Last Rites Held Here Monday for Joe A. Carter, 78

Funeral services for Joe A. Carter were held Monday, Nov. 9, at 3 p.m. in First Baptist Church in Bronte. The Rev. A. S. Masterson, pastor of First Methodist Church, officiated, assisted by H. O. Whitt and L. T. Youngblood. Special music was by Mmes. Jeanette Willis and A. W. McMillan of San Angelo. Interment was in Fairview Cemetery, under the direction of Williams Funeral Home.

Mr. Carter, 78, died at 1:05 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 8, in Bronte Hospital, where he had been hospitalized periodically for several months.

He was born July 31, 1886, in Loudon County, Tenn., and was married May 30, 1924, to Elizabeth Rawlings of Bronte. He was in the real estate and royalty business.

Mr. and Mrs. Carter moved to Bronte from San Angelo in June, 1950. He was a long time member of the Baptist Church and had been president of the Men's Bible Class at the local church since moving here. He was also a member of the Bronte Lions Club and Masonic Lodge, and was ex-chairman of the Republican Party in Coke County.

After his retirement, he and Mrs. Carter traveled extensively in the United States and foreign countries.

Survivors are his wife and five nieces and nephews.

Pallbearers were Royce Fancher, Joe Rawlings, H. O. Whitt, E. F. Glenn, C. B. Barbee and Paul McGuire of Ballinger.

Jayton Trips Longhorns, 22-6

The Jayton Jaybirds flew away with a gridiron victory over the Bronte Longhorns last Friday night, when they hosted the local team. Score was 22-6.

The Jayton lads scored in the first, second and third quarters, while Bronte's lone tally came in the second period.

First Quarter

Morrow kicked off to start the game, but Jayton couldn't move on the first series and had to punt. The Longhorns made a 1st down on the Jayton 40 but on the 2nd series bogged down and Lee had to punt. Judy took it on the 20 with no return.

Bronte was penalized 5 for off-sides, and Judy picked up the first 1st down of the evening for the Jaybirds when he ran 31 yards to the Longhorn 44. After a couple of nongainers, Murdoch took the ball down to the 10 but the play was called back and Jayton was penalized 5. A pass to Smith gave the Jaybirds a 1st on the 24. After moving for another 1st on the 14, the Jaybirds gave the ball to Smith who went around right end for a touchdown. Judy ran a pair of extra points. Score: 8-0.

After taking the kickoff Holcombe carried out to the 35. He and McCutchen carried 3 times for 9 yards, and the Longhorns

decided to punt. Lee got off a beauty which gave the Jaybirds the ball on their own 10. The Jayton boys made 10 for a 1st on the 20 just as the 1st quarter ended.

Second Quarter

After failing to make another 1st, the Jaybirds punted to McCutchen and the ball went into play on the 30. McCutchen made 6 yards on two carries and Holcombe moved the ball on out to the 42 for a 1st down.

The Longhorns couldn't go on the second series of downs and Lee punted. Starting at the 30 yard line the Jaybirds moved the ball to the Bronte 40. Judy took the ball at that point and got through the Longhorn defense to make a beautiful run to the double stripe. The conversion attempt was blocked by Brock and the score stood at 14-0.

McCutchen took Morales' kick on the 15 and carried out to the 40 before he was nailed. After three tries, the Longhorns had to punt, with Lee sending the ball down to the Jaybird 20.

The Jaybirds lost 5 on two tries and on the 3rd attempt, they fumbled the ball and McCutchen recovered for Bronte, on the 30 yard line. The Longhorns saw an opportunity to capitalize on this break, and, after his team

had tried 2 unsuccessful passes, McCutchen picked up 5 yards through the middle. Faced with a 4th and 5 situation, Glenn called for a pass and tossed the aerial to Lee, who went all the way to pay dirt, to make the Longhorns' lone tally of the game. Score: 14-6. Enough time remained in the 1st half for the kickoff and three plays by the Jaybirds.

Third Quarter

Morales kicked to start the second half of the ball game. Lee took it and ran back to the 40. The Longhorns found tough going, and had to punt on 4th down. The Jayton boys started the ball to moving up field, but a fumble was recovered by Brock to give the Longhorns possession near the Jaybird 40. The advantage from the fumble recovery was short lived, however, as Jayton recovered a Longhorn miscue on the next play, to take over again on their own 43. Morales, Smith, Judy and Richards moved the ball well and had it down on the Longhorn 21 when a 15 yard penalty moved it back to the 36 for a 1st and 25. The loss didn't make the Jaybirds lose their punch, however, as Morales took a pass on the next play to make Jayton's final touchdown of the
