

Proposition No. 1 on the ballot provides for eliminating authority to transfer up to one per cent of the permanent school fund to help pay cost of free publie schools.

Proponents of the amendment feel that the state has been expending its capital by allowing the 1 percent to be transferred to expendable funds.

Opponents say that the amendment should be defeated because this provision allows for use of the money in an emergency and should remain as it is for that


