Celebration Plans Finished

1964-65 School Term Begins Here Monday

Regular classes will start Monday, Aug. 31, to begin the 1964-65 year of Bronte Schools. High school students registered Tuesday and will be ready to begin class work immediately when they report Monday morning.

Teacher in-service training will be on the program today and Friday. All teachers are expected to be present to make final plans for the coming year of school work.

Students and teachers will meet at 8:10 a.m. Monday in the school auditorium for an assembly. Following that, regular classes will be held, with buses running at the usual time and the lunchroom in operation at noon.

Principal James Golson said that all elementary school students must show proof of immunization for tetanus, diphtheria, whooping cough, small pox and

polio, providing they do not already have the records on file at school. Also, birth records will be required of all students entering the first grade for the first time and for those who expect to participate in athletics. If possible

In addition to the presentation of the contestants at the Saturday night event, which will be held in the school auditorium, there will be a well rounded program of entertainment. Each contestant will be expected to perform some display of talent, which will be considered in the judging.

Top three contestants will be selected Saturday night, but the Miss Bronte winner will not be announced until this part of the program comes up at the celebration Monday evening.

A definite program of activities for Bronte's Diamond Jubilee Celebration was worked out Tuesday when a coordinating committee met at the City Hall. The gala occasion will be held on Labor Day at Bronte County Park. In addition to annual Labor Day barbecue, which has grown to be an annual affair, there will be a program this year to commemorate Coke County's 75th birthday and to honor old timers of the area.

John Ben Sheppard, Odessa oil man, will be the main speaker for the occasion. A former attorney general of the State of Texas, Sheppard also distinguished himself as president of the U. S. Junior Chamber of Commerce, several years ago. In addition to his business activities, he is now president of the Texas Historical Survey Committee.

Other distinguished guests will be Sen. Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo, Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough, president of the Coke County Historical Survey Committee of Robert Lee, the old settlers of this area and possibly others.

The program has been worked out as follows:

At 5:50 p.m. the Master of ceremonies, Mayor Royce Lee, will make announcements necessary for carrying out the program.

This will be followed by flag raising ceremony by Bronte Boy Scout Troop and playing of the Star Spangled Banner by the Bronte Longhorn Band, H. O. Whitt adjutant of the George Scott

Special Invitation To Old Timers Who Were in Coke in '89

A very special invitation is issued to everyone who was in Coke County in April, 1889, when the county was organized, said a spokesman for the coordinating committee for Bronte Diamond Jubilee Celebration.

All such persons who are known to the committee will be sent a special letter of invitation, but there may be some whose names or address are not known. Children and grandchildren of these old timers are asked to help the committee in locating these persons who have been here at least 75 years.

Anyone knowing the whereabouts of a 75-year Coke resident is asked to contact Ben Oglesby at the Bronte Enterprise. He will see that an invitation is sent, if the information is received in time to get it in the mail before Labor Day.

Legion Post of Bronte will then lead a pledge of allegiance to the flag. This will be followed by the invocation by the Rev. Murrell Johns, pastor of First Baptist Church.

At 6 p.m. a dinner of barbecue, beans, bread, salad, onions, pickles, coffee, iced tea and dessert will be served. Aubrey Denman, caretaker of the county park here, is in charge of the food preparation and serving.

At 7 p.m., Edward M. Cumbie will deliver a welcoming address to the crowd.

Cumbie's talk will be followed by a short period for recognizing old timers and distinguished guests. The winner of Bronte Jaycee's Queen Mother Contest will then be presented.

As president of the Coke County Historical Survey Committee, Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough will then introduce the speaker, the Honorable John Ben Sheppard. His talk will also include the dedication of a historical marker to be erected in South Bronte at the intersection of highways 277 and 158. Sen. Dorsey Hardeman and other distinguished guests will be asked to participate in the dedication.

Final event of the program will be the presentation of Miss Bronte, winner of another Jaycee contest, who will not be known until Monday evening.

In addition to their duties in the flag raising ceremony, Bronte Boy Scouts will also help direct the flow of traffic through the food lines and assist guests in any way possible. Bronte firemen will be in charge of parking automobiles and will assist Denman in preparation of salad and slicing meat. Bronte Lions will be in charge of setting up the serving tables and getting the food placed on them.

Following the opening ceremony, Bronte Band will play while the crowd is going through serving lines and eating.

Denman said he is preparing 600 pounds of barbecue, enough for at least 1,000 persons, with enough beans and other trimmings to feed the large crowd which is expected.

Mayor Lee said, in commenting on the Diamond Anniversary Celebration, "This program and barbecue is requiring lots of work on the part of lots of people and we hope there will be a big crowd present. This celebration is for all the folks in this area and we want them all to be here. We are issuing a special invitation to old timers, for they are the people we especially want to honor."

WTU Lowers Rates \$1,100,000

Bronte consumers of electricity will benefit from the reduction in the income tax collected from them by the United States government when the new rates go into effect next month.

A company-wide \$1,100,000 annual reduction in electric rates was announced today by West Texas Utilities Company. One hundred and sixty three towns and communities served by the Utilities Company will benefit from the rate reduction.

The revised schedule of elec-

tric rates was filed with the City by Marvin Bryant, WTU local manager. The new rates will be effective with meter readings made after August 31, 1964. The reduction of rates is wholly voluntary on the company's part, Mr. Bryant said.

These new rate schedules result from a reduction in the Company's income taxes due to recent changes in the federal income tax rates and the increased usage of electricity by present customers, together with greater company operating efficiencies and economies.

"These rate reductions," Si Phillips, WTU President said, "are evidence of our policy of reducing the cost of service to our customers whenever we can. The \$490,000 direct reduction in our federal income taxes, plus the improved operating efficiencies of new generating equipment we have recently put into service, as well as the new facilities now under construction, make it possible for us to pass on again real savings to our customers. Based on 1963 sales, the new rate schedules will represent a reduction of about 3½ percent company-wide."

