## Farm Bureau to Sponsor Coke Men at A&M Training School

Coke County Farm Bureau is sponsoring the attendance of four volunteer firemen from this county at the 35th annual Texas Firemen's Training School to be held July 19-25 on the campus of Texas A&M University at College Station, according to Ben Boykin

of Robert Lee, president. Local volunteer firemen planning to attend are Buddy Reed and Cecil Coalson.

R. C. Sawyer and Virgil Hendley of Robert Lee will attend. The training school is being conducted by the Engineering Extension Service in cooperation with the Texas Education Agency. The school furnishes up-to-date training and information on fire protection and prevention as well as fire-fighting techniques.

In addition to attending the regular courses at the school, volunteer firemen sponsored by Farm Bureau will also attend two special seminars July 20 and 21 dealing with rural fire protection.

Farm Bureau pays \$52.50 of the \$57.50 tuition for sponsored members of local volunteer fire departments. This covers lodging and meals for the one-week course. Across the state, some 59 Farm Bureaus are cooperating with the Texas Farm Bureau Mutual Insurance Company of Waco in helping defray expenses of 140 volunteer firemen in attending the school.

Boykin pointed out that Farm Bureau carries on a year-round fire prevention and fire protection program. Joe Smetana, Waco, Texas Farm Bureau safety director, has presented a fire prevention demonstration to 140 schools and 30 clubs in the past year. The TFB Mutual Company also pays \$75 to local fire departments answering a call outside city limits to fight fires involving property of Farm Bureau insureds.

## Deposits at Bank Down Slightly

Deposits in First National Bank in Bronte showed a slight decrease from a year ago, according to a statement of condition dated June 30. The deposits were down slightly compared to the last bank call on April 15.

Deposits June 30 amounted to \$2,425,569.49 compared to \$2,427,877.96 on June 29, 1963, a drop of only a little more than \$2,000.

Loans are up, however, with \$941,059.67 out on June 30, compared with \$869,832.40 a year ago, and \$890,879.88 on April 15.

Total assets of the Bronte bank were up, compared to a year ago. The figure in this column on June 30 showed \$2,772,069.49, while on June 29, 1963, total assets were \$2,760,377.96.

Capital accounts of the bank continue to increase with \$346,500.00 in this account on June 30, compared to \$332,500.00 a year ago, and \$338,466.49 on April 15.

## AD-LIB-BEN

This week we are turning over this column to our daughter, Margi, who has written the following narrative on her trip last weekend to the Attorney General's Youth Conference in Austin. Ronnie Lee also attended the conference, and we hope to persuade him and Margi to write some articles for future issues of The Enterprise in more detailed form on what they learned at the conference. Here's her story:

**Attorney General's Youth Conference**

Last Thursday night I stood in the Student Union Building of the University of Texas, surrounded by teenagers from all over Texas, and I asked myself, "Why Am I here?" I had been asked by Mayor Royce Lee to attend the Attorney General's Youth Conference, along with Ronnie Lee from Bronte, and Carolyn Parker and Linda Jacoby from Robert Lee. When we left Coke County with our sponsor, County Attorney Frank Dickey, none of us had any idea what the Attorney General's Youth Conference was about. We were just going to be going somewhere.

When we reached Austin, we were rushed from speech to film to seminar. We attended six seminars — one each on school drop-outs, vocational education, law enforcement, home town youth conferences, community service, and spare time and recreation. We were assailed by a barrage of statistics and we were constantly reminded that these statistics represented people. We learned a lot and we were shocked — shocked that the crime rate in Texas is growing five times the rate of the population and seven times in the younger generation.

