## Urgent School Meeting Called Tuesday

## New Mayor and Councilmen Are Sworn in Monday Night

In an impressive installation ceremony Monday night, former Mayor Norman R. Kiker administered oaths of office to Bronte new Mayor Royce Lee and to Councilmen Billy Joe Luckett, Elmer Hurley and Martin Lee. The new city officials took office at the city hall. C. E. Bruton and Royce Fancher are holdover councilmen.

Prior to the swearing in ceremonies, the council canvassed results of the city election which was held April 7. They also discussed three bonds which were purchased with \$3,000 in surplus money which has accumulated in the sanitary sewer fund. The

city is not allowed to spend this money for any other project, so the council decided to invest it in interest drawing securities.

After the new council took over, a short business meeting was held. The new mayor appointed the five councilmen to their jobs for the ensuing year, as follows: Fancher, fire commissioner; Bruton, property commissioner; Luckett, water commissioner; Hurley, sewer commissioner; and Martin Lee, street and alley commissioner.

The council voted to purchase a small lawn mower for use on the grounds around the city hall. Some discussion was also held and it was agreed that the city would back in every way possible a celebration to be held Labor Day in commemoration of Coke County's 75th Anniversary. The celebration is being planned in conjunction with and is to be an expansion of the Labor Day barbecue, sponsored each year by Bronte merchants.

Councilmen Cecil Kemp and Matthew Caperton, as well as Mayor Kiker, retired from the city council after the swearing-in ceremonies were conducted.

### DRIVER EDUCATION TO BE OFFERED

Supt. C. B. Barbee announced this week that two sessions of driver education will be offered during the coming summer. The first session will be from June 1 to July 10, while the second will begin July 13 and be concluded Aug. 21.

Coach Cecil Toliver will be instructor for the first session and Science and Math Teacher Clint Low will teach the second session.

An automobile equipped with dual driving controls will be supplied, courtesy of Caperton Chevrolet Co. of Bronte.

Tuition for the instruction will be \$25.00, payable at time of enrollment, Barbee said.

For the first session the minimum age is 14 by June 22 and for the second session, students must be 14 by Aug. 3.

## All Residents of District Invited To Hear Report on Joint Study

A public meeting has been called for Tuesday night of next week, April 21, when a progress report will be presented on the joint study of school problems which

has been held by the Bronte and Robert Lee school trustees. Time for the meeting is 7:30 p.m.

Supt. C. B. Barbee said he is unable to over-emphasize the impor-

ance of the meeting to parents and other residents of the school district "I would say," he told The Enterprise, "that this discussion and report is one of the most urgent to come before people of this area for some time."

The joint study of mutual problems of Bronte and Robert Lee schools has been underway for the past few months and several sessions of the boards have been held to discuss possible solutions to problems which confront the two schools.

Barbee said the program will begin with presentation of the facts found in the study. Following the presentation, he said no definite pattern will be followed. "We want the patrons and residents of the district to participate in this meeting and ask questions about points which are brought up," he said, adding, "and we will answer them if we can."

The superintendent pointed out that lots of rumors have been going around concerning the joint study. He said that the school administration and the Bronte school board want the information they have gathered presented to the residents of the district, so they will be better able to decide what they want done to maintain and improve the standards of the school.

The meeting will be held in the school auditorium.

## Track Team Takes Easy Win In District 73-B Competition

The Bronte Longhorn track team took an easy victory last Saturday in the District 73-B track meet held at Howard County Junior College stadium in Big Spring. The Longhorns amassed a total of 184 points, more than double their nearest opposition.

Robert Lee came in second with 89 points; Garden City, third, 75; Sterling City, fourth, 64; Forsan, fifth, 60; and Water Valley sixth with 20.

The elementary track team didn't come out so well, bringing home fourth place honors with their 20 points. Coach Cecil Toliver said his grade school team was severely handicapped on account of several boys being ill. Robert Lee was first, Sterling City, second, and Forsan, third in the elementary meet.

Coach N. M. Curlee said this week that he was exceptionally well pleased with the performance of the Longhorns last Saturday. "I feel like with a little bit of luck and lots of hard work some of these boys will be able to go on to state."

