The dams which are being financed by the federal government as a flood control project, will prevent devastating floods which have taken a heavy toll of property damage on two occasions in recent years.

Farm Electrification Course to Be Offered

A Farm Electrification short course on electric motors for adult farmers will be held Jan. 13-14-15-16 under sponsorship of Bronte high school VA department, according to Supt. C. B. Barbee and J. T. Henry, vocational agriculture teacher. The course will be a follow-up to a similar course taught here last year.

Bob Jaska, Farm Electrification specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M, will instruct the course. Jaska, headquartered at A&M, also taught the course here last year.

He holds a master's degree in agricultural engineering. Since 1947 he has been prominent in research work in Farm Electrifi-

cation at A&M in addition to teaching Farm Electrification in the college. His research and field work have carried him over the entire state and he is very familiar with all types of electrical problems on the farm.

"Many Farm Electrification short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Mr. Jaska and all have met with outstanding success," said Hulan Harris of Big Spring, area VA supervisor. Arrangements for the course were made through his office.

The short course here is scheduled to begin at 7 p.m. Monday, Jan. 13, continuing for four sessions. During the dates he is here Jaska will be available to assist farmers with individual

Increase Noted in Bank Deposits Here

Deposits of First National Bank in Bronte in a statement Dec. 20 showed a substantial increase over deposits listed in a statement in December 1962. Likewise, the amount of money on deposit Dec. 20 showed a big increase over the amount shown on the September statement.

Deposits Dec. 20 were \$2,608,584.93 compared with \$2,559,714.33 a year ago, an increase of \$48,792.60. The increase over the September 30 figure was \$223,121.31.

Loans on Dec. 20 were up from a year ago, but down from September. Amount out on loan at the last statement was \$779,239.37 compared with \$724,025.22 in December 1962, an increase of \$55,214.15, but was down \$79,974.62 from the \$859,213.99 on Sept. 30.

Capital structure of the First National continued to increase with the undivided profits account amounting to \$133,129.30 at the Dec. 20 call. This sum plus the \$50,000 capital stock and \$150,000 surplus account gives the bank a total capital structure of \$333,129.30.

During the past ten years the deposits at the local bank have held fairly steady, running close to the \$2½ million mark. An all time high on the date of a statement of condition was dated in December 1954 when deposits totaled \$3,398,672.91. This was an abnormal condition, however, because a large sum of bond money

was on deposit which was paid out a short time later.

According to Enterprise files, the First National Bank reached the over \$1 million deposits mark in its December statement in 1945. Five years later, in 1950, the \$2 million mark was achieved, according to the statement at the end of that year.

L. T. Youngblood has headed the local bank as president since 1922, and in more recent years has also been chairman of the board of directors. When he became president, deposits totaled a little more than \$150,000. Other officers include Earl F. Glenn, executive vice president; B. D. Snead, vice president and cashier; Mrs. Charlie Boecking, assistant cashier. Directors include Youngblood, Glenn, R. E. Cumbie, D. K. Glenn, J. B. Mackey, Edward Rawlings and W. B. Middleton.

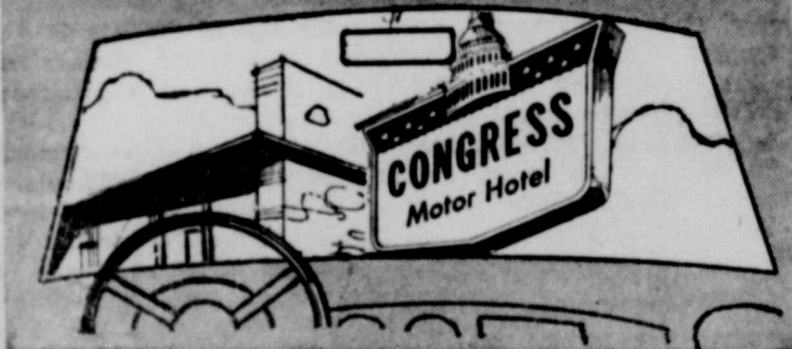

Brief Summary of Amendments to the Texas Motor Vehicle Safety-Responsibility Act, Effective January 1, 1964—Prepared for Members Texas Association Of Insurance Agents

In any accident in which a person is killed or injured, or where there is damage to the property of any one person to an apparent extent of at least \$25 or more, the operator of every motor vehicle involved is required within 10 days to report the accident in writing to the Department of Public Safety, 5805 N. Lamar Blvd., P. O. Box 4087, North Austin Station, Austin, Texas. If the accident involved death, personal injury or damage to one person's property of at least \$100, the accident then comes under the Safety Responsibility Act and its provisions must be met.

Security and proof not required of person legally stopped at traffic signal at time of accident.

Reciprocity provisions made applicable to suspension for failure to file proof of financial responsibility.

Licenses, registrations and non-resident operating privileges may be restored after suspension for non-payment of judgments, by filing evidence with the Department of Public Safety showing that there was valid insurance in effect at the time of the accident, and by filing an affidavit stating that the insurer is liable to pay such judgment and the reason, if known, why the insurer has not paid same.

Requires proof of financial responsibility where person pleads guilty to certain offenses.

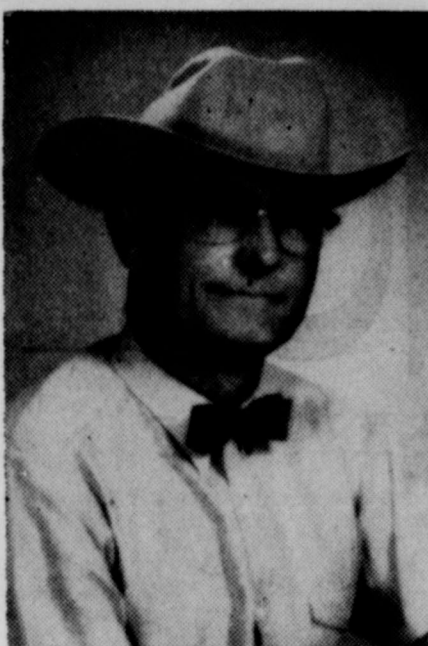
