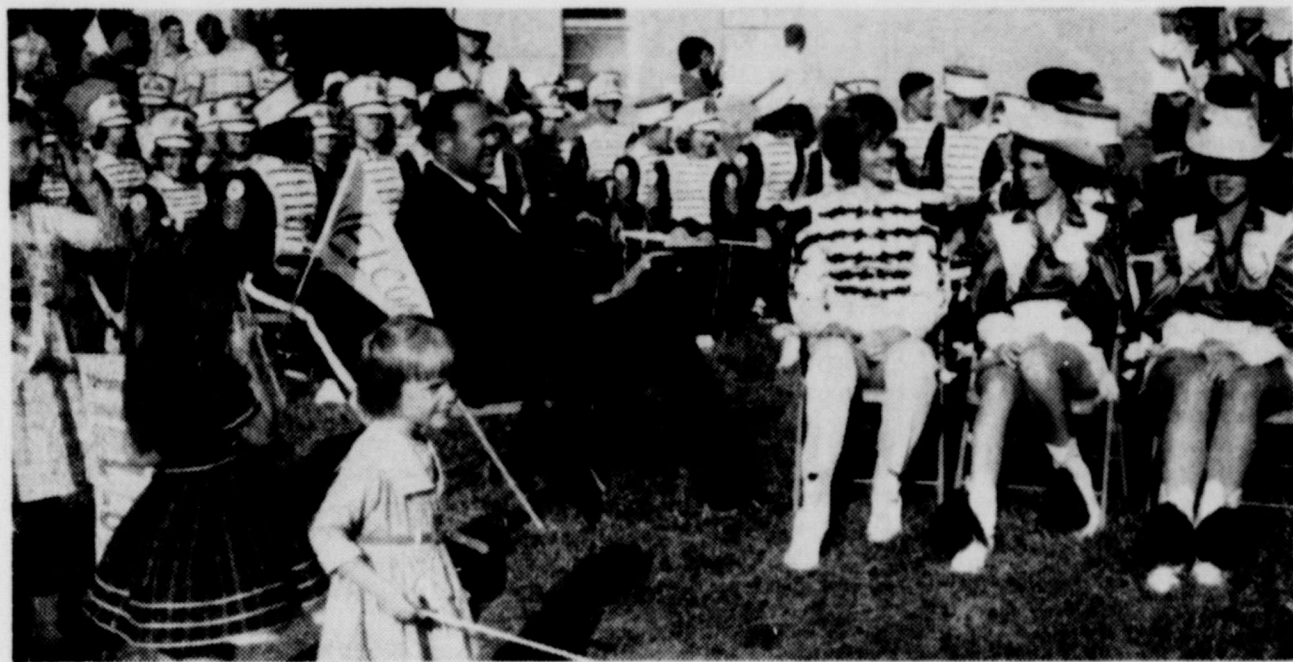

Election Is Set for Tuesday

A rough and tumble campaign which covers offices from the presidency down to precinct jobs is drawing to a close and the winners will be decided next Tuesday in a General Election.

Most interest locally is in the race for President of the United States. Native Texan Lyndon B. Johnson is the Democratic standard bearer, while Barry Goldwater, U. S. Senator from Arizona, is the Republican candidate.

Democrat Hubert Humphrey and Republican William Miller are on the ticket with them as vice presidential nominees.

Another hot race has developed in the election of a United States Senator from Texas. Incumbent Ralph Yarborough is seeking his second full elective term to the office, but he is being contested by George Eush, Republican candidate.

Other than in races for President, Vice President and Senator, the Republicans are expected to give Democratic candidate little trouble.

Besides the candidates listed above, contested races have developed for the following positions (Democratic candidates are listed first and Republican second): Congressman at Large, Joe Pool and Bill Hayes; Congressman, 21st District, O. C.