Sunday morning we all went to church. Protestant services were held in the House of Representatives Chamber and Catholic services were held in the Senate

WHEREAS all the citizens of Coke county are concerned about the safety and well-being of farm families from whom we receive our abundance of food and other essential agricultural commodities; and

WHEREAS farm accidents result in over 150 deaths and thousands of disabling injuries in Texas each year; and

WHEREAS farm accidents are responsible for needless suffering and incapacity, and greatly affect the economic well-being and progress of our agricultural population in our county, state, and nation; and

WHEREAS the President of the United States and the Governor of Texas have designated the period of July 19-25, 1964, as FARM SAFETY WEEK; and

WHEREAS throughout this special week, a statewide farm accident prevention and educational program will be undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas Safety Association, and the Coke County Farm Bureau with the theme "Safer American Families Everywhere;" and

WHEREAS records show a notable and steady decline in the number and rate of accident among farm people as a direct result of such worthwhile safety education program:

NOW, THEREFORE, I, W. W. Thetford, County Judge of Coke County, do hereby designate the week of July 19-25, 1964, as FARM SAFETY WEEK and urge all farm families, persons, and organizations allied with agriculture to engage in a purposeful concerted effort to reduce further the number of farm, home, and highway accidents.

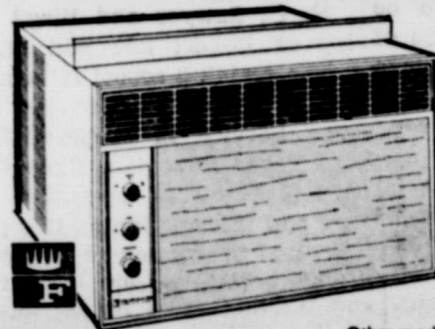
10-YEAR OLD RALPH DAY TO ENTERTAIN LIONS CLUB

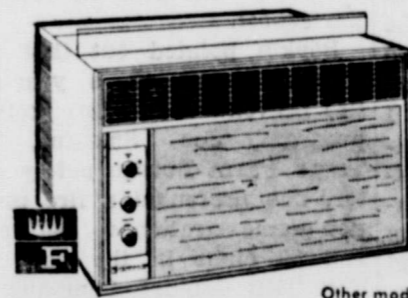

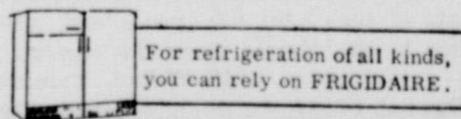

## County Agents News Column

By STERLING LINDSEY

One always enjoys getting away for a few days, but usually they are ready to get back home when the time comes. I enjoyed the cool Colorado climate and the Extension summer school, but, when the three weeks were up I was ready to get home. I wish I had not found it so warm and dry here, though.

About one out of four farm machinery accident victims are under 19 years of age. With National Farm Safety Week coming up July 19-25, wouldn't it be a good time, asks the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, for every farm family to do some checking on their machinery accident record? There was a reason for each accident. Don't make the same mistake twice, warns the Council.

Coke County, as you probably already know, had a case of screwworm last week. The authorities were very concerned since this is the farthest point north that a case has been found.

The screwworm case was found in a baby calf on the Tom Murray place, 11 miles northwest of Bronte. Murray's place is just west of Reese McCorley's place, or about three miles west of the lake at Blackwell.

In order that we may prevent any screwworm buildup in this area we need to check our stock regularly and treat all wounds. Sterile flies have been dropped on the area where the case was found but we need to do our part, also.

Prior to the case being found

here, Schleicher County had the northernmost case. In the last report, seven cases were found in the state during the week. Also, seven cases were found in one county in Arizona.

**AGRICULTURE STILL A GIANT TEXAS INDUSTRY** — Nearly 40 percent of all Texans derive their income wholly or in part from farming or ranching or connected businesses. Despite a continuing decline in the number of people on farms and ranches, many of those leaving the country are not leaving the agricultural industry, explains John McHaney, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, but are shifting into agricultural related businesses.

Max Meisch, Extension Survey Entomologist, will be in the county during the morning of July 23. Definite plans of what will be done while he is here have not been developed, but tentative plans call for two or three field stops to check for insects will be made. We hope to make at least one stop on each side of the county.

If you should have any special insect problem you would like to present to him, please let us know.

**TEXAS PECAN PROSPECTS LOOK GOOD** — Texas pecan production is expected to top all states this year. All major producing areas of the state will have a crop this year. But where the nut casebearer has not been controlled, the outlook is dim. Dry weather and other insects such as the pecan weevil, hickory shuckworm and aspidids will influence the final harvest.

