## Absentee Voting Starts In City, School Elections

Ballots are in the hands of proper officials for absentee voting in forthcoming city and school elections, and persons who wish to vote and will not be able to get to the polling places on election days may cast their ballots ahead of time. Absentee ballots may be cast during a period from 20 days

before to three days before an election.

In order to vote in the school election, the voter must contact the office of County Judge W. W. Thetford, while Mrs. Helen Kirkland, city secretary, is in charge of absentee voting in the city election.

Persons wishing to vote absentee may apply to the proper office for a ballot to be sent to him through the mail, or he may go by the office and mark the ballot ahead of time.

Lively competition is showing up in both the city and school elections which will be held the first week in April. The school election, which will be on Saturday, April 4, has five candidates on the ticket for two vacancies on the board of trustees. In city politics, two candidates are running for mayor, while five candidates are seeking three places on the city council.

Running for school board (in the order they are listed on the ballot) are: Davy W. Crockett, E. L. Champion, B. G. (Bill) Thomas, J. B. Morrow and Conda O. Richards.

Listed on the city ballot for mayor are H. O. Whitt and Royce Lee; and for councilman are Martin Lee, Matthew G. Caperton, James O. Pitts, Billy Joe Luckett and Elmer Hurley.

Balloting in both elections will take place at Bronte city hall, with a second polling place set up at Tennyson for the school trustee election. Noah Pruitt Sr. will be city election judge, while judges in the school election will be D. K. Glenn for the Bronte box and Mrs. Tom Green at Tennyson.

## Lions' Broom Sale Set for Saturday

Bronte Lions Club's annual mop and broom sale will be held Saturday. A large variety of merchandise will be offered to residents of this area. All of the items are purchased from the Light-house for the Blind, and proceeds derived from the sale will go to blind persons, after the Lions share is taken out.

As in previous years, the goods will arrive in a large van which

will be parked on Main Street south of First National Bank. Purchases may be made from the van or from the Lions when they make a house to house canvass.

Many items, such as brooms, mops, ironing supplies, floor mats, rakes, and cup towels will be offered for sale. A complete list of the merchandise appears in an ad in this issue of The Enterprise. It is arranged so readers can go over the entire list and check off the items they wish to buy.

Officials of the Lions Club urged Bronte area residents to buy from the club, as "the entire purchase price goes for worthy causes." The Lions Club's share will be used for local projects which will benefit the entire community, and the remainder will be turned over to blind persons who have made the merchandise.

## Funeral Held for Mrs. Sallie Long, Former Resident

Funeral services were held Tuesday, March 10, in Eunice, N. M. for Mrs. Sallie Elizabeth Long, 93, long time resident of the area and a former resident of Bronte. Services were conducted at First Baptist Church by the pastor, the Rev. G. A. Magee, assisted by the Rev. Hugh Harris, pastor of the First Christian Church in Eunice. Burial was in the Eunice Cemetery.

Mrs. Long died March 7 in a Eunice hospital. She had been ill 24 days, and death was attributed to complications following a broken hip.

Mrs. Long was born Feb. 3, 1871 in Warren, Ark., the daughter of Frank and Mary Linzy Hickman. Her parents were pioneers in this area, and many of their descendants still live in the vicinity of Coke County.

She moved with her parents to Llano in 1873, and on May 23, 1888, she was married there to Thomas Long. The couple moved here for a short time and in 1911 moved to Eunice, where they homesteaded some land. Mrs. Long was a member of the Baptist Church.

Survivors include seven daughters, Mrs. R. H. Herron of Bronte, Mrs. A. E. Rodgers of Hobbs, N. M., Mrs. Naomi Wright of Eunice; Mrs. Dollie Lane of San Juan, N. M., Mrs. Frances Winkle of Albuquerque, N. M., Mrs. Leona Butler and Mrs. Ethel Odell, both of California; three sons, Wylie Long of Ft. Davis, O. D. Long of Tucumcari, N. M., and John Long of Dexter, N. M.; and a number of grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

## City Receives Report on Water System Needs

Officials of the City of Bronte received a report this week setting forth improvements that are needed to give the city a lower fire insurance rate. Residents of the city presently pay a 50 cent charge on fire insurance because the water system is not recognized by the State Board of Insurance.

The survey of the water system was made by National Engineering Company of Austin after city officials requested the firm to determine the needs and estimated cost.

The engineers estimated that actual construction cost of needed improvements would amount to approximately \$66,000, with engineering, inspection and other miscellaneous expenses bringing the total up to \$80,000.

Largest expense would be \$27,000 for construction of a 75,000 gallon elevated storage tank, the bottom of which must be at least 100 feet from the ground.

Another deficiency which needs correcting and which would cost a sizeable sum is replacement of some existing lines with larger

pipe. The cost estimate sheet submitted show \$17,680 for six inch pipe, \$5,184 for eight inch pipe and \$840 for four inch pipe. Various valves, fittings, etc., along with ten new fire hydrants would raise the figure to approximately \$66,000.