Fisher and Harry Claypool; Governor, John Connally and Jack Crichton; Lieutenant Governor, Preston Smith and Horace Houston; Attorney General, Waggoner Carr and Jack Trice; Commissioner of Agriculture, John C. White and John B. Armstrong; Commissioner of the General Land Office, Jerry Saddler and John A. Matthews; Comptroller of Public Accounts, Robert S. Calvert and Dallas Calmes Jr.; State Treasurer, Jesse James and Fred S. Neumann; Railroad Commissioner, Jim C. Langdon and Don Flanagan; Supreme Court Justice, Jack Pope and T. E. Kinnerly. There is also a sprinkling of candidates from the Constitution Party listed on the ballot.

Other offices, including district, county and precinct, will be voted on, but the Democratic nominees have no opponents.

Anyone who has attained the age of 21 and who has paid a poll tax or has an exemption is eligible to vote in all races listed on the ballot. However, something new this year, is the constitutional amendment outlawing the poll tax as a requirement for voting for federal officials. A heavy black line runs across the ballots and separates the

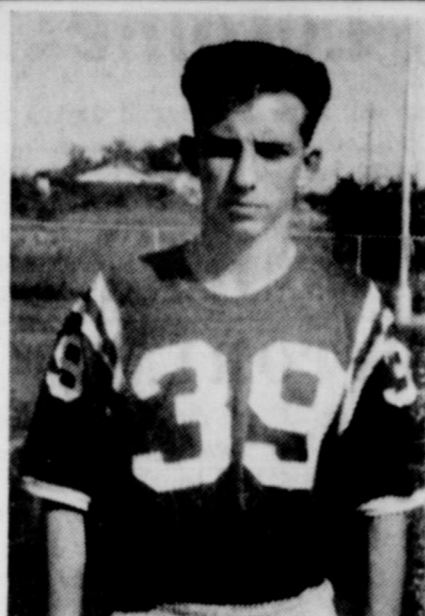

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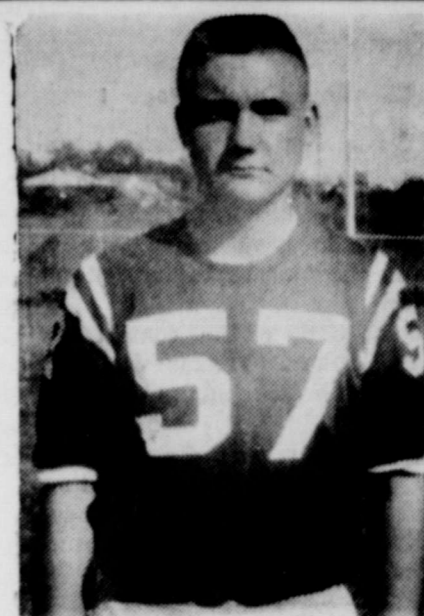

"The many compliments on the appearance and performance of the band made us feel that the little loss of instructional time was a small price to pay for this experience."

Accompanying Mrs. Johnson to San Angelo were Mrs. Orville Freeman, wife of the secretary of agriculture; Mrs. Robert S. McNamara, wife of the secretary of defense, Mrs. Willard Wirtz, wife of the secretary of labor and Mrs. Preston Smith, wife of the Lieutenant Governor of Texas. Mrs. John Connally was scheduled to be among the visitors but was unable to come.

Mrs. Johnson spoke to the crowd, estimated at 6,000, concerning the election of her husband and other Democrats who are running for office. She made special pleas for the election of Ralph Yarborough to a second term as U.S. Senator, John Connally for a second term as governor, and Richard White, who is seeking his first term as congressman from the 16th congressional district.

The First Lady cited the President's experience in making her appeal for his election to a full term: "The experience my husband offers is 24 years in Congress, evenly divided between the House of Representatives and the Senate, three years as vice president, and 11 arduous, demanding months as President."

Mrs. Johnson told her audience that Texans know better than anybody about her husband's record. She said, "It is a record I am proud of, I believe you approve of, and I hope you will want to continue."

Our distinguished editor in Robert Lee, Texas, was quite thorough in his information on voting rights. We appreciate this information but feel that his column carried a hint of dishonesty in past election officials.