If you're going to pot a plant or two, it's all right to use some of the soil in your back yard or the nearby woods. But, you shouldn't use it "as is". It needs to be purified to make it as disease-free as possible.

Put the soil in a shallow pan and bake it in your oven at 180 to 240 degrees for 45 to 60 minutes. This will pasteurize it.

Now, mix the soil with one-third sand — also pasteurized in your oven — and pasteurized peat moss. You'll be able to grow almost any house plant in this mixture.

Don't serve your family the same cooked green vegetable day after day. You should serve an occasional, not-so-familiar green vegetable. And try these seasonings to transform your family's regular favorites into something special —

With snap beans, blackeye peas, or summer squash, cook a tablespoon or two of minced onion, green pepper or parsley.

Put a small pinch of herb or spice in the water when you cook lima beans.

A little vinegar and sugar heated together make a good dressing for snap beans or cabbage, with or without a few tablespoons of cream.

Point up the flavor of any green vegetable with meat drippings, butter, margarine, or salad oil with lemon juice, horseradish, or garlic. Or add bits of crisply fried bacon, especially to spinach or other greens.

Bronte is one of 125 Texas cities in which these new reflectorized signs will be placed. They are authorized by the State Building Commission, which recently signed the contract for their manufacture.

These markers, designed to inform tourists of historical sites in Bronte, will be placed on the city limit signposts on N.S. 277 North and U. S. 277 South by the Texas Highway Department. They measure 24 by 24 inches and are made of steel with white reflective letters reading "Historical Markers in City" on a black background.

Town selection was determined by the Texas Historical Markers previously erected there.

County Agents News Column

The Commercial or Range ewe lamb program has become a popular program among the Coke County 4-H Club and FFA Chapter members. Present indications are that there will be 14 groups of lambs on feed this year.

Much of the credit for the sudden increase can be credited to the grant from the Ford Foundation for a commercial ewe lamb program among members of the two groups. Joe Rawlings, in winning the Ford Almanac Sheep Efficiency Award in 1963, won a grant that established the sheep improvement program.

Members expected to participate in the program this year that will receive support from the grant are Sharon, Rebecca and Audrey Dee Walker, of Robert Lee; Jimmy, Ronny and Marcia Varnadore, Robert Lee; Keith Waldrop, Robert Lee; Nicky and Mike Arrott, and Jerry Parker, Bronte and Roy Lee Baker, Tennyson.

In addition to the Foundation program members, Barbara and Connie Blaylock and Carl Blair, of Robert Lee, will be feeding groups of selected fine wool ewe lambs.

Our breeding sheep division of the County Show in January will be by far the largest ever as a result of the program. Approximately 50 of the ewe lambs will be shown in the County Show.

Cotton root rot was not the problem over the County that it has been in former years. Our limited amount of moisture probably was the major reason for the small amount of root rot.

Complete control of root rot on a field scale is impossible, but deep plowing and crop rotation can reduce this destructive disease in next year's crop. Stalks should be shredded immediately after the crop is harvested and then plowed under to a depth of 12 or more inches for best results. Also, using cotton land in rotation with a grass crop will reduce the cotton root rot incidence.

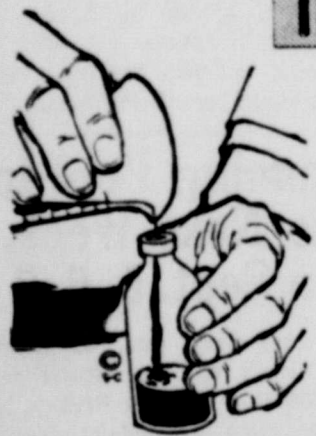

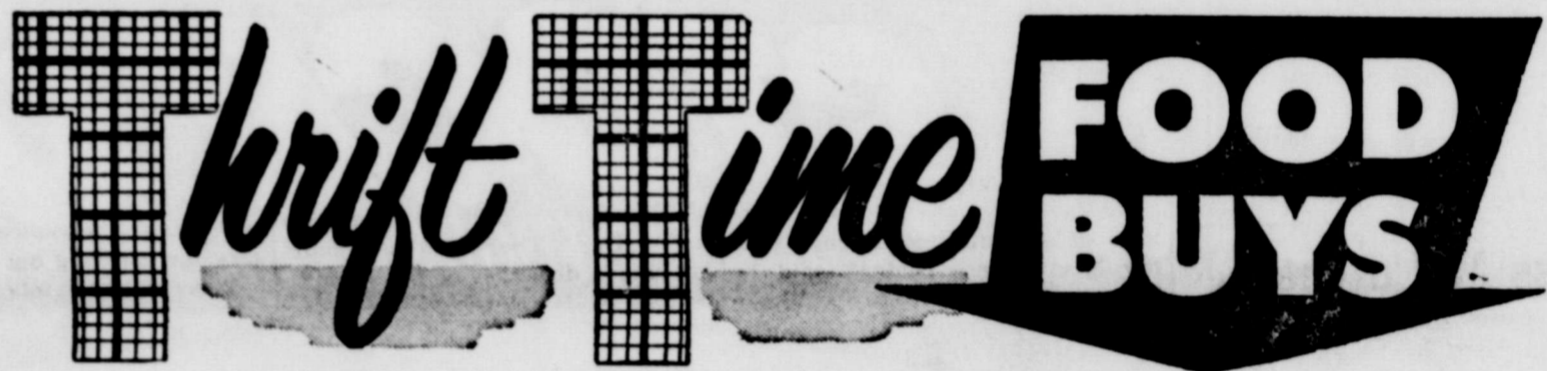
