### Kenneth Fletcher Back From Korea, Visits Here

Kenneth (Skeeter) Fletcher was a Tuesday visitor of his cousin, J. W. Martin, and family. He is here from Korea to visit his mother, Mrs. Bert Fletcher, of Ballinger.

Fletcher, son of the late Bert Fletcher, and Mrs. Fletcher, is a former resident of the Maverick community. He returned from Korea Dec. 31 where he was employed by a U.S. government contractor who drills water wells for the Army.

Prior to getting the drinking water nearby, all water had to be hauled to Army posts in Korea at a cost of approximately \$1,300,000 a year, Fletcher said. The work is almost completed and each camp can have its own water supply.

He returned from Seoul, Korea on a jet plane via Tokyo, Honolulu, Los Angeles, El Paso and on to San Angelo. Eleven hours after he stepped on the plane in Seoul, he was in Los Angeles. He said it was 14 degrees below zero in Seoul when he left and upon arriving in Honolulu, the temperture was 80 degrees.

This stay of 23 months was the second overseas tour to Korea for him. Previously, he spent two years in Korea and another two in India with the same employment. His next assignment is in Viet Nam.

He is well known in this area, having competed in high school sports and played baseball in the Runnels, Coke, Taylor and Tom Green County areas.
