This column last week stirred up quite a discussion, and we were a little surprised at the comments it caused, many heard directly and some by the "grapevine." We had expected some repercussions from our stand against consolidation of the Bronte and Robert Lee schools, but that was not the thing which brought the comment.

The paragraph which caused the controversy was the one in which we called attention to the fact that the future of the town and school are rooted in the same success or failure, and pointed out that many local residents do not do their shopping in Bronte. Special mention was made of teachers because we felt they, along with our children would be first affected and are more involved in the future of Bronte Schools than any other group in the community. Singling out of the teachers was not done with any animosity on our part.

And so, since we got into this popularity contest without really announcing, we are writing this week, just as truthfully, the same words as last week, with the exception of the phrase about the

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enough in district competition to enter nine literary and 11 track and field, golf and tennis events.

Jim Morrow was the only local trackman to come up with a first place; he topped all the regional entrants with his high jump of 5 feet, 11½ inches. The 440 relay team, composed of Glenn Sims, Edwyn McDaniel, Ronnie Lee and Royce Lee, came in for second place and qualified for state participation; time was 45.0.

Sims was an entrant in the 100 yard dash and came in second with a 10.4. He will represent the region at the state meet. The mile relay team won third place honors. It was composed of Sims, Royce Lee, Mike McKown and Barry Curlee.

Bronte's first place winner in regional literary events was Margi Oglesby, who took the top spot in ready writing. Larry Coriey also qualified for state competition with his second place win in number sense.

The state meet will begin at the University of Texas in Austin on Thursday, May 7, but Bronte students will not participate until Friday morning, when the ready writing, and number sense contests, as well as track and field preliminaries will be held. The track finals will not be until Saturday afternoon.

Mrs. Tad Richards was admitted to Shannon Hospital in San Angelo Tuesday after becoming ill at her ranch home north of town. Her condition was reported good Wednesday morning and she expected to return home in a few days.

Democratic Primary To Be Held Saturday

The biennial Democratic Primary will be held in Coke County and over the State of Texas Saturday to name party nominees for offices from the precinct level on up through such high positions as governor and U. S. senator.

Local elections are quiet this year, as there is only one contested race in the county. In Precinct 2 (Bronte) Hiram Brock is running against incumbent Oscar

Renshaw for constable. None of the candidates for a county-wide office has an opponent.

The story is different for state and district offices. John Connally is seeking his second term as governor with three opponents. However, his only serious threat is Don Yarborough of Houston.

Preston Smith backers don't expect too much opposition for their candidate in his race for a second

term as lieutenant governor. His only opponent is Albert Fuentes Jr. of San Antonio.

A wild and woolly campaign with lots of mud slinging has taken place in the race for U. S. senator. Ralph Yarborough, the present senator, has been attacked on every side by Dallasite Gordon McLendon. Incumbent Joe Pool of Dallas has four opponents in his race for reelection as congressman-at-large. In the local congressional race, 21st district O. C. Fisher is unopposed.

Waggoner Carr is unopposed for attorney general. John C. White, present commissioner of agriculture, is opposed by former Farm Bureau official, Millard Shivers. Jerry Sadler is opposed by Fred H. Williams of Dallas for reelection as commissioner of the general land office.

Looking further down the ballot, the following candidates are unopposed: Robert S. Calvert, state comptroller; Jesse James, state treasurer; Ben Ramsey, railroad commissioner; Ruel C. Walker, Robert W. Hamilton, K. K. Woodley and Robert G. Hughes, all running for places on higher courts of Texas.

Two candidates, Jack Pope and Sears McGee, are running for associate justice of the state Supreme Court.

Representative Ed J. Carpenter of Big Spring has no opponent, but State Senator Dorsey Hardeman is opposed by Juanita Camfield. Both are from San Angelo.

Getting into the 51st Judicial District races, Judge Joe L. Mays has no opponent. In the race for district attorney, the incumbent, Frank C. Dickey Jr., former Coke county attorney, is opposed by Jack Sessom.

County officials listed on the ballot who are not opposed include O. B. Jacobs, tax assessor-collector; Melvin Childress, sheriff; Frank C. Dickey, county attorney, precinct 1; Floyd Harmon, commissioner, precinct 3; Olbie Roe, constable, precinct 1; D. K. Glenn, county Democratic chairman.

A blank place has been left on the ballot to write in names for precinct chairman.

Elections on the east side of the county will be held at Bronte, Juniper, Tennyson and Olga.

LT. RONALD HINES KILLED IN VIET NAM

Lt. Ronald Hines of Amarillo was killed last Sunday in fighting between troops of Viet Nam and Viet Cong. Lt. Hines was the only American killed in a flareup which took the lives of two Vietnamese and 20 Viet Cong.

