The Labor Day celebration is a big thing in Bronte every year and has steadily grown since it was started. This year it is expected to be even bigger, since the Diamond Anniversary of the county will be celebrated at the same time.

J. T. Henry Shows Building Display At Ag. Workshop

J. T. Henry, vocational agriculture teacher in the Bronte Schools, attended the In-Service Education Workshop for Teachers of Vocational Agriculture, August 4-7, at the Rice Hotel in Houston. It is sponsored by the Texas Education Agency.

The workshop featured several area meetings which provided the teachers with professional and technical information, an awards breakfast and several banquets.

"One of the most interesting speakers," Henry said "was Earl L. Butz, Dean of the School of Agriculture, Purdue University." Other speakers were J. W. Edgar, Commissioner of Education; M. A. Browning, Assistant Commissioner for Vocational Education; and George H. Hurt, Director, Agricultural Education and chairman of the workshop. The climax of the workshop was an address by Gov. More Entries Needed in Queen Mother Contest

Bronte Jaycee officials this week expressed the hope that they would soon receive a lot more entries in the "Queen Mother" contest they are sponsoring for the Diamond Jubilee celebration.

Wayne Dunham, president, said "surely there must be many women in the county well qualified for this honor and we wish their daughters, friends or relatives would write us and nominate them." He pointed out that many women have lived in this county for many years, have raised families that went through the schools here, and have contributed much in many ways to the life of this area.

A few rules have been set up for the contest and include: the candidate must have lived in the county at least 20 years, but does not necessarily have to be living here now; the candidate must be available to attend the celebration and the person making the nomination must be responsible for seeing that the winner is present. The candidate need not necessarily be a mother, but may have made valuable contributions in other ways.

All nominations should be made in the form of a letter addressed to the Bronte Jaycee Chapter, and naming reasons why the candidate should be selected "Queen Mother" of the Diamond Jubilee.

Deadline for submitting nominations is a week from Saturday, or August 29, and Jaycees urged that persons get their nominations in as soon as possible.

Lake Catches 4 1/2 Ft. Water

Heavy rains to the north and northeast last weekend brought the level of Oak Creek Lake up 4 1/2 feet. It was reported that the water caught is an 18 months supply for the users of water from the lake, which includes Bronte.

Nearly one-half inch fell in Bronte. But the downpour to the north and northeast ranged up to seven inches in several showers.

This water catch at Oak Creek Lake is the largest in several years.

Farmers and ranchers in the area hit by the heavy rain are expecting to grow some grass before frost, but those who were on the short end of the rain are still looking for a more general type downpour.

Humidity remained high in the area, but 100-plus temperatures were forecast for Thursday.

Candidates include Jose Reyes Olivas, candidate for a Bachelor of Business Administration degree in General Business.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Simon Olivas of Bronte and is a 1960 graduate of the Bronte High School.

Olivas has been a distinguished student for the spring semester at the school and recently took part in a nationwide exam given by the Insurance Institute of America. His grade point ration was 2.30 compared to a 2.25 required.

His minor was in computer science.

More Plans for School Opening Announced Wed.

More plans for the opening of the 1964-65 term at Bronte schools were announced this week.

Classes will actually start Monday, Aug. 31, but a number of items are on the schedule call for action before that time.

Teacher in-service training will be held Aug. 27 and 28, with all teachers present to make final plans for the opening of the school term.

Prin. Joe B. Simpson announced that high school registration will be held ahead of time on Tuesday, Aug. 25 in the lunchroom. Freshmen will register from 10 to 11 a.m.; sophomores, 11 a.m. to 12 noon; juniors, 1 to 2:30 p.m.; seniors, 2:30 to 4 p.m.

Elementary Principal James Golson said that proof of immunization against tetanus, diphtheria, whooping cough, small pox and polio will be required of all students who do not have that record on file. Also, a record of birth is required of all students who are entering the first grade for the first time and for those who plan to participate in athletics.

These records should be brought when the student reports for registration on the opening day of school, Golson said.

Immunization records will be copied and returned. Birth records will be returned, provided they are clear enough to be copied; otherwise they will become part of the school record.

Band Director R. H. 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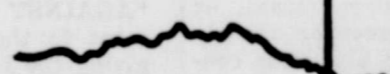

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10 proposing an Amendment to Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Subsection to be known as 51a-2; giving the Legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such medical payments; providing that the amounts paid out of state funds shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds for such purposes; providing that certain means relating to the correction or remedying of abnormalities of vision shall be included within such medical care service or assistance; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection to be known as Subsection 51a-2, which shall read as follows:

"Subsection 51a-2. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws and to make payment for same, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for

needed medical services. The payments for such medical assistance on behalf of such needy individuals shall be in such amounts as provided by the Legislature; provided, however, that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds for such purposes; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States, such financial aid in the form of medical assistance on behalf of the needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services, as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age and over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such medical assistance; and pro-

viding that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision."

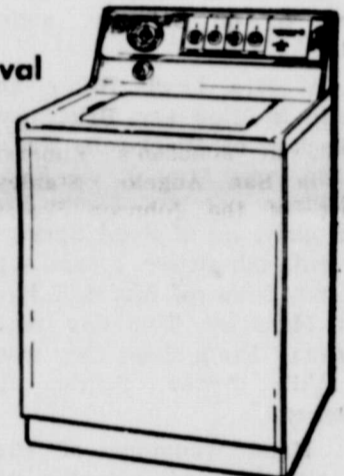
"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age and over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such medical assistance; and providing that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.

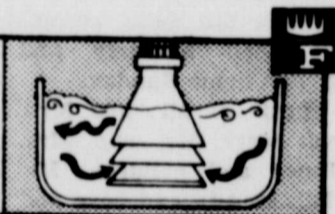

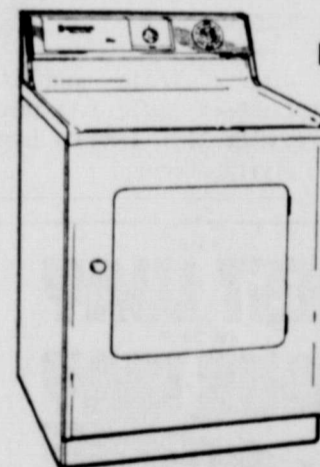
