Democrats Win Landslide Over Nation

Bronte and Coke County went along with the rest of the state and nation in giving President Lyndon B. Johnson and his running mate, Senator Hubert Humphrey, a landslide vote in Tuesday's general election. Another closely watched contest here was the race between Senator Ralph Yarborough and Republican George Bush. The Bronte box as well as the county as a whole followed the lead of the entire state in electing Yarborough to his second full elective term.

President Johnson broke just about every record which has been built up over the years in contests between Democrats and Republicans. He received the largest number of votes ever given a presidential candidate, as well as to build up the largest plurality over his opponent, more

than 14½ million. However, he failed to crack Franklin D. Roosevelt's 1936 record of carrying every state but two. Five of the 50 states gave a majority to Senator Barry Goldwater, the Republican nominee, and he was leading in a sixth. He was ahead in his home state of Arizona and carried five southern states which voted for him as a protest against Johnson's support of the Civil Rights law.

Other Democratic nominees, including Governor John Connally, won their offices handily. Two former Republican representatives from Texas went down to defeat in the Democratic land-

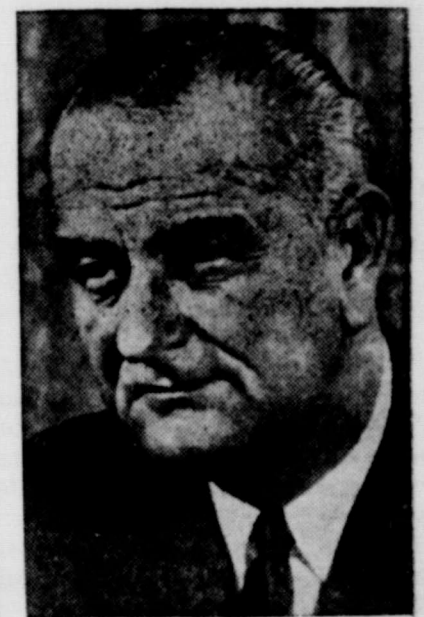
"MISS VERA" HONORED BY BRONTE PTA

The Longhorns will take on a new team this weekend when they travel to Jayton to engage

the Jaybirds in an 8-B football contest. Jayton is a new member of the conference and this will be the first time the two teams have met on the gridiron.

A large number of Bronte fans got a look at the Jaybirds a couple of weeks ago when they played the Steers in Robert Lee. They looked pretty salty at that time, in spite of a loss to the mighty Steers.

However, last Friday Trent's Gorillas, who had not been considered a serious contender for the 8-B crown, downed the Birds 14-6. In other action last weekend, Robert Lee rolled over Hermleigh, 40-0, and Loraine took the Longhorns, 46-18.

The pep rally at Bronte School will be held earlier than usual this week, at 12:20 p.m., and classes will be dismissed at 1:35 p.m., in order for players, band members, and others to have plenty of time to make the long drive to Jayton. The band bus will leave here at 3 p.m.

BANK, P. O. TO CLOSE NOV. 11

Announcement is being made in this issue of The Enterprise that First National Bank of Bronte will be closed next Wednesday, Nov. 11, in observance of Veterans Day.

Also observing the holiday will be employees of the U. S. Post Office in Bronte. Other business firms will remain open, as Veterans Day is not one of the regular holidays taken by most business firms here.

New Water Mains Going in Here

Work has been underway the past couple of weeks on Bronte's new water mains. Some inconvenience to local residents has been seen, but it has been slight and few complaints have been received, according to Mayor Royce Lee.

The mayor said that the work will continue for some time and that he feels any inconvenience to Bronte people will be far more than offset by the new water lines which will greatly improve the city's water system.

R. S. Beall & Son of Abilene was successful bidder on the project. Total cost will be \$68,913.91. The Upper Colorado River Authority is financing the project for the city, and the principal will have to be repaid, but no interest will be charged.

Included in the project are: Replacement of three inch water lines with six and eight inch pipe; erection of a new 75,000 gallon water tower, the base of which will be 100 feet above the ground; the installation of ten new fire plugs; and a number of minor changes in the system. Replacement of the water mains is the part of the project now underway.

It is expected that the improvements in the water system will bring about a substantial decrease in Bronte's fire insurance rates, as they will bring the system up to state approved specifications.

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Loraine Whips Longhorns, 46-18

Bronte Longhorns played a great first half last Friday night when the Loraine Bulldogs invaded Stephenson Field. The local lads went ahead in the first quarter, after Loraine drew first blood and were leading, 18-16, when the half time intermission came.

The second half was a different story, however, as the Bulldogs returned to play with all the tenacity of their name. The Longhorns didn't scratch again and the Loraine boys ran the score up to 46-18 before the final horn ended their onslaught.