In the last General election I served as election judge in the Bronte Precinct. Ballots were signed and placed on the voting tables without regard to number sequence. I can say without any qualms that none of the election officials were in the least interested in knowing how any individual voted.

We had a new experience in the last election with the appearance of poll watchers from the Republican party. This person was treated with the utmost respect and I am sure he found no discrepancies in the procedure of the election. It is my understanding that poll watchers from either party are permissible.

In the past as well as in the future I have picked election officials on their quality of accuracy and speed in tallying and computing the ballots. These people are your friends and neighbors and I hope that everyone who enters the polls feels that he or she has exercised a great American privilege of casting a ballot in the utmost confidence of secrecy and discretion.

I am well acquainted with the majority of the election officials within this county. I sincerely hope that each individual in the county comes away from the polls with the knowledge that they have cast a secret ballot according to their own dictates. This includes the editor of The Observer.

EDITORIAL

We have given this matter of voting next Tuesday considerable thought during the past few weeks, and must say that we can find no reason why we cannot recommend the straight Democratic ticket.

There may be some names in the first column on the ballot which we do not particularly like, but so far we haven't found any that are more to our liking in the next column.

As has been editorially stated before in The Enterprise, we take a firm stand for the reelection of Lyndon B. Johnson for President of the United States. In spite of all the mud which has been smeared on him during the past few weeks, he still looks to us like the clean-

est man in the race.

We certainly know he is the best qualified man in the race for the job he is seeking.

During the short 11 months since Mr. Johnson took over the world's most exacting job, he has proved conclusively that he can handle the job. He has been highly successful in getting his program through Congress, and has shown deep insight into matters of an international nature. Even his political enemies agree that LBJ is the best trained man for the job ever to hold the office.

As a matter of fact we have been unable to find one good reason why his opponent is qualified for the job, unless one agrees with his far right political philosophy. His performance as a member of the U. S. Senate has been most unimpressive, and it seems that he lacks the knowledge and depth of thought to handle the many-faceted job he is seeking.

If it were possible, we would make a motion to elect Mr. Johnson by acclamation, but as it now stands, we will be satisfied with two-thirds majority. In all sincerity, we believe the United States needs Lyndon Johnson the next four years.

As far as the other candidates are concerned, we commend to our readers the past performances of such men as John Connally, Preston Smith, Waggoner Carr and Ralph Yarborough, all of whom are seeking a second term.

As Americans and as Democrats, we heartily recommend that you vote the straight ticket next Tuesday; but regardless of your convictions and choices, we urge you to vote, for "in your heart you know it is right," and "the stakes are too high for you to stay home."

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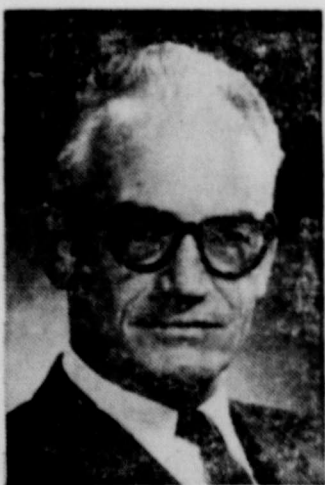

A special 5-cent stamp in tribute to Homemakers will be first placed on sale at Honolulu, Hawaii on October 26, 1964, in conjunction with the annual meeting of the National Extension Homemakers Council.

The stamp is being issued to mark the 50th anniversary of the passage of the Smith-Lever Act, legislation that opened the way to improved homelife throughout all America by providing Home Economics experts to advise women on better ways to feed and clothe their families.

Norman Todhunter, member of the Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee, designed the stamp. The conception was inspired by an early American sampler. It will measure 0.84 by 1.44 inches and will be issued in panes of 50, with an initial printing of 120 million. It will be printed green and light purple on paper on the Giori presses in red, decorated with a yellow design.

