The possibility of a new lake in Coke County is big news and could have lots of promise for this country and area. There are lots of details to be worked out on a matter of this size and we don't want to be caught asleep at the switch when the train comes by.

Of course it will help the county as a whole, regardless of what we manage to negotiate for, but there is one thing we should remember in keeping our eye on this matter: the water impounded in this lake is about the last available on the Colorado River. That means if we allow all its potential water production to be contracted to Midland, Odessa, Big Spring and other towns to the west and north of us, we will wind up high and dry and will have thrown away our chances for any real growth and future.

We have fairly ample water supply right now, but most of us would like to see Bronte grow. We would like to see Bronte grow. We would like to see the Colorado River Valley in Coke County turned into an oasis in this dry country. We would like to see a pleasant climate created here for industry. None of this can happen without plenty of water.

We don't know what steps are necessary to protect our interests but we do know wherever and whenever a dam is built on the Colorado River in this area, we should see to it that our water needs for ALL TIME TO COME are taken care of — it will be our last chance.

Firemen Busy, Answer 3 Calls In Past Week

Bronte's volunteer firemen have been busy, answering three calls since last Wednesday afternoon.

Late Wednesday of last week, an old, delapidated out building located across the street south from Bill Wriple's house on an otherwise vacant lot, caught fire.

Early Thursday morning, the firemen were called to a blaze which destroyed a vacant house on the park road in east Bronte. It is understood the house belonged to Jack Eaton of San Angelo. It has been unoccupied for a number of years.

A gigantic lake west of Robert Lee has been proposed by the Colorado River Municipal Water District. The proposed lake would be formed by a dam across the river two miles west of the Coke county seat, and would impound approximately one-half million acre feet of water.

Directors of CRMWD, meeting last Friday at Big Spring, voted to apply for a permit to build the dam. The water group already has a permit to build a smaller lake in the south part of Mitchell County, but directors decided the Coke County site to be more feasible.

Robert Lee Ousts Bronte in Teen Baseball Contest

By virtue of this win Robert Lee will represent the Bronte district in the area tournament at Brownwood. Their first game will be against Midland on July 29.

Miss Linda Carol Jones New Commercial Teacher

C. B. Barbee, local school superintendent, announced Tuesday that school officials have received a contract from Linda Carol Jones. Miss Jones will teach commercial and language arts in the local school next fall. A native of Plains, Tex., Miss Jones is a spring graduate of McMurry College in Abilene.

The proposed lake would have a surface area of 14,950 acres, with greatest width of 19,000 feet and average width 6,783 feet. Greatest depth would be 104 feet with average depth running 32.7 feet. The dam would back water up the river for 18 miles, almost to Silver. The dam itself would run almost directly north and south for a distance of 20,400 feet, almost four miles.

Letters have been sent out to various cities in the 11 county area, including Bronte and Robert Lee to project their water needs of the future as a guide to engineers in working out plans for the giant lake. Included in the area are the following counties: Mitchell, Scurry, Ector, Midland, Martin, Howard, Glasscock, Sterling, Coke, Nolan and Runnels. Each of these counties is wholly or partly in the Colorado River watershed.

Bigger Than Lake Thomas

The proposed lake would be about 2.4 times as big as Lake J. B. Thomas, located up the river in Scurry County. A comparison with other nearby lakes show it would be about half as big as Lake Buchanan; approximately two-thirds the size of Possum Kingdom Lake; nearly 12½ times as large as Oak Creek Lake; nearly four times the capacity of Lake Brownwood.

CRMWD has spent a great deal of time and money during the last few years trying to work out a solution to the salt problem which plagues the river. The problem, engineers say, is not so great at the Robert Lee site as at the original location in southern Mitchell County.

Roads Must Be Moved

If the dam is built at the Robert Lee location, approximately eight miles of highway will have to be re-located. Most of it is included in State Highway 158, but a small portion FM 2034 (Robert Lee-Water Valley). Also inundated would be two dozen oil wells which will have to be raised above the water level.

Officials of the Upper Colorado River Authority, told the daily press last week after the announcement was made by CRMWD that they would be watching developments with interest. Gerald C. Allen of Robert Lee, chairman of UCRA, was quoted as saying "The UCRA is going to protect the rights of users in our area, and if it can be arranged for us to get our share of water by negotiations, they have our blessing."

It is known over the area that a large amount of water will have to be sold to larger, fast-growing cities west of here in order for the cost of the proposed lake to be retired. Midland, Odessa, Big Spring and other cities are expected to be the principal customers. UCRA officials seemed to be of the opinion that they could support the project provided a sufficient amount of water necessary for towns in their area is not contracted to the cities to the west and north.

Mitchell Opposed

Sunday's edition of the Colorado City Record had a story which stated they were opposed to the Coke County site. A resolution protesting the location was signed by officials of Colorado City, Lorraine and Westbrook. They are for locating the dam at the originally proposed site in the south part of their county.

County Agents News Column

By STERLING LINDSEY

Dry weather continues to be the number one discussion topic, the number one activity control and probably the number one market factor.

Despite our dry conditions, Coke County looks much better than most areas of our State and New Mexico. We are not alone in our need for a good rain. July and August, for most of Texas, are normally dry months. We may not have much relief for awhile yet.

