of Coke County for the splendid cooperation extended its representatives while work was being conducted in Coke County, and requests the further cooperation of the citizens of the area to maintain the tuberculosis status of the county."

BROTHER DIES

Mrs. F. S. Higginbotham, accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Jack Hamilton of Dallas, returned from Altus, Okla., Monday after attending funeral services for Mrs. Higginbotham's brother, O. W. (Bill) Hutcheson, 65.

Mr. Hutcheson was a former resident of Bronte, having grown up here. He died at 3:30 a.m. Saturday of a heart attack. Burial was at Hess, Okla., near Altus.

Prolific Discovery Near Norton

A prolific producer was finaled by Karl Hoblitzelle on the Jack Herring ranch southeast of Norton.

The Hoblitzelle No. 1-42 Jack B. Herring was finaled for a daily flowing potential of 624 barrels of 42 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 1.080-1. The test flowed naturally through a 17-64-inch choke and open hole between 3,828 feet, where 4½-inch casing was set, and 3,833 feet, the total depth. Tubing pressure was 415 pounds while casing pressure registered 120 pounds.

This is a new discovery in the Cross Cut section and operator has suggested that the field be

designated as Ronald Perkins (Cross Cut).

The 1-42 Herring was completed from an abandoned hole which was re-entered. It was originally drilled by L. R. Allison of Abilene and was abandoned in July, 1956, at a depth of 3,210 feet. Location is 1,661.3 feet from the west and 1,264.4 feet from the south lines of R. K. Wylie No. 42.

Hoblitzelle will re-enter another failure 2,100 feet south-southwest of the discovery. It is the No. 1-2 Jack B. Herring "42." It will be deepened from 3,200 feet to 4,500 feet. Originally drilled by Duncan Drilling Co., it was abandoned in October, 1962.

2-Inch Rainfall Brightens Area

Welcome rains Tuesday morning brought smiles and raised spirits of people in this area. Highest amount reported to The Enterprise was 2.9 inches east of Tennyson, but most everybody received two inches or more.

Farmers and stockmen say the outlook for agriculture in this area is much improved by the rain. It's getting pretty late to sow grain, some said, but many who already have seed in the ground are expecting the moisture to give the boost needed. Par-

ticularly if mild weather continues for several more days, they expect the winter pastures to grow enough to give them some grazing after the first of the year. A hard freeze right now wouldn't help matters at all, they said.

Heaviest rainfall was reported east of Tennyson by John Clark who received 2.9 inches. Mrs. W. H. Thomas reported that her government gauge showed 2.2 inches. She lives in the Tennyson community also.

South and west of Bronte across the river, C. E. Arrott had 2.6 inches. Renza Lee who lives in the Maverick community reported 2.5 inches.

North of town R. C. Lasswell had 1.9 inches while F. S. Higginbotham received 2.1. C. H. Wylie, who ranches northeast of town, also had 2.1 inches.

The last sizeable rain received here was on Aug. 31 when 2½ inches fell in Bronte. It did not cover a wide area, however, as did the rain this week.

The Tuesday morning moisture started falling about 1:30 a.m. and was accompanied by violent electrical displays, unusual here for this time of year. The rain continued until almost 6 a.m.

Water was running curb deep on the north side of Main Street at 5 a.m. and the storm sewer which carried water from Main under Highway 277 was unable to carry the heavy flow. Water was running across the intersection.

It was reported that Oak Creek Lake caught about six inches of water in the runoff. West Texas Utilities Oak Creek plant reported two inches of rain.

Bronte Fans Plan To Attend Bi-Dist. Tilt Friday Night

A number of Bronte football fans have indicated they plan to attend the bi-district playoff game between Robert Lee and Knox City. The game is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Friday at Sweetwater.

The Steers earned the right to represent District 8-B by going through the entire district schedule, as well as all non-district games, without a defeat. Knox City will represent District 7-B.

The Knox City team does not have as good a season record as do the Steers. They won seven games and had three defeats. However, they did go through district play with three wins and no losses.

Derwood Coalson, star halfback for the Steers, wound up regular season play as the area's leading scorer. Coalson made a total of 21 touchdowns and 14 extra points for a total of 140 points in ten games. Rusty Dodson, Steer fullback, was fourth high area scorer with a total of 124 points.

Last week's games in District 8-B included the Robert Lee and Bronte tilt, with the Steers coming out on top 28-0, and Trent defeated Hermleigh 22-0. Loraine had an open date.

Final district standing placed the five District 8-B teams as follows: 1st, Robert Lee, 2nd Loraine, 3rd, Trent, 4th, Bronte, and 5th, Hermleigh.

New double-faced fabrics have made their appearance this season.

Two fabrics are now bonded together with an adhesive that makes the fabrics act as one. This method of fabric bonding eliminates the cost of the complex weaving processes used in making reversible fabrics.

The bonded fabrics are used in many ways. Wood fabrics are anchored to an acetate tricot lining for suits, coats and dresses, and there is a denim fabric backed with terry cloth for sportswear. A woven wool coating is bonded to cotton poplin for raincoats, and a tweed reverses to pile for warm winter coats.

The double faced fabrics are available as piece goods.

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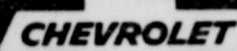

Longhorns Lose 28-0 To District Champs

Bronte Longhorns were beaten but unbowed after last Friday night's game with the Robert Lee Steers. The mighty Steers, unbeaten this entire season, downed the Longhorns, 28-0, and earned the right to represent District 8-B in a bi-district game Friday night with Knox Cty. The bi-district contest will be played at Sweetwater at 7:30 p.m.