The Army officer's wife, Harriet, lives in Middletown, N. J. while his mother, Mrs. J. B. Hines, lives in Amarillo. His father died last December. Lt. Hines' grandmother is Mrs. Lula Hines of San Angelo. Mrs. Annie Wilkins of Bronte is an aunt.

Bronte Longhorn Band Formal Concert Set for Friday Night

The Bronte Longhorn Band will present a formal concert Friday, May 1, at 8 p.m. in the school auditorium. Plans now call for about 18 numbers to be presented by the Shorthorn Band, a combo and by the Longhorn Band. The concert will be under direction of Band Director Bobby Bingham.

The Shorthorn Band will be on the program first, and will present four numbers: Comin' Round the Mountain, 'Liza Jane, Hand Clap Blues and Londonderry Air.

Prec. Conventions Scheduled for 2 P.M. Saturday

Democratic precinct conventions will be held Saturday at 2 p.m. according to D. K. Glenn, county chairman. Glenn said that Noah Pruitt Sr. is the precinct chairman for Bronte and will preside at the meeting, which will be held at the city hall.

Precinct conventions are held to elect delegates to the county convention set for the following Saturday, May 15. All eligible voters are invited to attend the precinct gatherings.

State law provides that each precinct may elect one delegate to the county convention for each 25 votes cast for Gov. John Connally in the November election of 1962.

On that basis Bronte is entitled to eight delegates, Robert Lee seven delegates and all other precincts

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Following the presentation by the younger students, a combo made up of Weldon Broussard, Edward Broussard, Bob Wells, Doak Snead, Craig Curlee and Bingham, will present four or five numbers. Selections had not been announced at press time Wednesday.

Next on the program will be the concert by the Longhorn Band. Numbers on the program include: La Sorella March, Hymn of Brotherhood, Carnival of Trumpets, Chester, Oh, Happy Day, Exodus, We Know Cha-Cha, Eels, Highlights from "West Side Story", and the American Way.

More than 80 students make up the two bands, with the Shorthorns boasting a membership of 33, while the Longhorn Band has 48 members.

The Longhorn Band has made several appearances this year, all of which have been loudly applauded by audiences. They took first division rating in the Interscholastic League marching contest, but were unable to attend the second because of a conflict in scheduling with other UIL events.

The public is invited to attend the concert and there will be no admission charge.

In addition to the concert, a presentation of the John Philip Sousa Award will be made to the senior who is outstanding in band work. Certificates will be presented to members of the Shorthorn Band who have practiced at least 48 hours, and certificates and prizes will be presented to those who have practiced at least 60 hours.

Mayor Proclaims Recognition Day

Students of Bronte Schools who have made significant achievements in any field during the spring season will be honored next Wednesday, May 6. Mayor Royce Lee has proclaimed the day as Achievement Recognition Day and is issuing an official invitation from the city to all citizens of the area to attend. The program will be held on Bronte's main street at 9:15 a.m.

Supt. C. B. Barbee is in charge of coordinating the program. He said the school student body, including the Longhorn Band, will march in a group from school to the downtown site of the program.

The mayor said the business block of Main Street will be blocked to traffic and a public address

system will be set up in order for everyone to hear the program.

In issuing his invitation to the residents of the area, the mayor said: "We want to get all the people out of town into town, and all the people in town downtown for this program. Our boys and girls have achieved notable success during the last several weeks, and I think we should all be present to honor them on this occasion."

Superintendent Barbee said students to be honored will be those who have achieved success in various events since the end of basketball season. The group of honorees will be made up largely of those who have participated in Interscholastic League activities.

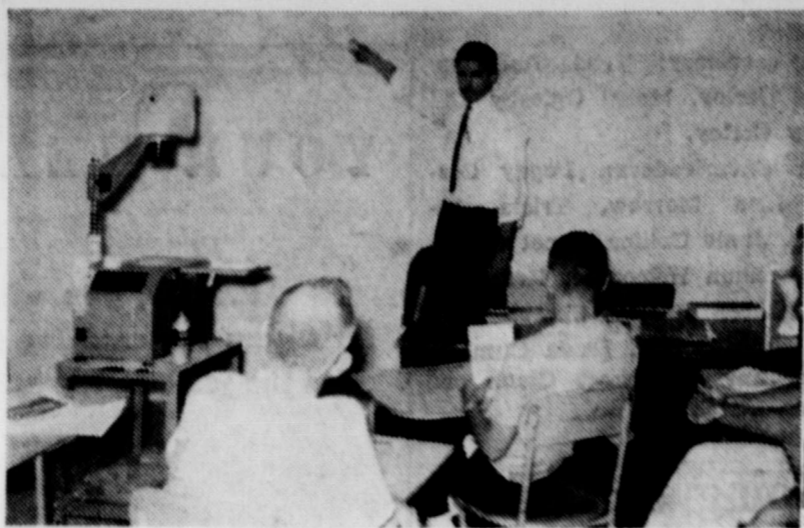
