




New double-faced fabrics have made their appearance this season.

The bonded fabrics are used in many ways. Wood fabrics are anchored to an acetate tricot lining for suits, coats and dresses, and there is a denim fabric backed with terry cloth for sportswear A woven wool coating is bonded to cotton poplin for raincoats, and a tweed reverses to pile for warm winter coats