## Farm Safety Week Set for July 19-25

Farm Safety Week has been proclaimed for July 19-25 by President Lyndon B. Johnson, by Texas Governor John Connally and by County Judge W. W. Thetford. The proclamations all urge everyone who is connected in any way with agricultural enterprises to make a concerted effort during this week to reduce farm accidents.

An appalling number of lives are lost, and injuries sustained each year in farm accidents. Reduction of this loss of life and needless suffering, as well as property losses involved, is the aim of officials in urging active participation in Farm Safety Week.

Organizations which will take part in sponsoring the special week are Texas Farm Bureau, Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Safety Association.

One of the projects featured by Coke County Farm Bureau is sponsoring four county firemen in attending a Firemen's Training School at Texas A&M College.

## H D Agent's News Dept.

Americans spent an average of \$400 per person for food in 1963. That's less than 19 percent of their take home pay — a record low in the United States. It's less than any other country in the world. The total food expenditures were about 3 per cent over 1962.

Americans have shifted to more expensive foods and to convenience foods — bakery products instead of the raw ingredients, frozen french fries or shoe-string potatoes in a can in place of unpeeled potatoes in a sack. In 1963 Americans ate more meat, more vegetables, but less fruit. They ate less fish and fewer eggs.

Eat better for less. The Extension Food and Nutrition Specialists say milk is your most economical buy for calcium — the nutrient most often short in United States diets. Milk is also your cheapest source of riboflavin, one of the B vitamins. Whole grain and enriched flour, cereals, and baked goods, as well as dry beans and peas, are inexpensive sources of seven of the nine key nutrients. Potatoes are a good buy in thiamine and niacin, two of the B vitamins, and in vitamin C. Best buys for vitamin C, however, are citrus fruits. By far the most economical sources of vitamin A are dark-green and deep-yellow vegetables.

When chlorine bleach solutions are mixed with ammonia, lye, vinegar or toilet bowl cleaners a very dangerous gas is liberated which can cause serious injury or death.

Chlorine is put in the bleaches in a stable form. When it is combined with ammonia, lye, vinegar, or other such solutions used in households, the chlorine is released as gas.

To protect yourself and your family, learn and teach the family members never to mix bleaching agents with other household cleaners.

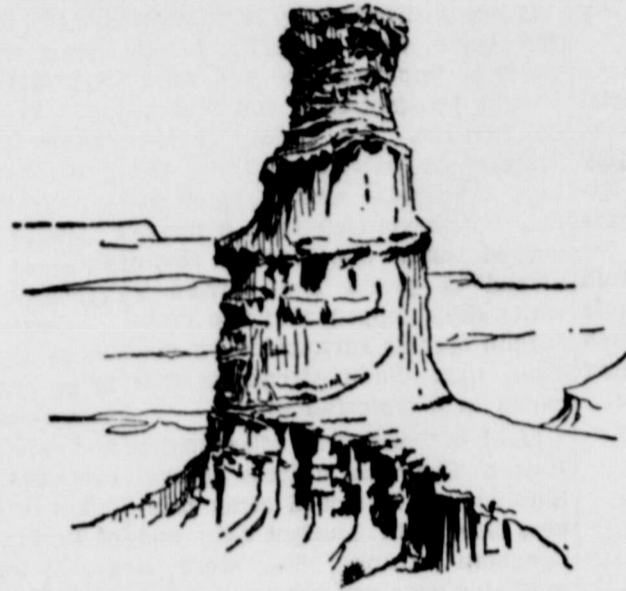

### Palo Duro Canyon State Park

Etched deeply in the high plains of the Panhandle, just south of Amarillo, lies a spectacular gorge, widely renowned for its scenic beauty. This is Palo Duro Canyon, a great 15,000 acre state park of Texas. You enter it on a road which winds for miles along the bottom of the vast gorge. You see many remarkable formations such as the "Lighthouse" and "Balanced Rock" which have been formed by centuries of erosion which created the Canyon. As you drive slowly along the Canyon's beauty is enhanced by constant changes in delicate coloring. Coronado explored the Canyon in 1541, and in 1876 Col.
