## 21 New Stop Signs Erected At Dangerous Intersections

Twenty-one new traffic signs were erected here during the past week, according to Mayor Norman R. Kiker. Seven of the signs say "Yield Right of Way" while 14 are stop signs.

Bronte Lions purchased the signs as a club project, and Commissioner Howard Brock and county employees furnished pipe, bolts, and cement, and erected the signs.

The mayor said Bronte city council is hopeful that the new

signs will cut down on collisions in the city, by clearly designating the right of way at a number of intersections where danger exists. Stop signs were erected in the following places:

Three on the street going east to the county park; two at the intersection where Central Baptist Church is located; two by the Methodist Church; one by the post office; two on West Railroad near Clark Glenn's house; four on Washington and East Railroad in the north part of town. Yield signs were erected as follows: two on corner where M. Russell's house is located; two on corner by the Methodist parsonage; two on the corner by Leslie Lammers' house and one on West Railroad.

The signs were put up in places designated by the city council and to conform to an ordinance passed several months ago.

Mayor Kiker urged everyone to become familiar with location of the new signs and to obey them at all times.

## March of Dimes Drive in Progress

The March of Dimes drive for this area is still in progress, according to Mrs. O. L. Shurley, president of the PTA which is sponsoring the money-raising campaign.

Mothers of the town have made a house to house canvass of the residential area, under the chairmanship of Mrs. Joe B. Simpson. Mrs. John Boyles is in charge of collecting in the business district and still has some work to do in that area.

A report on amount collected will probably be complete by next week, Mrs. Shurley said.

## Missing Magazine Subscriptions Are Being Hunted

A large number of magazine subscriptions for which the buyers have never received the merchandise are being tracked down by school authorities, according to Supt. C. B. Barbee. The subscriptions were sold last January by the band.

Barbee said that many inquiries had been received by the school regarding the missing magazines, and that school authorities are in contact with the company whose representative worked with the band students.

Barbee said it is imperative that names and addresses of subscribers, magazine titles and term of each subscription be turned in as soon as possible to Bobby Bingham, band director.

Bingham will use the information to compose a new list which will be sent in to the company for processing.

Barbee pointed out that the representative with whom the band dealt is no longer employed by the company.

## 856 Poll Taxes Paid; Friday Is Deadline

Friday is the last day for Texans to pay their poll tax and thereby become eligible to vote in all elections coming up this year. County Tax Assessor-Collector O. B. Jacobs reported Wednesday that 856 receipts had been issued by his office. A deputy was in Bronte last Friday and issued 111 receipts.

An amendment to the U. S. Constitution was ratified last week which abolishes poll tax requirements in all national elections. However, a poll tax receipt or exemption is still necessary to vote in state, district, county and precinct elections, as well as city, school and special balloting.

Bronte Jaycees sponsored a poll tax drive last weekend when a deputy from the county office was in town, placing window cards in several places over town urging local residents to pay the tax.

This year promises to be interesting on the political scene, with hot races for most national and state offices. However, local politics apparently will be somewhat quiet.

## Girl Scout Troops Hit Snag, Must Have Men Sponsor

The organization of Girl Scout and Brownie troops in Bronte hit a snag last Thursday when organizational meetings were held. The girls have been unable to obtain a group of men or a men's organization to sponsor them, so the matter has come to a standstill.

Two representatives from Girl Scout district headquarters were here for the meetings last Thursday and everything got off to a good start, but the scout leaders refused to go through with the organization without a group of men to sponsor the proposed troops.

Mrs. O. L. Shurley, PTA president, said that organization since it is mostly made up of women, would not serve the purpose.

She said that leaders and committeemen for the troops have been secured and the matter now rests with securing some male help. Leaders who have agreed to work with the Brownies are Mrs. Wayne Arrott and Mrs. Bill Moody; Mr. and Mrs. Billy Magness and Mrs. Ernest Ivey say they will serve as leaders for the Girl Scouts.

## Don Andrews Hurt In 35 Foot Fall From Electric Pole

Don Andrews was painfully and seriously injured last Saturday when a power line pole on which he was working snapped and he fell about 35 feet to the ground. A part of the pole which broke off fell on him.

Andrews, the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. M. Andrews of Bronte, was working near Wilmett for L & F Construction Co. when the accident occurred. He was brought to Bronte Hospital and was sent on to San Angelo where he is now in Clinic Hospital.

His mother said Wednesday that "so far as they can tell he is suffering from internal bruises."