First Quarter

The Longhorns received Mahon's kick on the 15, and McCutchen ran it back to the 35. After picking up 2, on two tries, a 3rd down pass was intercepted by Bowles on the 33. The Bulldogs moved the ball for a 1st on the 19, then for another on the 9 with goal to go. Rankin picked up 2, and Brame made a long 6 to put the ball on the 1 foot line. Rankin carried it over on 3rd down. Brame ran the extra points to make the score 8-0.

Mahon kicked off again to McCutchen. He took it on the 15 and broke into the open to go 85 yards for the first Bronte counter. Conversion try failed, and Loraine led 8-6.

Morrow kicked off to Loraine and the series of downs started on their 20. A Bulldog fumble was recovered by Lee on the 27, to give the Longhorns the first big break of the game. Holcombe made 8 and McCutchen added 3 more to give the Longhorns a 1st down on the 16. McCutchen was elected to carry on the 1st down. He picked up some good blocks and went around right end into the end zone to give the Longhorns a 12-8 lead. Conversion try failed.

Morrow's kick went to Britton who ran it to the 35 before he was stopped. Rankin and Britton did most of the ball carrying and moved the ball downfield to the Longhorn 19 making three 1st downs in the process. Apparently the Longhorns decided to tighten up their defenses at this point, for the Bulldogs were able to make only 2 yards in four tries. Larry Corley, Strickland, Morrow and Brock were outstanding in the forward wall the Bulldogs couldn't break on this series.

The ball went over and McCutchen made a 9 yard run before the quarter ended.

Second Quarter

Holcombe picked up the additional yard needed for a 1st on the 29. An offside penalty helped the Longhorns, and McCutchen made another 5 for a 1st on the 40. Holcombe picked up 13 yards in two carries for another 1st on Loraine's 47. The next play saw Lee with the ball on a beautiful run, go all the way to pay dirt, but it didn't count, as officials called it back to penalize the Longhorns 15 yards for clipping. Following this loss the Longhorns lost 5 more for off-sides, making the down situation 1st and 22. On the next play, Lee drew back and threw a long pass to Ricky Wheat who outran all his pursuers to the goal line. Again the conversion try failed and the Longhorns led 18-8.

Morrow's kick went to Rankin who was downed on the 31. Rankin then got through the Bronte

line for a touchdown, but it was called back because of rules infraction on both sides. No penalty was assessed. The Bulldogs got loose after this and started eating up the yards. They worked their way down to the Longhorn 20, making three first downs in the process. A personal foul penalty against Bronte moved them up to the 10 for another 1st. Blair then made 5, and Rankin picked up the additional 5 for another Bulldog counter. Britton ran the conversion, and the score was 18-16 in favor of Bronte.

Following the kickoff, the Longhorns made one 1st down and then had to punt. The Bulldogs couldn't go and had to punt. Then they captured a Bronte fumble, and on their first play, Lee intercepted a pass. The Longhorns retained possession of the ball until the end of the first half.

Third Quarter

Brame took Morrow's kickoff, but the Bulldogs had to punt after three unsuccessful tries at making a 1st down. A fumble by Bronte and a Loraine recovery gave the Bulldogs another chance on the Bronte 45. Rankin, Britton and Brame made steady gains up the field. Brame took it over on a keeper from the 2. Rankin made two extra points and the Bulldogs went ahead 24-18.

After receiving the kickoff the

Longhorns couldn't go and Lee punted to the Bulldog 21. Britton was the ball carrier on the 1st down, and he managed to evade the Longhorn defense, going 79 yards to the Bronte double stripe. McCutchen stopped Brame's extra points try, and the score was 30-18.

After taking Mahon's kick, the Longhorns went to the air and had 3 incomplete passes, so Lee had to punt the ball. The Bulldogs started on their 37 and moved to the Bronte 38 in five carries before the third stanza ended.

Fourth Quarter

Carrying the ball on down to the 23 for another 1st down, the Bulldogs then gave the pigskin to Blair who went the entire distance to pay dirt. Britton went around right end for 2 bonus points. Score 38-18.

Mahon kicked to McCutchen, and the Longhorns were making good gains, when Finley slipped in and caught a Bronte pass to give the ball to Loraine on the 34. But the Bulldogs couldn't make the needed 10 and the ball went over to Bronte on their own 35. Taking to the air again, the Longhorns had 2 knocked down, and the 3rd aerial was intercepted by Brame on the 43.

Britton made a 23 yard dash for a 1st on the 20, and Rankin mov-

ed the ball on to the 10 in two carries. Rankin made another 6, to make it 3rd and 4 to go. Brame kept the ball on the next play and went over for the touchdown. Britton's run over left side gave the Bulldogs 2 extra points, and the score was 46-18.

Bronte started a series of downs on their 25 after the kickoff. Holcombe went to the 36 for a 1st and then Loraine recovered

a fumble on the 38. With Britton making most of the yardage on a run around left end, the Bulldogs were knocking at the Bronte door on the 5 yard line when the clock ran out. Final score: 46-18.

Here from Texas Tech, Lubbock for a weekend visit with friends and relatives were Barry Curlee, Charles Coppock and Jimmy Wells.

