II D Agent's News Dept.

Here's information from the University of Kentucky School of Dentistry that should be of interest to many parents. If Johnny comes home with a front tooth in his hand instead of in his mouth, don't panic, says an official at the University.

He suggests that parents head for the nearest dentist's office on the double, "and don't forget to take the tooth with you for it can be put back where it belongs," says Dr. John R. Mink of the University.

Permanent teeth can be replaced, if they are treated quickly enough, and are likely to last six months to six years. There have been a number of instances where parents just push a loose tooth back onto the bond that holds it in the jaw, he says.

The trouble when a tooth is knocked out usually is that parents forget to bring the tooth with them when they come to the dentist.

"Even if it's dirty, we can clean it up and have a good chance of replanting it," Dr. Mink says.

It's time to put away winter woolens. But before you do, be sure they are moth free. Moth eggs and larvae may already be in your clothes — hidden away in pockets and cuffs, under lapels and along seams.

Before you store your woolens take them outside for a good airing. Brush them thoroughly to destroy possible eggs and larvae. Better yet, have your clothes

dry cleaned. Drycleaning kills all stages of clothes moths.

However, don't rely on this protection all summer long. Unless a special mothproofing treatment is applied, you have no assurance that the moths won't find your clothes later. Careful storage is still necessary.

It's best to store garments in a tight chest or trunk along with mapthalene flakes or paradichlorobenzene crystals. Use about 1 pound of there chemicals for a small trunk. Place the flakes or crytsals between layers of garments and then scatter some on top so the fumes can work downward.

In a closet use 1 pound of chemical for each 100 cubic feet of space. Again place the crystals high — on a shelf or tied in a thin cloth bag from a clothes rod. And be sure the closet is tight. For best results, use it only for storage and keep it shut all summer long.


