Area Residents Invited to Reception for First Lady

Coke Countians are invited to attend a reception Monday, Oct. 26, honoring Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson. The reception will start at 3:30 p.m. in the San Angelo College Student Center.

The occasion will mark the first visit to San Angelo and West Texas of a First Lady of the United States.

The high school bands of Bronte and Robert Lee have been honored by being requested to play for the occasion. San Angelo College Band will also participate in the musical part of the program.

Bronte's Band has been busy this week preparing for the program.

Accompanying Mrs. Johnson to San Angelo will be Mrs. John Connally, wife of the governor of Texas; Mrs. Robert S. McNamara, wife of the secretary of defense; Mrs. Willard Wirtz, wife of the secretary of labor; and

Mrs. Orville Freeman, wife of the secretary of agriculture.

The speakers' platform which is being erected in the student center, will accommodate eight persons. In addition to the five ladies, those seated on the platform will be Mrs. Eugene M. Locke, national Democratic committeewoman of Dallas; Richard White, candidate for congress from El Paso; and O. C. Fisher, 21st District congressman, who will serve as master of ceremonies.

Tight security checks will be made and enforced during the First Lady's stay in San Angelo. A Secret Service agent, along with San Angelo police, have been making checks of the entire route to be covered by the entourage, and it is expected that no one will be allowed in the student center until the visitors arrive.

Mrs. Cumbie Ivey Jr. of Robert Lee is assisting with preparations for Mrs. Johnson's visit, and is in charge of "Little Ladies for Lyndon" who will present bouquets to Mrs. Johnson and the other visiting ladies. Four of the "Little Ladies" are from Coke County. Two from Bronte are Melissa Lee, daughter of Mayor and Mrs. Royce Lee, and Sallie Richards, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Conda O. Richards; two from Robert Lee are Patti Lynn Ivey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cumbie Ivey Jr., and Kathy McCutchen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond McCutchen.

A large delegation of Coke County residents is expected to attend the rally and reception. Those in charge stressed that dress for the occasion was to be informal.

Small Schools Group Meets

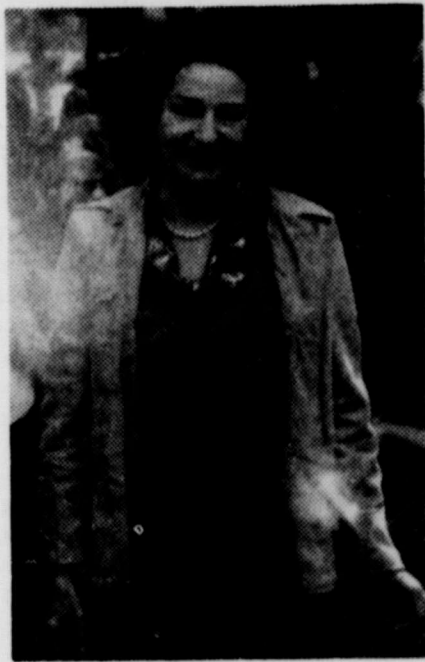
An Area XII meeting of Texas Small Schools Association was held Monday night at the Bronte school.

Mr. and Mrs. D. K. Glenn, Libby and I traveled together to Stonewall, where the ranch is located. We were disappointed that the President wasn't there, but as his charming wife, who greeted each guest personally, said, "I know that you would not want Lyndon to be any place other than where he is now." He had planned to be there until late Saturday, when pressing international developments made it imperative that he remain in Washington.

Mr. and Mrs. Cumbie Ivey Jr. of Robert Lee accompanied Mrs. Beverley St. George Tucker of San Angelo to the affair, so Coke County was pretty well represented.

Libby and I were talking Sunday night after we returned home and had listened to Mr. Johnson's telecast describing developments of the last few days. We decided it was almost fantastic that only a few hours before we had been guests at this man's home, had talked with his wife, looked at his cattle and partaken of his food. It's a little hard to describe the feeling we had, but the events of the day, followed by the President's nationwide telecast made us feel closer to him and to the government of this great country.

The barbecue dinner was indeed a feast. They served the usual potato salad, cole slaw, beans and meat; then for good measure, they also had buttered corn on the cob, hot fried pies and hot biscuits.

