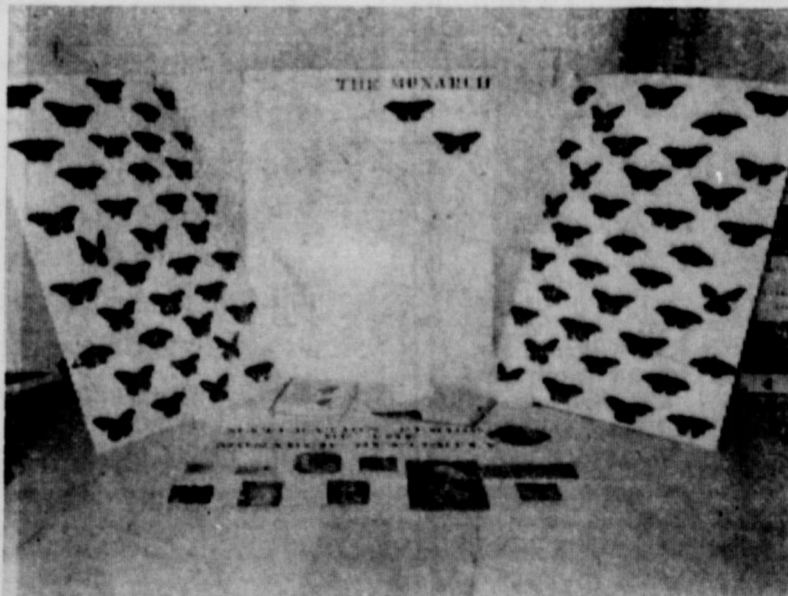
Mrs. Simpson asked the Enterprise to express her thanks to all the workers and those who contributed for their generosity, both with their time and money.

Rattlesnake Hunt Plans Made; Date Moved to Mar. 7-8

Plans are rapidly taking shape for the county-wide rattlesnake roundup scheduled for March 7 and 8. The affair is being sponsored by Bronte Jaycees. Originally, the date had been set for the weekend before but had to be moved up, due to a conflict with the snake roundup at Sweetwater.

In addition to the hunt itself and the capture of hundreds of snakes, there will be entertainment for everybody both afternoons at a snake show in Robert Lee at the livestock barn in the county park.

Bill Ransburger, snake handling expert of Sweetwater, will put on an exhibition every hour during both afternoons, providing the crowd is large enough to justify the shows so often. He has been secured by the Jaycees to help with the hunt and to do most of the snake handling chores.

Ranchers who wish to have snakes hunted on their property are requested to register at Sparks Texaco Station in Robert Lee or Mackey's Feed Store in Bronte. Hunters may also sign up at these places before the hunt, or they may wait until just before the hunt starts to register. Hunters will leave from the city hall in Bronte both days at 8 a.m.

In addition to the viewing and snake handling shows each afternoon in Robert Lee, the Jaycees will serve rattlesnake meat and will also operate a concession stand, where cold drinks and coffee may be purchased. Admission to the show area will be 10c for children and 25c for adults.

Prizes of a rod and reel and a plaque will be awarded for the longest snake, the shortest snake, the snake with the most rattles, and to the individual who brings in the most pounds of snakes.

Five rules are to be observed by hunters. They are:

1. No guns allowed.
2. Keep all vehicles on existing roads.

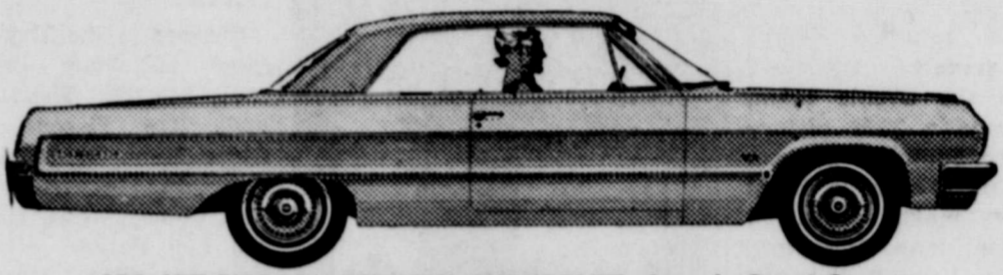

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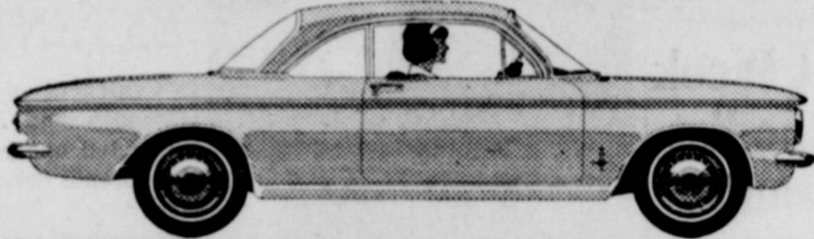

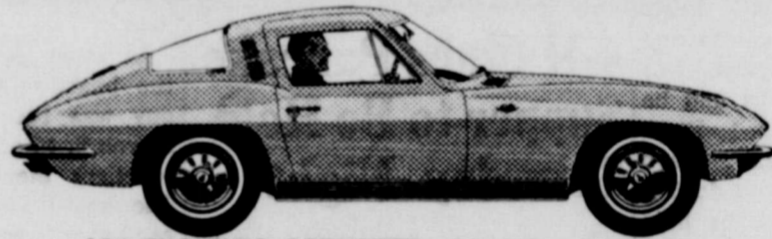

Jacob Bruce Morrow and Bill Thomas will go off the board unless they are re-elected. Neither has told the Enterprise whether or not he will seek re-election.

The trustee election was set at a meeting of the school board last week. Candidates for the trustee jobs must file with County Judge W. W. Thetford 30 days before the election in order to have their names on the ballot. Names may also be placed on the ballot by petition signed by five qualified voters living in the district. Petition forms are available in the office of Supt. C. B. Barbee.

Holdover trustees are A. E. Bell Jr., Horace Taylor, James Wells, Joe Rawlings and Edward Cumbie. Thomas has served a full term on the board, but Morrow was appointed last year to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Allen Sherrod.

Eight Outstanding Speakers Will Do the Preaching During This Series of Special Services

Dr. John G. Rideout, in his sixth year as professor of English and chairman of the department at Huston-Tillotson College, will be the preacher to begin the Evangelistic services at First Methodist Church both Sunday morning and evening, Feb. 23.

He is a member of the St. Matthew's Episcopal Church, Austin, and chaplain of the Men of St. Matthews. His wife, Miriam, is an instructor in French at Huston-Tillotson. They have a daughter, Margaret Jane, and a son, George Whitney.

Dr. Rideout graduated in 1936 from Colby College, Waterville, Maine, was a Rhodes scholar from New England to Oxford University where he received an M.A. degree in 1942. He earned his Ph.D. degree from Brown University in 1945. He has been a college teacher of English for 25 years.

The Reverend Mr. Albert M. Merubia, the minister of the Ward Memorial Methodist Church, Austin, will be the preacher for the Evangelistic Services in the First Methodist Church this Monday evening, Feb. 24, at 7 o'clock. He will preach again Tuesday morning, Feb. 25, at 7 a.m.

Mr. Merubia is a native of Bolivia, South America. He was born in La Paz, Bolivia, and is a second generation Protestant and a product of Methodist Missions in South America. He received his education in Bolivia, Argentina, and Boston University, where he was a Crusade Scholar.

He founded two churches in La Paz and also served in Argentina before coming to Texas. In 1959 he was appointed the minister of the Cokesbury Methodist Church, San Antonio, and is the first and only Latin-American serving an English-speaking church in Texas.

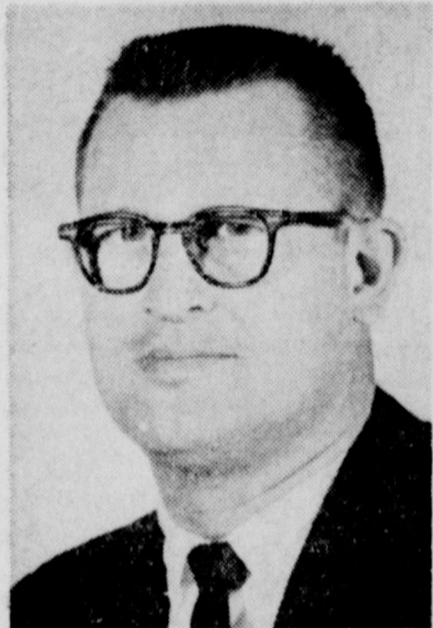


REV. DEMPSEY G. SALTER

Fish Available for Stocking Tanks

Pond owners who want fish for stocking farm and ranch tanks should make application now for fish to be delivered this spring, according to James H. Pratt, manager of the National Fish Hatchery at Uvalde. Fish can be allotted only to persons whose applications have been approved.