Edwyn McDaniel was leading point maker for the Longhorns with 31. He was closely followed by Royce Lee with 30, Glenn Sims and Jimmy Wells with 28 each. Other top point makers were Jim Morrow with 20, Ronnie Lee with 18 and Barry Curlee with 15. (These figures were calculated by The Enterprise and their correctness could not be verified.)

Big point making wins for Bronte were the 440 yard and the mile relay, with first place wins counting 20 points each. Other high counting events were first places in high jump, broad jump, 180 yard low hurdles, 100 yard dash, 440 yard dash and 220 yard dash.

## Funeral Today for Mrs. J. B. Johnson, Bronte Pioneer

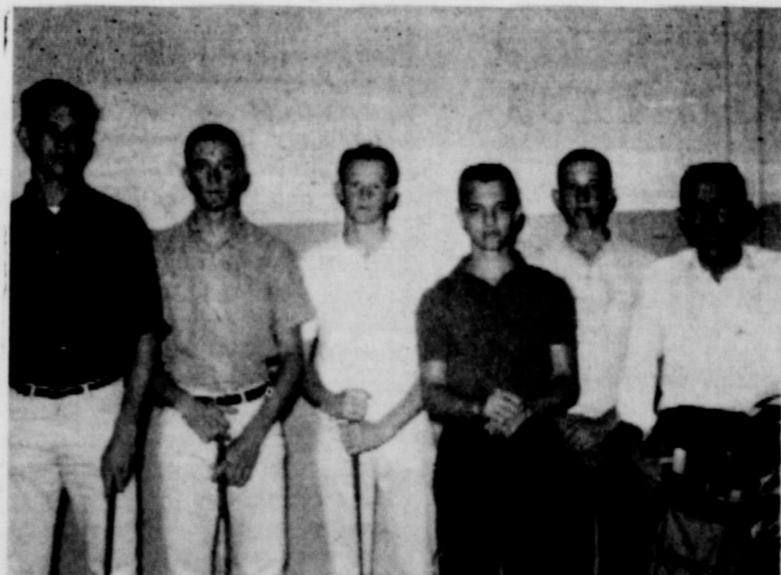
Funeral services will be held today (Thursday) at 3 p.m. for Mrs. J. B. Johnson, area pioneer, who died at 10:20 a.m. Tuesday in Bronte Hospital following a long illness. Mrs. Johnson was 89 years old.

Last rites will be held at Central Baptist Church with the pastor, the Rev. Wayne N. Stout, officiating. Burial will be in Fairview Cemetery under direction of Clift Funeral Home.

Mrs. Johnson was born Aug. 29, 1874, in Kentucky. She came to Texas in her early years, and was married in 1889 in Eastland County to J. B. Johnson. The family moved to Coke County in 1911, and prior to that time had lived in Rannels County. Mrs. Johnson lived for the past 50 years at the same place southwest of Bronte. She was a Baptist.

Survivors include seven sons, O. L., Bob and Pat Johnson, all of Bronte, R. C. and Bill Johnson, both of Ballinger, Dan Johnson of Bangs and Wayne Johnson of San Angelo; four daughters, Mrs. Leon Whaley of Kilgore, Mrs. Roy Newberry of Portales, N. M., Mrs. M. R. Simpson of Arlington and Mrs. R. D. Mitchell of Houma, La.; 39 grandchildren, 86 great grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

**Angelo Youth Is Accidentally Shot**

James Onis Graves, 15, of San Angelo was killed Sunday afternoon by an accidental gunshot wound while he was visiting on the Ben Brooks ranch southwest of Tennyson.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at Johnson's Funeral Chapel in San Angelo, with burial following in Mule Creek Cemetery at Tennyson.

The accident was investigated by Sheriff Melvin Childress, Deputy Sheriff Jesse Parker, and Justices of the Peace J. T. Liles of Bronte and Ricky Ross of Robert Lee. Judge Liles ruled the death was accidental.

Parker said that young Graves and Dennis Cockburn, 15, were playing with 5a .22 caliber rifle when the accident occurred. He said the bullet hit the youth just above the left eye, and was dead before officers arrived at the scene.

Graves was born Feb. 8, 1949 in San Angelo.

