Oak Creek Lake Catches 15 Inches

Coke County and surrounding area received more fine rains early last Friday morning. Only about .75 inch fell in Bronte, but the rains were heavier in the rural areas, with up to 3.50 inches in the Blackwell area. Oak Creek Lake caught 15-16 inches of water from the downpour.

The additional water in the lake makes the city's water supply look considerably better than it has in several months.

Some delay in small grain harvesting was reported caused by the rains, but benefits to farmers and ranchers are greater than damage.

Robert Lee's Mountain Creek lake completely filled from more than two inches which fell on its watershed, and water ran over the spillway for the first time since 1957.

Crop prospects at the present time are better than usual and stockmen have more time to market animals than they thought a couple of weeks ago.

Since the rains late last week, the weather in this area has been hot and humid, and weatherman says there will be more of it.

6TH GRADE TO JOIN 7TH & 8TH ATHLETICS

Bronte school board last Thursday night approved a change in the athletic program of the school, which will permit sixth graders to participate with seventh and eighth graders in the junior high athletic program. The change is effective in September.

Supt. C. B. Barbee said the change was necessary in order to have sufficient students to carry on the program properly.

UCRA Okays \$80,000 Loan For City Use

The Upper Colorado River Authority approved a loan for the City of Bronte Tuesday when directors met here. Maximum amount of the loan is \$80,000, and money is to be used for improvements in the city water system.

UCRA directors also approved entering into a contract with National Engineering Co. of Austin to do engineering work for the city in determining what needs to be done to the water system to bring it up to the specifications desired.

In addition to improving water service, the city council is anxious to see the improvements made in order to secure a lower fire insurance rate in Bronte. The city now has one of the highest key rates in the state.

Main item of expense in the proposed improvements would be the erection of a new 100 foot water tower. Other main items would include replacement of some three inch water mains with six and eight inch pipe, and the addition of ten new fire plugs. Other changes to be made are of lesser expense.

Revival Meeting Starts Sunday at Central Baptist

A revival meeting will start Sunday, June 21, at Central Baptist Church in Bronte. Services will be held twice daily during the eight-day period. Morning services will be at 9:30 a.m. while evening services will begin at 7:00 p.m.

The Rev. Eldon Crump, pastor of Dallas Park Baptist Church in the Oak Cliff section of Dallas, will do the preaching for the meeting. Noah Pruitt Jr. will be in charge of the song service.

Pastor of the church, the Rev. Wayne N. Stout said this week that everybody is welcome to attend any or all of the services. "Bro. Crump is a good evangelist and pastor," the local preacher said. "He understands the problems of Christian living today. You will enjoy hearing him, and we extend a welcome to all to attend the meeting."

The visiting preacher has served several churches in East Texas, including 12 years as pastor of First Baptist Church at Grand Saline, before moving to Dallas to assume the pastorate at the Dallas Park Church.

Mayor Royce Lee said Tuesday that the city has been in communication with the State Insurance Board and has information as to the exact needs of the city to secure a lower insurance rate. Meeting Called Tonight to Study Traffic Problems

An important meeting concerning local traffic law enforcement will be held tonight (Thursday) at 8 p.m. in the city hall. Everyone is urged to attend. All law enforcement officers, school officials, city officials have been given special invitations.

Mayor Royce Lee, in setting up the meeting, said that traffic violations in the city are mounting, and now is the time to face up to some possible solutions.

Mayor Lee said teen-age drivers and their parents would be particularly welcome, but pointed out that they are certainly not the only offenders, but that they represent a large group of drivers.

Bronte city council is seeking the cooperation of all law enforcement officers in the area in trying to correct the problem.

Senior Ball Club Wins 1, Loses 1

Bronte's Senior League baseball team lost their first game of the season at Robert Lee Monday night, 3-2, as they closed out the first half of the season. Robert Virden pitched the game, allowing only 3 scattered hits, but the local club was plagued with seven errors and a shortage of players.

In other play last week, they defeated the previously undefeated Santa Anna team here last Saturday night 5-2. Robbie Cook gave up only three hits for the game.

The Enterprise failed to mention last week that Manuel Reyes pitched a no-hit ball game at Winters the week before when the locals won 8-6.