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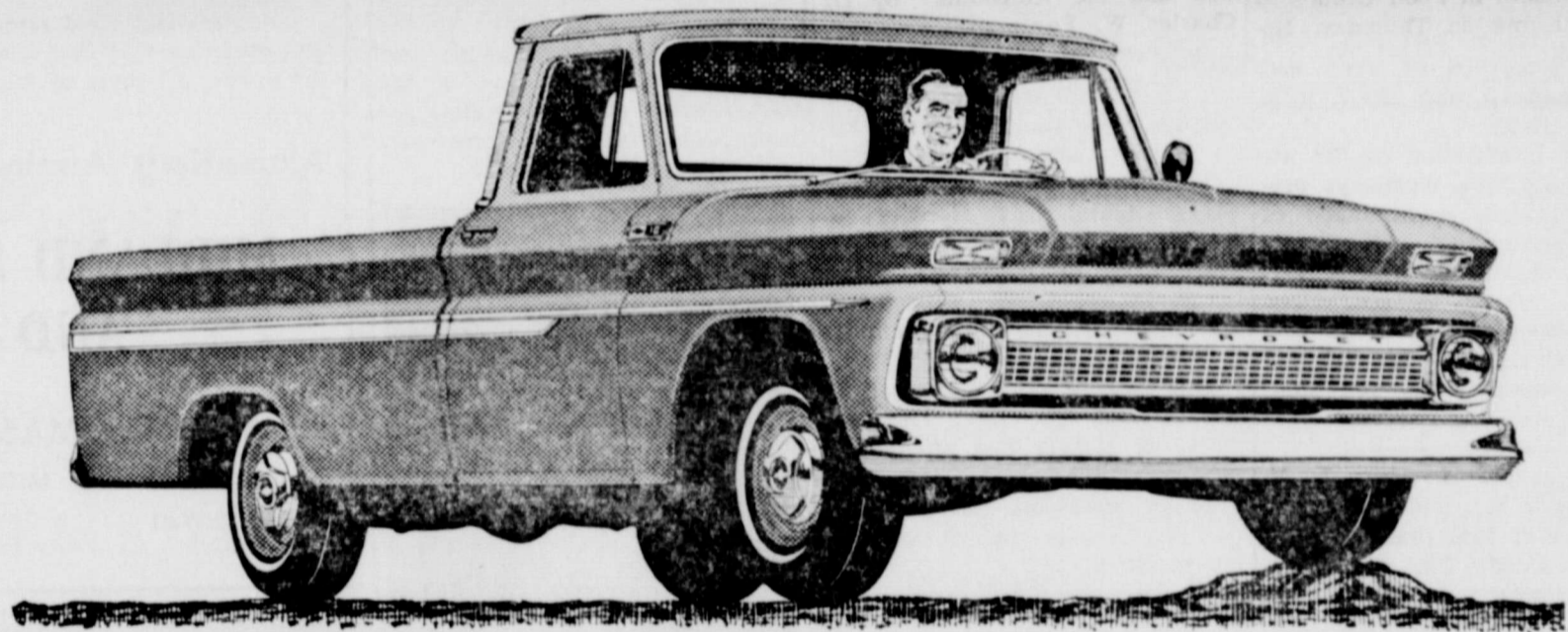
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A group of Young Citizens for Johnson and Humphrey gathered on Main Street Saturday morning to conduct a rally for their candidates. Following the

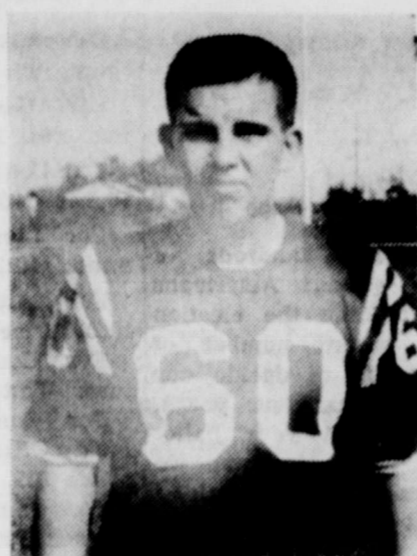




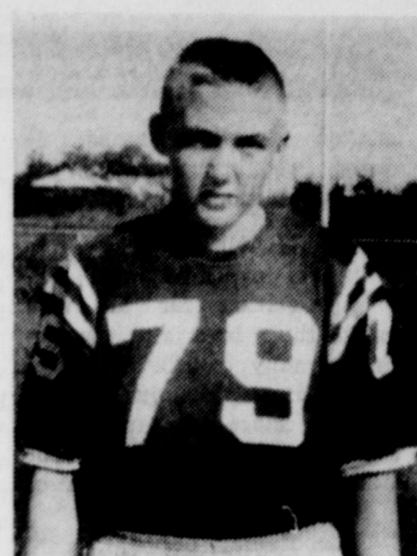