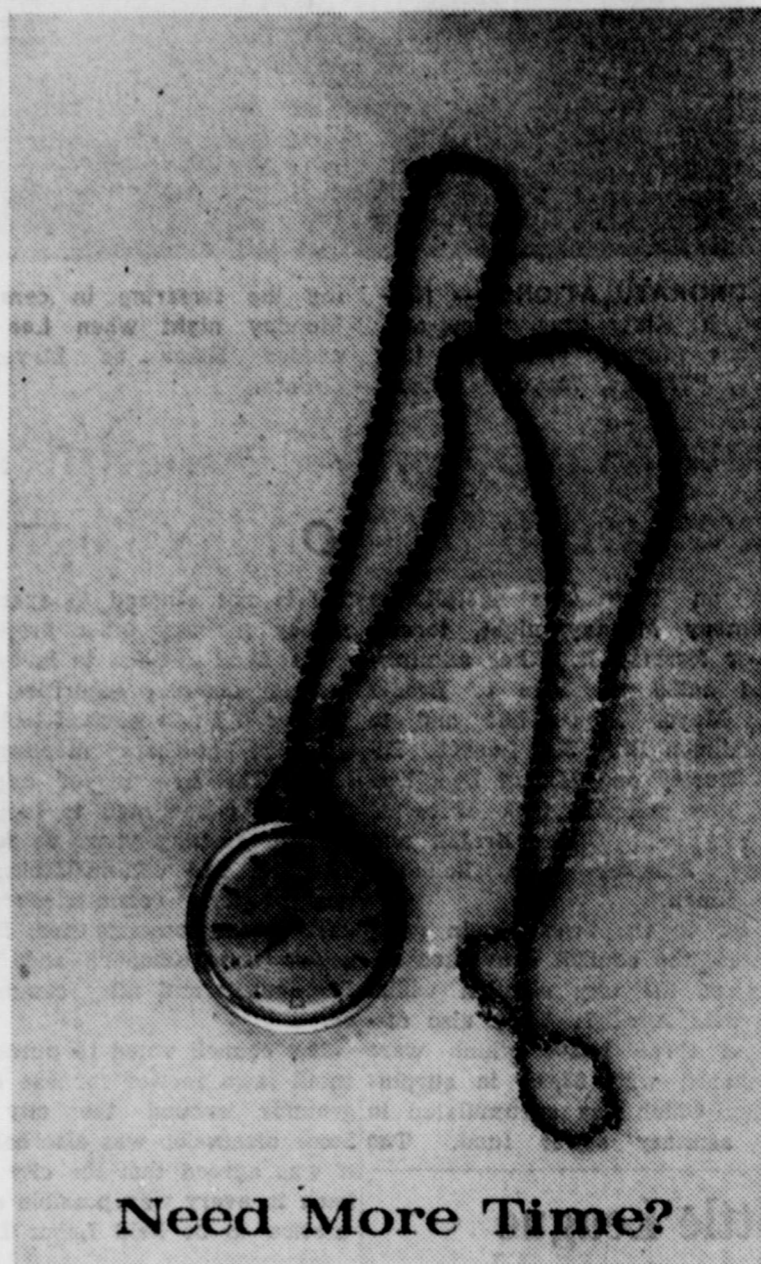

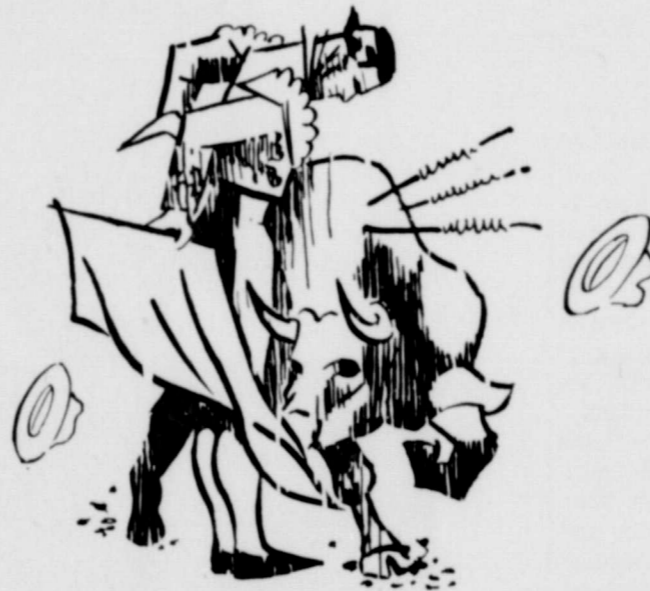