City officials have been interested for some time in trying to improve the water system so as to avoid the heavy fire insurance penalty, and one of them stated this report is the first step in working out the problem.

**H D Agent's News Dept.**

A fresh group of high school and college graduates will seek jobs this spring. For many, it will be their first try at finding a job.

A good education, an alert mind, and a fresh initiative will be attributes many of them will have, yet some will have difficulty in landing a job.

That all-important first impression can be spoiled by a rumpled dress, baggy trousers, or the wrong attire. A personnel man interviewing a sloppy, unkempt job applicant is put on his guard.

The importance of good clothing appearance will be emphasized during Good Grooming week, which has been scheduled for April 19-25, under the sponsorship of the National Institute of Dry Cleaning.

It is emphasized that the proper attire for a woman job applicant is a nicely tailored suit or dress. Hat and gloves go with the tailored look, and one should not overdress with jewelry, color or style.

A clean, well groomed suit is best for men — and "absolutely no loafers."

Good grooming has a side effect that is most important. It

gives a person a sense of confidence, and this helps greatly in making a favorable impression in a job interview.

Even though you're 60 or 70, or more, don't "retire" from good eating habits. All of your life you need foods that will give you protein, minerals, and vitamins, and foods for energy and warmth.

Unless you have a special health problem you should continue to include in your daily diet (1) milk products, (2) meat, poultry, fish, eggs, or dry beans and peas as an occasional alternates, (3) bread and other cereal products, and (4) fruits and vegetables... and some fats and sweets.

If you cook for two, or just for yourself, the "large economy size" is no bargain. Part of it will grow stale or spoil before it can be used, and leftovers can be dull. don't just "warm them up" — When you do have leftovers, make a new and interesting dish by combining them with each other or with freshly prepared foods.

You can prepare a nourishing meal even on a one-burner hot plate — for example, a one-dish meal that includes meat and vegetables. Or cook one food in the bottom of a double boiler while another warms in the top. Food cooked in a heavy, covered pot will stay warm while you use the burner to cook another.

In any case, make mealtimes pleasant. If you don't want to set the table, fix an attractive tray and take it to the television or that window with a view.

The public is invited.

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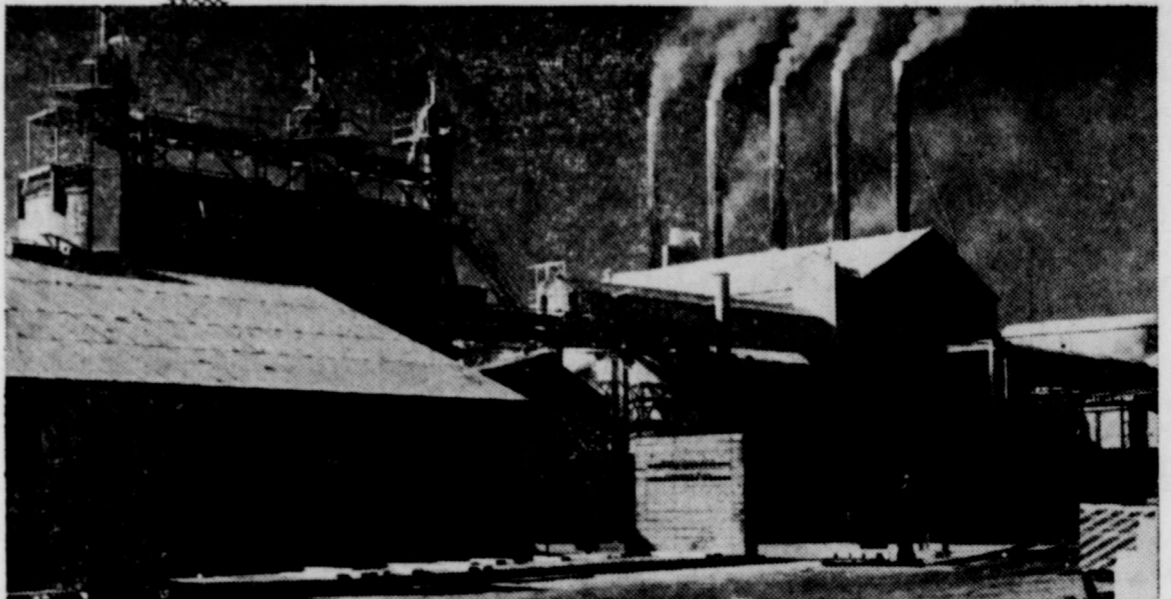