About six feet of the pole on which Andrews was working broke off, with the break only a few inches below his feet. He fell, landed on his back and was hit in the stomach by the broken part of the pole.

Andrews was seriously injured a few months ago when he received a severe electric shock.

## SLOW RAIN FALLS HERE

## Coke Rattlesnake Round-up Set

A rattlesnake hunt is being planned for Coke County. Present plans call for the hunt to be held Feb. 29 and March 1. The hunt and show to follow will be sponsored by Bronte Jaycees, along with a committee from the Coke County Game Management Association, composed of Otis Smith chairman, C. E. Arrott, Curtis Walker and possibly others. Coke County Agent's department and local game wardens will also assist with the plans and execution of the roundup.

Plans now are to have the show at Robert Lee following the hunt. All snakes will be brought alive to the show place. Smith said that many details have to be worked out. Judging, prizes and regulations will be announced as soon as possible.

Several professional snake hunters have expressed interest in the hunt and expect to be here. Smith said the mountainous terrain of Coke County is ideal for rattlesnake dens, and some of them have been known to have as many as 100 snakes hibernating during the winter months.

Places for hunters to register and for land owners who are interested in having the hunt cover their property to sign up will be announced shortly.

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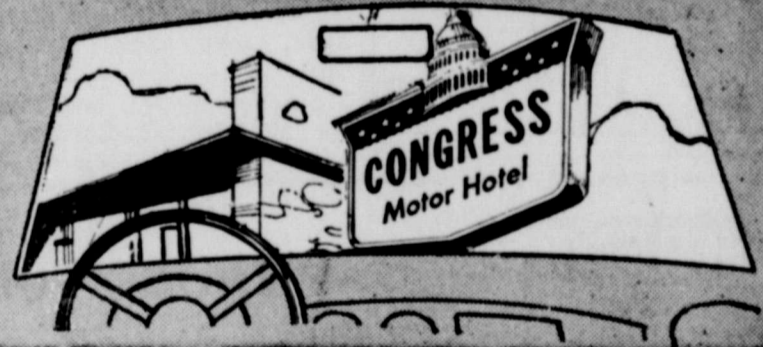

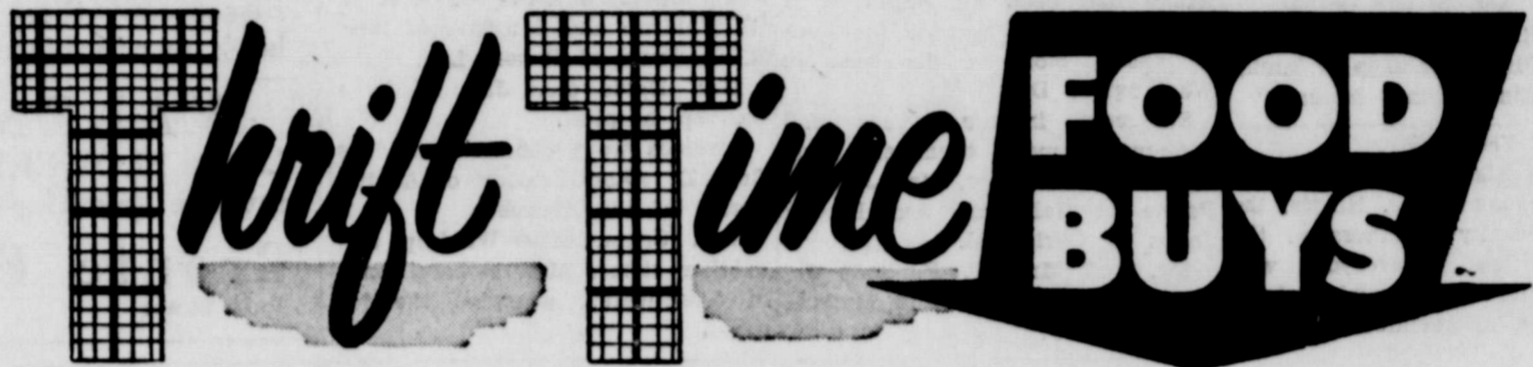

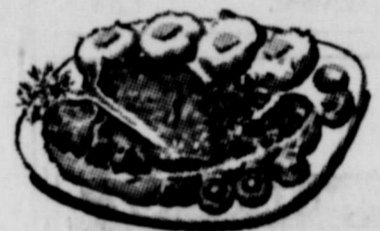
