Angel food Party cake Announces Plans

I parge anel food cake (about
I large angel food cake (about 49c size), break into small pieces. 6 egg yolks
3/4 cup lemon juice
$1 / 2$ cup orange juice
(Juices above should be from esh fruit, not canned or frozen) 1 cup sugar
1 teaspoon oleo.
Put the egg yolks, juices, sugar and oleo in double boiler and cook until it begins to thicken. It does not get very thick. To the above custard add 2 pkgs . plain gelatin which has been dissolved in $1 / 2$ cup water. Stir well and set aside to cool.
Beat
Beat the 6 egg whites and add 2 cup sugar and 1 tsp. almond extract. Beat until stiff and stands in peaks. Add the custard mixture to the beaten egg whites. Grease a long pan or pyrex with crisco or oleo. Put a layer of cusard first, then a layer of cake crumbs, pressing down with your hands. Next a layer of two boxes of frozen strawberries (thawed) juice and all. Add the rest of the custard. Top with chopped pecans or cocoanut. Set in refrig. erator overnight. Cut into squares to serve. We have had several samples submitted, but to date all have been nonscrewworm.
Placings whole sections of newspapers under tomato vines is an easy way to prevent fruit rot according to the Extension Service Horticulturist. He suggests putting papers down after the vines from blowing away. Plastic dryfrom blowing away. Plastic drycleaner bags can be used the same way.
Staking tomato plants sometimes produces larger, better quality frut. makes plants easier to cleaner and makes plants easier to spray However, staked tomatoes and blossom-end rot, and sunscald When staking tomatoes, place sturdy, five-foot stakes about one foot in the ground. Set them about four inches from the plant and avoid cutting tomato roots when setting them. Use of soft cord or strips of old cloth will lessen injury to plants when tying them.
A good method of tying plants to stakes is to loop the material ait between the stem and the stake to form a figure eight. Tie it back of the stake.
If pruning is necessary, break off shoots that grow from the crotch formed by a leaf branch at the main stem. Break the shoots, rather than cutting them, because a knife may spread disease. When pruning, shoots should be removed before they are three in $\ldots$
