Bronte Mourns Passing of President

AD-LIB-BEN

It's a dirty, black shame that such a young man, such a brilliant, gallant and personable leader as President John F. Kennedy had to die so violently and unexpectedly, at the hand of a ne'er-do-well who had managed to get together \$12.78 to buy himself a gun. The President's passing has left a vacuum in the hearts of most of us, both those who supported him and those who opposed him. We feel as Paul Crume, well known front page columnist for the Dallas News who put his feeling quite picturesquely in his Big D Column, when he wrote that for the rest of his life when this incident is mentioned he would feel as if somebody hit him in the pit of his stomach with a doubled up fist.

A heinous crime like this should call us to do some soul searching as to why it happened. Why is it that a 24 year old man can harbor so much hatred for his country and its system of government as to commit a crime of this kind?

The fatal shot could hardly have been fired against John F. Kennedy, personally, for the man who was accused of committing the act, before he, too, was gunned down, probably had never met the President or Texas Governor Connally, whom he also attempted to assassinate. This man must have been shooting at Mr. Kennedy as a symbol of the government of the United States of America. The very system which made the killer so angry makes it possible for such things to happen. A character such as he would never get to first base with such a crime in a country ruled by the totalitarianism which he allegedly thought such a fine system. He probably wouldn't be allowed to own a weapon such as he used on our President and our Governor.

The cowardly deed is done, the man whom police say did it is dead, and we must look ahead to the future with our new President, Lyndon Baines Johnson.

As voters and as a newspaper, we have always supported Mr. Johnson. In 1960, we considered him the man for the job which Mr. Kennedy won. Back in those days, if you will recall back three years ago, before he took a back seat to the President, Mr. Johnson was called by many writers and speakers as the most powerful man in this country. He ran the U. S. Senate for six years of the eight-year Eisenhower administration. He did a good job and was labelled the strongest majority leader in Senate history. It was not a small group at the 1960 Democratic convention who thought that Lyndon B. Johnson was the best qualified man for the job as President of the United States. But Mr. Kennedy won the nomination, and prevailed upon Mr. Johnson to become his running mate.

That decision by the late President exhibited not only a superb bit of political acumen, but also a superb bit of statesmanship in selecting the man to take his place in case of a catastrophe such as happened last Friday.

Mr. Johnson has a congressional record which puts him in good

Bronte business firms were open early Monday morning but most of them closed by 11 o'clock, the hour announced for the funeral of the late President John F. Kennedy. A few businesses, the city hall, post office and the local schools were closed all day.

The closing was done in compliance with the request of the new President Lyndon B. Johnson, who proclaimed Monday as a national day of mourning as his first official act. He was sworn into the office Friday shortly after the assassination of President Kennedy.

A memorial service was held at 11 a.m. Monday at First Baptist Church in Bronte. Leading the service were the Rev. Murrell Johns, pastor and the Rev. Wayne N. Stout, pastor of Central Baptist Church.

Persons from all denominations in Bronte were invited to the service. It was planned following President Johnson's request that people all over the land gather in their places of worship to pray for our country and to re-dedicate themselves to making it and the world a better place in which to live. The two ministers followed the President's request in holding the services. The First Methodist Church sanctuary was open all day Monday for anyone who wanted to visit it.

Bronte, like all the nation, was stunned and unbelieving last Friday when news flashed over radios and televisions that President Kennedy and Texas Governor John Connally had been shot as they were riding together in an open car on a Dallas street. Flags at the post office and school were lowered to half mast as soon as word came through that the President was dead.

It was hard Friday afternoon and all the rest of the weekend to find another topic of conversation. Everybody was interested only in this terrible crime and its impact upon this nation.

(Editor's note: The following Thanksgiving editorial was written by Chaplain (Capt.) John I. Hargrafen, Catholic chaplain of Goodfellow Air Force Base at San Angelo. In spite of the dastardly blow which was struck against all law abiding citizens of this country last Friday, we have much left for which to be thankful. Read what Chaplain Hargrafen says about it.)

The fourth Thursday in November is set apart each year in the United States of America for thanksgiving and praise to God as a public acknowledgment of divine goodness and mercies.

The first American Thanksgiving Day was celebrated in 1621 during the second winter the Plymouth colonists spent in the New World. It was a day of feasting and prayer, to show the gratitude of the colonists that they were still alive. The custom spread from Plymouth to other colonies, and since 1863 it has been a national observance. The New England Thanksgiving in the middle of the 19th century featured a community raffle of fowls on Thanksgiving Eve, and a shooting match in the morning. Today, the trend is to family activities.

There will be many editorials written and many sermons delivered during the next few days on the subject of America's reason for giving thanks. To each writer and to each speaker there will be some particular reason for the call to Thanksgiving. This is as it should be because to every segment of our society there have come advantages and opportunities of specific benefit and appeal. 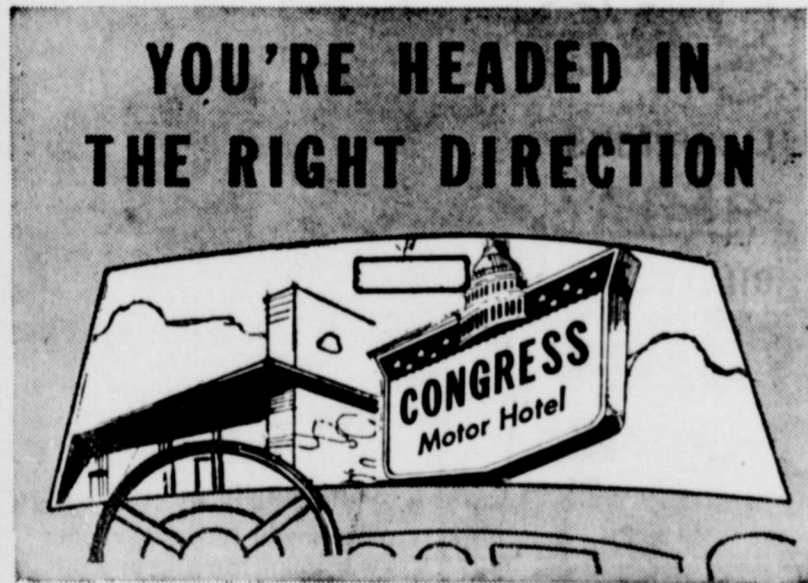

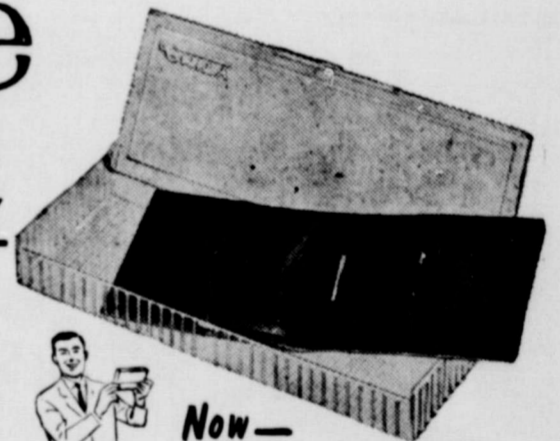

He died of bullet wounds received while in a motorcade to a speaking engagement at the Dallas Mart.

Also shot by the sniper and seriously injured was Texas Governor, John Connally, who was riding with the President.

Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson, in keeping with customary security measures, was in another car. He was unharmed.