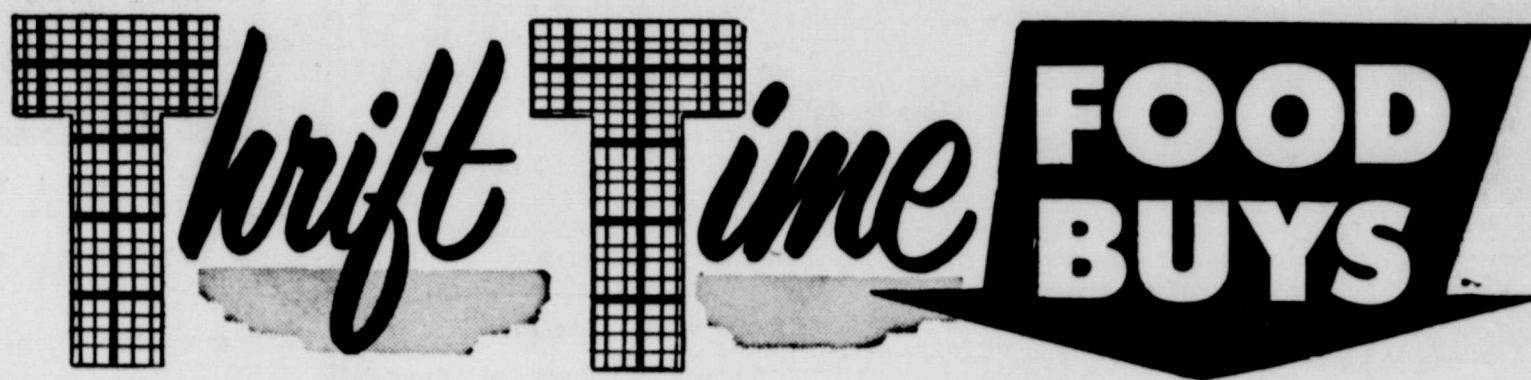

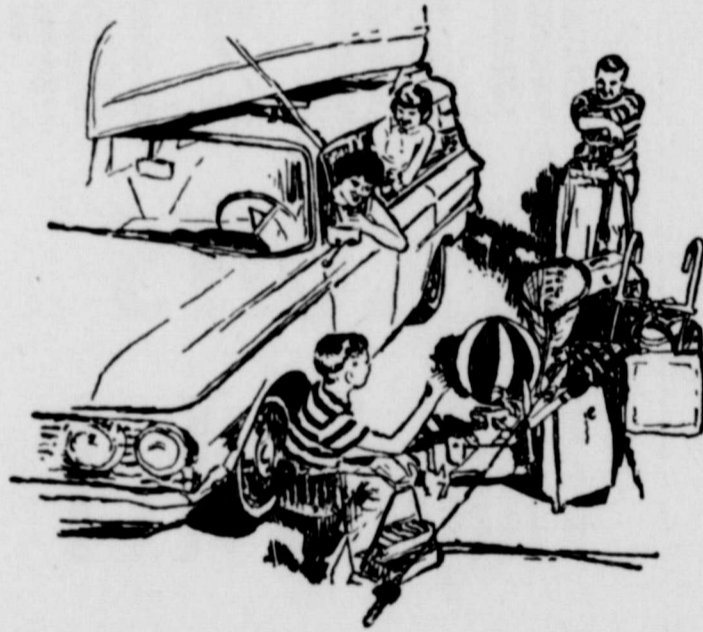

## County Agents News Column

By STERLING LINDSEY

It's nice to have some moisture in the ground for a change. The ground is not saturated, but certainly the outlook is much better than it was a couple of months ago.

A few warm days should change the panorama from the wintery look to that of spring. The pastures and grain fields have already made some change in appearance.

One wonders what most of the operators will do with their grain fields. Naturally, the individual needs have to be considered. I have talked to several men and most have indicated they would shoot for a grain crop rather than turn in on their field. Two men indicated they may graze down their small grains than try for a grain crop.

Regardless of their decision, more moisture will be needed. Maybe this will be the year. The oldtimers tell me we can count on a grain crop one in every five years. It has been several years since we made a crop of small grains.

The County field crops committee is searching for new crops new ideas, that may add to the county economy. One idea they

will pursue is to plant early maturing cotton varieties in years when we have stored moisture going into the planting season. We hope to get out some trial plots this year using paymaster 101 "A" and blightmaster varieties.

Also, we will try some soybean plots if seed can be secured. This crop may have potential in some operations in our area.

Fertilization, if we have the moisture, will receive more emphasis than ever this year. Mr. Pyburn, working with FHA borrowers, will be cooperating in the fertilizer tests.

Another idea Mr. Pyburn has presented and looks promising is the development of fruit and berries in the sandy land parts of our county. We will have market, we believe, if we can develop the produce to supply the market.

Several of the new sorghum-sudan hybrid hay, grazing, or silage crops will be tried this year. Two companies have sent us samples to try along with some sorghums. In all, we have received 10 varieties so far.

We will let you know later where the plots are located. If you would like to check them, I am sure the operators would welcome you.

The weekly screwworm report showed 12 weeks with no screwworms. Since the report was mailed I understand a case has been found in South Texas. The record so far is a good one, but we want it to remain a good one.

If you should need a sample bottle to mail in a worm case give us a ring. We still have a supply on hand.

Grasshopper infestations of western and mid-western ranges were more widespread in 1963 than 1962, and are expected to increase further in 1964. In a 16-state survey, infestations large enough to be of economic importance were discovered.