The State sustained three cases of screwworms last week. One of these, as you know, came from Coke County. The other two cases came from Crockett and Pecos Counties, one case each.

We and the authorities of the screwworm control program are hoping all cases can be stopped before fall. If the screwworm should get a toe hold, the program could have a setback this fall.

"Stock your pond with whatever kind or kinds you like to catch," says Wallace G. Klussmann, Extension wildlife conservation specialist, Texas A&M University. "If you are a catfisherman only, then there is no reason to stock other species; the same goes for bass or sunfish. If you want all kinds,

then bass, channel catfish, and redear sunfish are compatible."

Evidence indicates that it is not necessary to stock a forage fish along with largemouth bass. Many sources still recommend stocking a sunfish such as the bluegill along with bass. These cover large sections of the country including states north of Texas where the growing and spawning seasons are shorter and more favorable for bass-bluegill combinations.

A female bluegill can spawn as many as four times during a single season in Texas, notes the specialist. The result is thousands of small bluegills that never reach edible hize.

Another factor contributing to the bluegill dilemma is that bluegills are not the "ice cream" in any fish's diet. Bass prefer feeding on their own kind and other species rather than on bluegills. Channel catfish are scavengers and eat few bluegills.

If sunfish are desired, the most suitable species is the redear since it spawns only once a year and thereby lengthens the time before overcrowding occurs, says the specialist.

Crappie or white perch should not be stocked in ponds having less than five to ten surface acres because, like bluegills, they will overpopulate a small pond in one or two years.

A pond should always be stocked

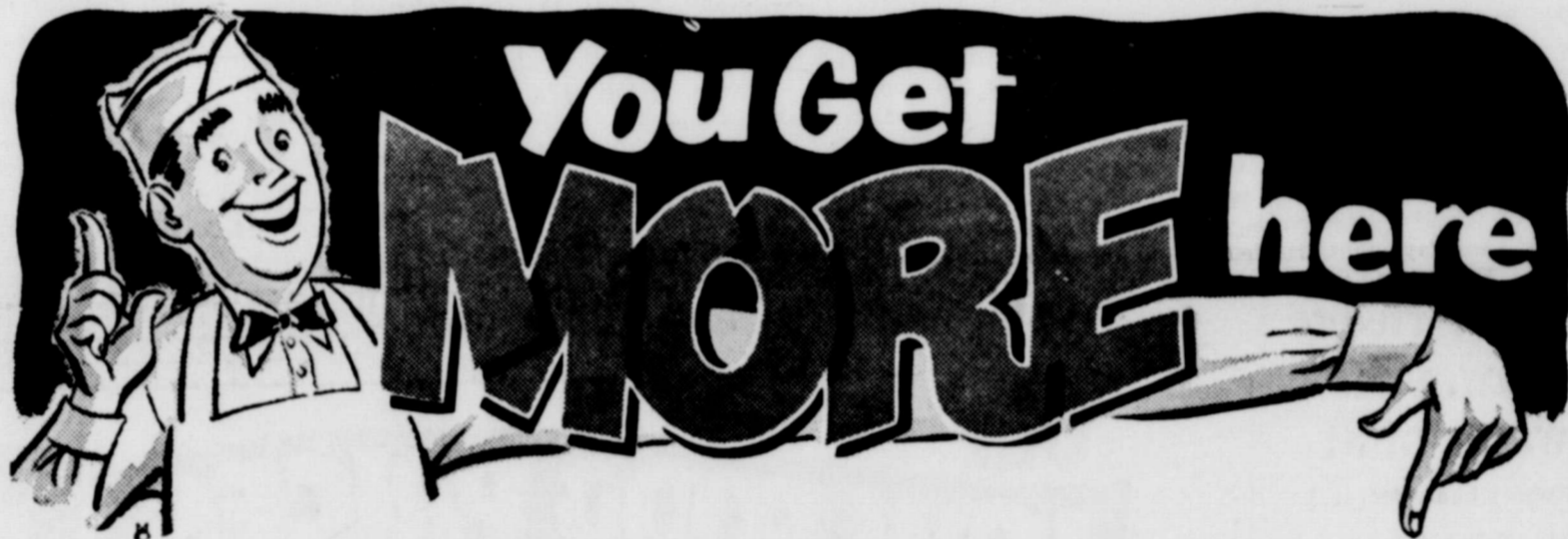
with fingerlings that are approximately the same size, such as those obtained from state and federal hatcheries, says the specialist. Never go to a nearby stream or pond and seine fish for stocking.

"A balanced fish population is almost impossible to obtain if stocking of all sizes and kinds of fish is practiced. Never introduce fingerlings into a pond containing adult fish, particularly bass," warns Klussmann. "A pond should be stocked with a balanced group of fingerlings only after the adults have been removed."

Fingerlings for stocking private ponds can be obtained free of charge from either state or federal hatcheries.

Application forms and stocking recommendations can be obtained from the local game warden. Requests for stock fish may be made at any time.

It is important for pond owners to fill the application card correctly and not to "hedge" on the size of a pond in an effort to get more fish, the specialist said. It is just as bad to stock a pond with too many of the right kind as it is to stock it with undesirable kinds. Just as range land has a certain capacity for a specific number of animals, a pond can only support a specific number of pounds of desirable fish.