Following the meal, Mrs. Johnson made a short talk welcoming all of us to the ranch. She was followed by Gov. John Connally, who told of his long association with the President, and reiterated the views of Democrats that this country needs Lyndon Johnson for the next four years. Mr. Connally made a forceful plea for everyone there to get out and work for the election of Mr. Johnson. His eloquence and sincere Democratic victory Nov. 3 is a certainty re-convinced us that a necessity. Again and again, the

H D Agent's News Dept.

I am looking forward to working with this group of young homemakers.

In recent months I have had numerous calls in regard to care of carpets and rugs. I am including some information on this subject. If any of you have any questions after reading this article, please contact me.

Carpets and rugs are the second most costly investment a family makes in home furnishings and one of the most important ingredients in a home's decor.

Yet, a recent survey of 1,600 homemakers showed that nearly 25 per cent never clean their carpets and nearly one-half that do, use old fashioned hands-and-knees cleaning methods.

The reasons given for not taking care of rugs and carpets indicated a great lack of knowledge of the fundamentals of carpet care and ignorance about the inexpensive tools (and methods) available to homemakers.

For example, it's now possible for a woman to shampoo her carpets in the home safely, easily

and effectively. She can do the shampooing herself without bringing outsiders into her home and at an extremely low cost.

This periodic rug shampooing is important, of course but it is not the only phase of proper rug and carpet care. Daily sweeping in heavy traffic areas and thorough vacuuming once a week are just as important.

The point for women to remember is that there are three simple rules to follow to keep her rugs and carpets clean and bright and to ensure long life.

In detail, a rug and carpet program should include:

1. Carpet sweep daily. A quick brush up with an easy-to-use carpet sweeper removes the dirt before it has a chance to penetrate the carpet fibers.

2. Vacuum clean weekly. Grit, sand, dust and dirt that seep into the carpet fibers can cut and wear carpeting. A good vacuum cleaner, preferably the upright kind with beating action, will remove much of it, if it is not permitted to bed down and cake.

3. Shampoo twice a year. This removes "carpet grease" which binds the dirt to the carpet pile. Use a detergent type shampoo that's made especially to cut carpet grease... and doesn't need to be rubbed or scrubbed. Let the shampoo foam do the work. And use an applicator for applying the shampoo foam that works just like a sweeper, so you don't have to get down on your knees. A good applicator is important; we recommend the kind that makes a dry shampoo foam, thus eliminating the danger of getting the carpet too wet.

When shampooing, use short strokes within a four foot area. Let the shampoo dry. Then vacuum away the dirt. A carpet should look as fresh and clean as a newly shampooed head of

hair. If you have to wait too long for it to dry, you are over-wetting. If it is streaked, you haven't applied the shampoo evenly. This can be one of the problems of down-on-your-knees scrubbing methods.

If the carpet is interspersed room by room as done with other house cleaning chores, a woman will find it takes very little time.

Carpeting is one of the biggest investments in a home, an investment worth protecting.

I am now taking names of adults who will work with 4-H girls in their foods groups. I have over 90 girls now who need leaders to teach the Unit Foods Groups. If any lady who reads this will agree to work with one or any size group of 4-H girls I will appreciate it. I have set Tuesday, Nov. 3, to enroll leaders and assign girls to groups. I will be in the Bronte School at 10 a.m. for the ones from the Bronte area and in my office at 2 p.m. for the ones from Silver and Robert Lee.

I will give training to the ladies who will help with this work.

If you are interested and have questions please call or write me, or come to the meeting on Nov. 3 that is convenient for us.

I will be out of the office the week of Oct. 26 through 30. I will be in College Station attending the conference for all Extension Agents and other personnel of Texas.

BANK'S ASSETS INCREASE, DEPOSITS DOWN SLIGHTLY

Total assets of First National Bank in Bronte were up slightly over the same period of a year ago, while deposits were down a

small amount.

Assets of the bank released this week for a call from the Comptroller of the Currency dated Oct. 1 amounted to \$2,714,542.82, compared with \$2,713,151.10 a year ago.
