## Jack Boren is 2nd Place Winner in Oratorical Meet

Dimmitt received signal honors this week at the West Texas chamber of commerce convention in San Angelo when Jack Boren, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Boren was awarded 2nd place in the annual oratorical contest — "My Home

is my reality Jack did better than he won second—he tied for 2nd place but in the flipoff he lost the wrong turn. By winning second, however, he will be eligible to enter the contest next year when the convention meets in Plainview.

Judge J. D. Hamlin of Farwell was elected President of the regional body. Plainview was the next convention over to El Paso, the only other bidder.

## PCA Loans Can Be Secured on Installment Plan

Frank P. Bain, secretary-treasurer of the production credit association has received approval from S. M. Garwood, Production Credit Commissioner of the Farm Credit Administration in Washington, D. C., that about \$25,000,000 in production crop loans and approvals has already been granted through association and that the volume of loans is expected to increase as the season advances.

A part of this money has been paid out in Castro county," Mr. Bain said. "From its office in Plainview the association is now making an increasing number of loans to farmers in Castro, Biscoe, Hale and other counties, or the purpose of growing crops and for purchasing work-stock and farm supplies for the season's operations. The loans are made on a basis of interest and chattel security.

A number of the loans are made on the installment plan," Mr. Bain added. "An applicant's loan may be approved for the full amount, but paid in installments as needed during the season, the object being to enable the borrower to pay interest costs and be able to finish his crops or livestock operations. The interest on loans, recently reduced to 2 per cent per annum is being used and repaid when the loan is due. Some farmers are saving from 1-4 per cent interest costs by getting on the installment basis.

Another new feature of the production loans allows a farmer to establish a line of credit to be used to make cash purchases of livestock or work-stock, the association taking a mortgage on the stock as part of the security of the loan.

The association was organized under the Farm Credit Administration to be a permanent source of agricultural and livestock credit for this section," Mr. Bain said, "and it now has the capability of fulfilling its purpose."

## The Wolf Discards His Sheep's Clothing

(AN EDITORIAL)

Quite a bit of press comment has been occasioned by the announcement that Judge I. R. Kelso has severed connections with the Texas Utilities company. In plainer words the Judge has been fired. He was formerly general manager of this company with headquarters in St. Louis.

The disagreement between Judge Kelso and his bosses is said to have been caused by differences in policy.

The main offices of the company are now to be removed to New York City—WALL STREET—where they properly belong. Knowing Judge Kelso's integrity and character, we can easily understand why such a man is no longer connected with this crowd of pillagers. He thought about the public too often and too conscientiously—rather than a continued burglarizing of the people. And, ostensibly, he was the only official in the organization who ever gave the public as much as a single thought!

The old monopolistic theory of "the public be damned" was never a part of his personal code. And that very fact sealed his fate as far as being "head man" with the Texas Utilities company.

One is lead to believe that Judge Kelso's connection with the outfit may have been, after all, "the sheep's clothing" behind which the wolves did their dirty work.

But the wolves have thrown off their disguise now, discarding their cloak of respectability and have come out into the open to practice their legalized burglary on a long suffering public. You know now—and they frankly admit it—that the tribute you pay to these robber barons is going DIRECT TO WALL STREET!

They have donned their proper attire—that of a long, sharp-toothed wolf. They have completely discarded the last vestige of respectability. In that respect they are to be commended. At least they are not hypocrites any longer. And certainly no one admires a hypocrite.

## Rural Families To Get Relief By FERA Plan

Hundreds of thousands of rural families in the Nation who are on relief rolls are without a cow, and that is one of the reasons, authorities say, that they are on relief. Although the Federal Emergency Relief Administration is moving to make cows available to these families, probably half of them are not now in a position to receive a cow, because they have no pasture or tillable land on which to raise feed.

Yet cotton, wheat, and tobacco growers have much land lying idle than is necessary to supply land to these landless families.

Many of these growers would allow relief families to use the acres they have taken out of cash crops under Government contract. But acres rented to the Government may be used only by the landlord or tenant and none other.

In decisions announced this week by the FERA a way has been pointed which will give these rented acres great usefulness in solving the problem of the landless relief family. The landlord or tenant has been growing food or feed crops in some other portion of his land, and not on the land which has been rented to the government which has been in cash crops. If he now shifts his food and feed crops to the acres rented to the Government, he will have room for a relief family or families on the non-rented acres.

The relief family that uses these non-rented acres from which the landlord or tenant has shifted crops will be allowed to grow only food or feed and may not sell that. The landlord may not charge them rent. These regulations are made to save the purpose of the acreage control legislation, which is aimed to prevent sale of crops from the rented acres.

## Can Get Sadler Show Here Belief of Mutt Cone

"If the people of this community really want them, it will be possible for the American Legion to bring Harley Sadler's own Stock company to Dimmitt this summer," M. C. Cone, post commander of the local legion said Wednesday.

"I had a talk with Mr. Sadler Tuesday," Cone said, "and asked him about showing in Dimmitt under the auspices of the American Legion. He was a little skeptical about showing in a town this small, but said that he would gladly do so if the folks really want him."

Harley Sadler's show needs no further description to native West Texans. It is considered the premier stage show in this section and this year's show is even bigger than usual. Mr. Cone declared. "I saw them in Littlefield Tuesday night," he stated, "and they have about 50 people in the company this year. In addition to the fine plays there is no end of novelty and specialty numbers. It would be a feather in the cap of the Legion to bring Harley and his company to Dimmitt, but of course it would be out of the question unless the people really wanted the show."