Fish are furnished free and spring distribution will start at the Uvalde hatchery about April 15. Application forms may be obtained at the county agent's office, the Soil Conservation Service office or from the hatchery.

Anyone having a tank one-fourth acre or more in size, which has not been previously stocked, is eligible to receive the fish. Consideration is also given to restocking tanks and lakes that have refilled following drouth periods, and for restocking where the undesirable fish population has been eliminated.

Large-mouth black bass, redear sunfish and channel catfish are available at the hatchery. Four different stocking methods may be chosen from: 150 bass and 100 redear per acre; 100 bass, 100 redear and 50 catfish per acre; 75 catfish per acre when stocked alone; or 150 bass per acre when stocked alone. Ponds of less than one acre are not stocked in combination with catfish.

The fish are delivered to central meeting points, usually the county seat, by hatchery distribution trucks. Applicants will be noti-

fied when and where to pick up the fish.

Over one and a half million fish are produced each year by the Uvalde hatchery for distribution in a 67 county area of Southwest Texas. Federal and state agencies encourage construction of fish ponds and lakes as an aid to conservation of water and wildlife.

Senator Hardeman, a lawyer, is a partner with Earl W. Smith and Joe H. Foy in the law firm of Hardeman, Smith & Foy in San Angelo.

Mr. Hardeman is a former Mayor of San Angelo and former State Representative, which latter office he resigned and volunteered as a private in the Air Force in November, 1942. He attended Officer Candidate School and upon graduation received a commission in the Judge Advocate General's Department and was assigned to the 2nd Air Force. He later was aide to Major-General U. G. Ent and was honorably discharged with the rank of Captain in February, 1946.

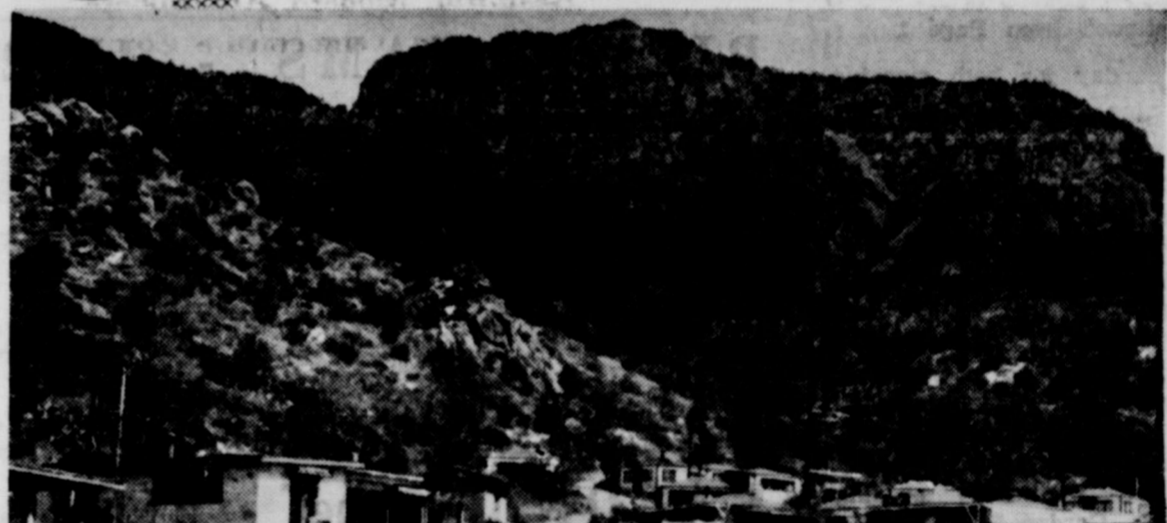