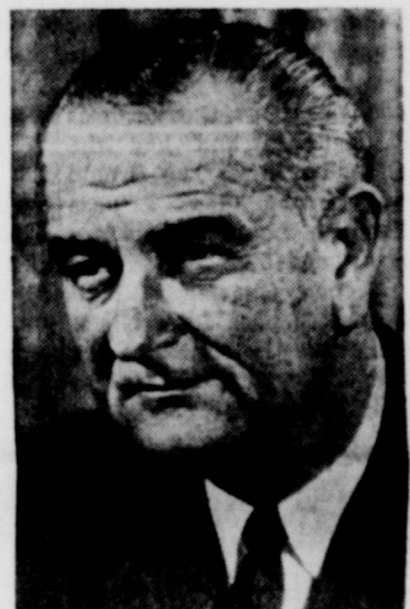

Hermleigh Downs Longhorns In First District Game, 14-8

The Bronte Longhorns lost their first district game Saturday night when they went to Hermleigh for a contest with the Cardinals. Final tally on the contest was 14-8.

Bronte's counter in the game came in the fourth quarter when Doug McCutchen ran a kickoff back to the Cardinal 10 yard line and then carried the ball over from that point. Two extra points were picked up on a pass from David Glenn to Royce Lee.

First Quarter

Bronte put the ball in play on their 20 after Jim Kubala's kick went into the end zone. McCutchen and Holcombe were moving the ball well, and had gone to the Cardinal 31, where a fumble lost the ball for the local lads.

The Cardinals were also quite adept at moving the ball and took the ball down to the Longhorn 36, where a 15 yard penalty slowed them down. Unable to overcome the handicap, they kicked and Bronte received the ball on the 10 yard line. Glenn, McCutchen and Holcombe picked up a couple of first downs, but on the third series, they bogged down and Lee had to punt. Hermleigh got the ball on their 40.

On the first play, a Cardinal fumble gave the ball back to Bronte, and put the Longhorns in a good position. Carlton was the last man up and had the loose ball under him. The Bronte boys got off one play, a pass from Glenn to Lee for 5 before the quarter ended.

Second Quarter

Another pretty pass from Glenn to Lee put the ball on the 21 for another 1st. McCutchen picked up 8 and Holcombe went to the

11 for a 1st down. Two incomplete passes, a gain of 4 yards by McCutchen and a recovered fumble left the Longhorns short of the goal line and the ball went over on the 13 yard line, and erased Bronte's first threat of the game.

With Smith and Kubala doing most of the ground gaining, and some timely assists by Brown and Roemisch, the Cardinals made five consecutive 1st downs to place the ball on the Longhorn 14. It was from that point that Smith carried over for the first touchdown of the game. The try for extra points was no good. Score: 6-0, Hermleigh.

Kubala kicked off to McCutchen, who was downed on the 24. With time running out in the first half, the Longhorns tried a couple of last minute desperation plays, with the last one winding up as a Hermleigh interception.

Third Quarter

It looked like a sure thing, but the luckless Longhorns fumbled the ball and Hermleigh recovered in the end zone for a touchback. A couple of punt exchanges left Hermleigh with the ball on Bronte's 34 when the quarter ended.

Fourth Quarter

Kubala moved on to the 20 for a 1st, and after Brown and Taylor made 6, he moved the ball to the 3 for a 1st down. Smith took the ball on the first play of the new series, and Kubala ran the extra points to make the score 14-0.

The Cardinal kickoff went deep into Longhorn territory where McCutchen was waiting for it. He caught the ball, and with a few timely blocks broke into the clear. Brown was in hot pursuit and made a desperate dive at the streaking McCutchen. Brown barely tripped him up, but he went down on the 10. McCutchen went over from the 10 to make a TD. Glenn's pass to Lee counted for two more points and the score was 14-8 in favor of the Cardinals.

Brown took Morrow's kick and six plays later the Longhorns recovered a fumble to take possession of the ball, on their 42. The local lads were unable to move the ball however, and Lee punted down to the Hermleigh 30. The Cardinals made one 1st, but were unable to move enough on the second series. President, someone in the audience suggested the word "treason" and you replied "That's it!"