The Steers made a touchdown in each quarter of the game. The Longhorns made one touchdown in the third quarter, but the play was called back because the referee had blown his whistle before Darvin Bradley lateraled a kickoff ball to Barry Curlee who went down the field and outran all his pursuers.

The Longhorns played the game against the Steers with two men who had never played in the backfield before. Lee Ray Revell played in the halfback slot while Charles Coppock filled the full-

back position. Both players did well in their new spots on the gridiron. Coppock picked up yards most every time he carried the ball through the middle of the Steer line. Revell had a field day, intercepting Steer passes and completing several from his own quarterback, as well as making good ground gains.

Jimmy Wells, Bronte senior back, has also been carrying an injured leg around most of the season, but managed to play most of the game with the Steers.

Local fans, for the most part, conceded that Robert Lee had the superior team, but felt the score would have been closer if the Longhorn backfield had been at full strength. Tommy Glenn Sims, fullback, was completely out for the game, while Quarterback Royce Lee and Halfback Barry Curlee were in part of the time but were not up to their usual action because of injuries.

The Longhorn defense was superb and held the Steers on a

number of threatening drives. The Steers are well known this season for their fine end sweeps, but this maneuver was not so successful last Friday as it has been with most of their 1963 opponents.

Mike McKown, junior guard, got more than his share of tackles for the evening. Other Longhorns who showed up well on defense included Jim Morrow, Revell, Larry Corley, Bob Strickland, Carl Dunklin, Lester Mayberry, Coppock, Ron Johns, Ray Sissom and Jimmy Wells.

Lynn White made the first touchdown for the Steers, going over from the 3 yard line. This counter came after a punt exchange following the kickoff. The extra points try was no good.

The second counter for the Steers came late in the second quarter when Robert Wink tossed a pass to White from about the 12 yard line. Rusty Dodson went through the middle for two points, and the score was 14-0 at the half.

The Longhorns threatened in the third period after Jimmy Wells got off a beauty of a quick kick which went out on the Steer 13. The Longhorns, with the aid of a penalty, held the Steers for three downs and the visitors were faced with a 4th and 14 situation. Dennis Gartman punted the ball out to his own 38 where the Longhorns took possession. Mainly the result of an 11 yard run by Wells, the local lads made a 1st down on the Steer 19. They were penalized 5 yards for offsides and were unable to get the ball any further than the 15 where it went over to the Steers.

Derwood Coalson ran 13 yards for a 1st, then he took a pass from Wink and made it all the way to the Bronte 5 before McKown pulled him down. Dodson carried for a couple of short gains and then Coalson went over from the 1 foot line. Dodson added the two extras.

In the fourth period of play the Steers scored again. This time the counter was set up by a couple of passes from Wink to Gartman and Holland which left the ball on the Bronte 1 yard line. Wink kept the ball and picked up the necessary amount to cross the double stripe.

A pass try was no good for the points after touchdown.

Seniors on the Bronte squad served as captains for Friday night's game, which was the last one for this season.

Women Included This Year In Conservation Awards

The Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A & M University System is cooperating with the Fort Worth Press in their nineteenth annual conservation award program—"Save the Soil and Save Texas."

The purpose of the program is to recognize achievements of rural women of Texas in the area of conservation of human material resources and to inspire others to cooperate in good conservation practices.

Each county in a Soil Conservation District may have one rural woman entered in regional judging per district. Coke County can have two entries. To be eligible she must live on a farm or ranch (either tenant or owner) that has a conservation plan with the local Soil Conservation District. Each contestant will prepare a record of the conservation practices carried out in the home and on the farm or ranch.

A county contest has been planned by the SCS supervisors. County winners will then enter records in the district contest which will be in February.

Any homemaker who desires more information on the contest is advised to contact Mrs. Fay C. Roe, County Home Demonstration Agent, or W. E. Jacoby of the county SCS office.

County Agents News Column

By STERLING LINDSEY

The Coke County Livestock Protective Association is duly organized now, with officers, directors, and rules and regulations in force. The organizations membership, though in its infancy, has increased steadily. The directors hope every stockman in the County will study the program and its purpose. They believe the program can mean a lot to the county — particularly if a large number of operators join the group.

The screwworm is still not out of the picture. In the State, the last report received showed 349 cases three more than the previous week. One of the cases was from Tom Green County.

An outbreak now could prove most costly to the program. If the screwworm gets a chance to overwinter in this area, next spring may be like starting over — this years work could be lost. With this possibility in mind, we should report all worm cases found. So far all Coke County cases have been declared non-screwworm during the past four months. Coke County's last confirmed screwworm case was confirmed on July 3. We have had a total of 20 cases confirmed during the year.

Chemicals have been used against agricultural pests since earliest times. Homer described the

use of sulfur to destroy crop pests more than 3,000 years ago. Paris Green and Bordeaux mixture was used in the mid 1800s to control pests.

We are nearing the number of herds required for Coke County to be certified as Modified Brucellosis free. Mr. Charles Parks, of Sweetwater, who is testing Coke County at the present time, stated recently that only three herds remain from the list of suspect or reactor herds of the first test. He expects to complete Coke County at the convenience of the operators concerned and by our deadline in January.