Upcoming games include Wingers at Bronte Saturday night and Winters here Monday night. Both games will be at 8 p.m.

Managers Clyde Lee and Jake Morrow said they expect to have their roster at full strength for the second half of the season. Due to vacations etc., they have had only one substitute for the past three games.

Standings early this week, Santa Anna and Bronte were tied for the league lead, with one loss each; Robert Lee and Wingers were tied for second, with two losses each.

School Property Valuations Raised; Cost Will Be 12 Pct.

Bronte Independent School District property owners are faced with an increase in their 1964 taxes, according to an announcement made late last week by Supt. C. B. Barbee.

Individual notices have been mailed to school tax payers announcing that an equalization board will meet July 1 at 2 p.m. in the city hall in Bronte to consider complaints concerning the increase. A notice of the meeting is also in this issue of The Enterprise.

A blanket 15 per cent increase in tax valuations has been recommended by the board. However, the tax increase will amount only to approximately 12 per cent. The difference in the figures is due to the fact that the tax rate for debt retirement will be lowered when the new valuations are put into effect. Presently, the school district collects \$1.50 tax per \$100 valuation for maintenance and operation expenses and 40 cents per \$100 for debt retire-

ment. More money is needed for operation costs, but not for debt retirement so plans call for lowering the 40 cent figure to 34 cents. This figures out to approximately a 12 cent increase in school taxes.

Barbee said the reason for the increase is a very simple one: during the last four years valuations (practically all in the oil industry) have dropped \$1,371,764, leaving the school short on funds to carry out its present program.

The superintendent pointed out that an increase in taxes is the only way the school can maintain or improve its program and is, therefore, necessary.

Any taxpayer who wishes to discuss the matter with the equalization board is invited to be at the city hall between 2 and 4:30 p.m. on July 1. The board is made up of D. K. Glenn, chairman; Sid Evans, secretary; Austin Sandusky, member; and F. S. Higginbotham, alternate member.

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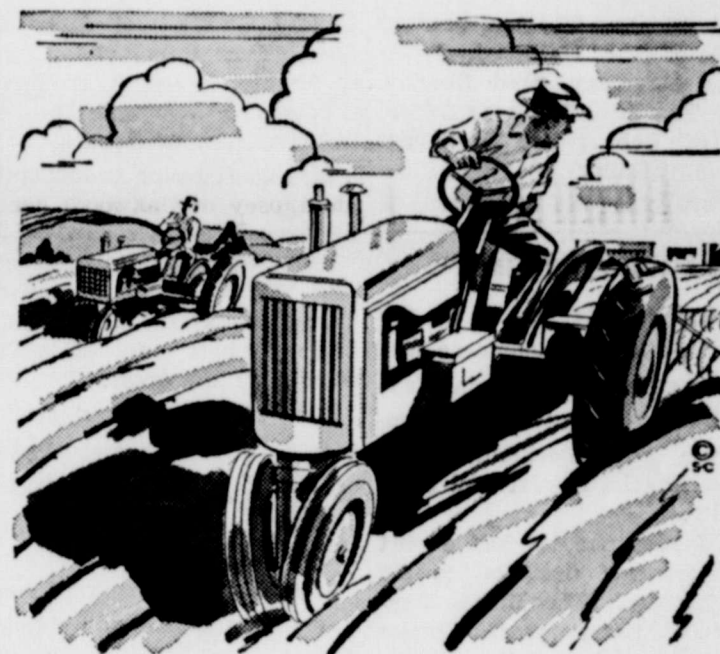