I guess that's when the deep resentment I have been feeling about the calculated campaign of vilification against our President turned into pure nausea. I stayed awake until 2 a.m. feeling sick, and thinking about what you were doing.

You must have finally felt a touch of nausea yourself, when, on the next day, you cancelled the "smut" film your campaign crew had prepared for nationwide showing. I guess I am pleased to learn that you do have a limit.

In your heart, Mr. Goldwater, you know that neither President Johnson nor his administration is in any way guilty of treason, and that this, even for campaign tactics, is something of a record "low."

You have cried out in support of the exercise of local responsibilities as opposed to Federal "interference", and then you suggest that it is the Federal responsibility to maintain law and order in our local communities.

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

You have had much to say about crime and lawlessness in many United States cities, notably Washington, D. C., and yet your own hometown in your own home state turns up the fourth most crime-ridden city in the whole country.

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

You have cried out against riots and lawlessness time and again, and yet your voting record in the Senate reveals a consistent vote against programs designed to correct the causes of crime.

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

You've cried out bitterly against immorality in high places,

and yet you have not uttered one word in condemnation of your running mate, who, as a Congressman, fought for legislation to benefit an organization which had been paying him \$7,500 annually for many years.

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

In three speeches in January, you came out in favor of voluntary Social Security, something which makes one wonder about your wisdom, because this can only lead to bankruptcy of the system. Significant, however, is that in February in New Hampshire, you had the audacity to say, "I don't know where this voluntary business crept in."

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

When asked on a TV program in 1963 if, as President, you would favor getting out of the United Nations, you answered, "I would. At this point, having seen what the United Nations cannot do, I would have to suggest it." In June of this year, you said, "I've never advocated withdrawing from the United Nations." Your first remarks are recorded on tape.

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

First you said, "I don't want to hit the moon — I want to lob one into the men's room in the Kremlin and make sure I hit it." Later you said, "It's absolutely essential that we get a man on the moon for military reasons if for no other."

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

You once said that one Eisenhower in a generation was all the nation could survive. Had you erased that feeling from your heart when you were seeking Ike's support? How about that interview with the General which you had taped for campaign purposes, and then edited out several Eisenhower statements because they did not suit your position?

Integrity, Mr. Goldwater?

As you know in your heart, Mr. Goldwater, these are only a few of your inconsistencies, and you must know that they are very unbecoming to a man who wants to move into the White House by smearing its present occupant on the issue of morality.

What about Lyndon Johnson? He's not perfect and has never claimed to be so. On the other hand, and you must know this in your heart, he is a great leader, and was selected by a majority of the most exclusive club in the world, the United States Senate—your club — as their leader.

I have read the "hate" stuff and I have yet to find a serious charge that is supported by evidence which would stand up in court. It is 98.9% pure smut — based on rumors, half-truths, innuendoes and pure lies.

Bobby Baker and Walter Jenkins? Can a man be held responsible for the actions of all the individuals whom he has as-

sociated with in 32 years of government service? Let us not forget that even President Eisenhower could not escape this sort of experience. Neither, for that matter, could Jesus Christ.

So please, Mr. Goldwater, out of common decency and so that your campaign memories won't come back to haunt you in the years ahead, stick to your more noble campaign issues. Like taking the government out of agriculture, education, automation, pollution of streams, transportation, the waste of national resources. Like repudiating the foreign policies of Truman, Eisenhower, Kennedy and Johnson, and leading the nation on a massive crusade to destroy Communism all over the world, even though it takes us to the brink time and again.

One closing thought — offered by my wife: Might it not encourage lawlessness in our land when one of the leading presidential candidates constantly belittles and demeans our Judiciary and our Executive branches of government — even to the extent of charging treason?

Oh, yes, thank you for providing the voters of our nation with a choice. You have made it an awfully, awfully easy one.
