



Brief Summary of Amendments to the Texas Motor Vehicle Safety-Responsibility Act, Effective January 1, 1964—Prepared for Members Texas Association Of Insurance Agents

In any accident in which a person is killed or injured, or where there is damage to the property of any one person to an apparent extent of at least \$25 or more, the operator of every motor vehicle involved is required within 10 days to report the accident in writing to the Department of Public Safety, 5805 N. Lamar Blvd., P. O. Box 4087, North Austin Station, Austin, Texas. If the accident involved death, personal injury or damage to one person's property of at least \$100, the accident then comes under the Safety Responsibility Act and its provisions must be met.

OLD PROVISIONS

Required security but not proof of financial responsibility after an accident.

Proof of financial responsibility required for 3 years.

Suspension of license of each operator and all registrations of each owner of vehicle for 1 year.

Maximum security deposit of \$1,000 as proof of financial responsibility.

Not in old provisions.

Return of security after 1 year.

No reinstatement fee.

Financial responsibility limits of 5/10/5.

Accident report required if property damage "in excess" of \$100, or if bodily injury results.

Security to be in such form as required by the Department of Public Safety.

Not in old provisions.

Provides penalties where person, who is required to maintain proof of financial responsibility, drives vehicle when such proof is not in effect.

NEW PROVISIONS

Requires proof of financial responsibility after an accident in addition to security.

Proof of financial responsibility required for 5 years.

Suspension of license and all registrations of each operator and owner of vehicle for 2 years.

Maximum security deposit of \$25,000 as proof of financial responsibility.

Minimum security of \$200 required.

Return of security after 2 years.

Add \$10 reinstatement fee.

Financial responsibility limits of 10/20/5.

Accident report required if property damage "to an apparent extent" of at least \$100, or if bodily injury results.

Security must be cash deposit or by bond written by an authorized insurer, or in such other form as the Department of Public Safety may require.

Government employees relieved of security and proof requirement when acting within scope of employment.

Security and proof not required of person legally stopped at traffic signal at time of acci-

Reciprosity provisions made applicable to suspension for failure to file proof of financial responsibility.

Licenses, registrations and nonresident operating privileges may be restored after suspension for non-payment of judgments, by filing evidence with the Department of Public Safety showing that there was valid insurance in effect at the time of the accident, and by filing an affidavit stating that the insurer is liable to pay such judgment and the reason, if known, why the insurer has not paid same.