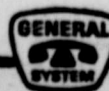

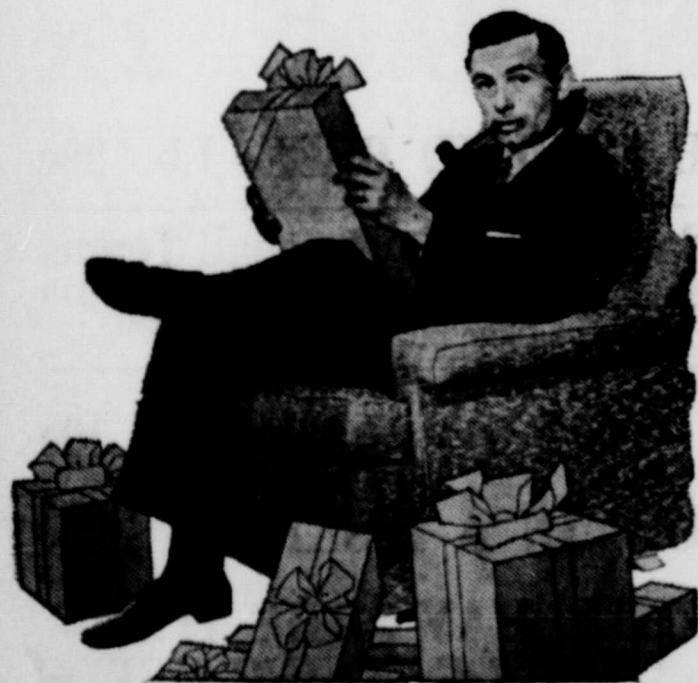

The latest word in home preservation of pickles and relishes is "heat-process." That's what the U. S. Department of Agriculture recommends to maintain the texture, color, and flavor of pickled fruits and vegetables.

Processing of these products is in a boiling-water bath (rather than cold pack or open kettle canning). This will inactivate enzymes which might cause off flavors and destroy spoilage-causing micro-organisms such as yeasts and molds.

Micro-organisms in pickled foods are not considered dangerous as long as acid content is high to begin with and remains high during storage. But if spoilage micro-organisms survive processing, they may begin to grow within the jar of food and reduce the acid content. In the resulting low-acid surroundings, botulinum spores, if present, could start to grow and produce a deadly toxin.

To be safe, use processing times worked out by the researchers.

I am including a recipe from the new publication, "Making Pickles and Relishes at Home."

Dilled Green Beans

(7 pints)

4 pounds (about 4 quarts) whole

green beans

¼ teaspoon per pint jar, hot red pepper, crushed

* teaspoon per pint jar whole mustard seed

½ teaspoon per pint jar dill seed

1 clove per pint jar garlic

5 cups vinegar

5 cups water

½ cup salt

Wash beans thoroughly; drain and cut into lengths to fill pint jars. Pack beans into clean, hot jars; add pepper, mustard seed, dill seed and garlic.

Combine vinegar, water and salt. heat to boiling. Pour boiling liquid over beans, filling to ½ inch from top of jar. Adjust jar lids as required for the type of lid used.

Process in boiling water for five minutes. (Jars will cool the water, so start to count processing time as soon as water in canner returns to boiling.) Remove jars and retighten seals if necessary. Set jars upright, several inches apart, on a wire rack to cool.

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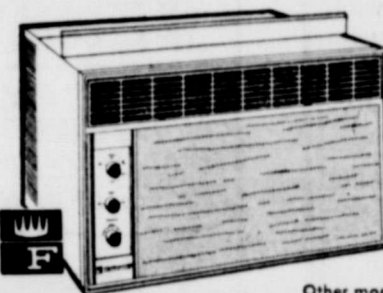

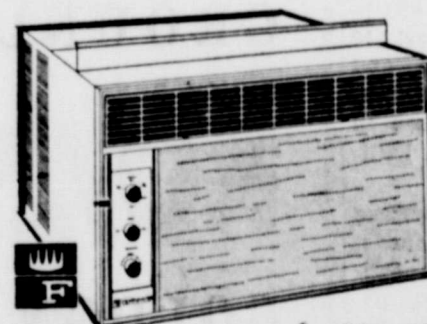

Freezing Is Simple and Safe Method of Preserving Food

"Freezing is one of the simplest and fastest methods of preserving foods at home. It keeps the natural color, fresh flavor and food values of most fruits, vegetables and meats, however canning is still a good method of food preservation," said Mrs. Fay C. Roe, county home demonstration agent. Mrs. Roe demonstrated how to freeze and can vegetables and fruits to an audience of 37 persons last Wednesday afternoon in Bronte at the West Texas Utilities office.

She warned the group to beware of poor packaging for frozen foods, and showed several kinds of packaging materials that had the necessary qualities of "moisture-vapor proof or moisture-vapor resistant. In discussing canning, Mrs. Roe said, "If you do not have a home freezer, do not be discouraged as improved methods of canning make it more enjoyable and it preserves the natural goodness of foods."
