get them in shape for the annual affray. Toliver told The Enterprise, "We will appreciate all the help we can get in supporting this final football game with Robert Lee Friday night. We intend to make a change in Robert Lee's present record. Robert Lee will not bury us in their graveyard."

The Steers have a perfect record in district play this year, while the Longhorns have yet to win a district tilt.

Game time is 7:30 p.m., and fans are warned to arrive early, if they want a seat, since a big crowd is expected for this annual Coke County football classic.

1st National Bank Has New Machine For Bookkeeping

First National Bank in Bronte has just installed a new Burroughs Proof Machine to record every business transaction made through the bank. Installed at a cost of more than \$7,000, the new "electronic brain" is the very latest in bookkeeping machines.

L. T. Youngblood, president of the bank, said the installation of the new bookkeeping gadget was done in order to handle more efficiently the steadily growing number of transactions which pass through the bank each day.

"Some days we handle as many as 2,900 local checks and the average day's run is 1,600," he said. "This puts a terrific work load on our bookkeepers, and we feel the new machine will assist them in keeping our accounts more easily and accurately," the veteran Bronte banker said.

Bank employees explained that as each deposit and withdrawal is fed into the machine, it will stop and refuse to take any more numbers if an error is made. The operator can look for his error immediately and find it with much less trouble than previously, when perhaps the entire day's transactions had to be reviewed to find a mistake.

Mrs. Jerry Parker is presently the main operator of the new machine, but Vice President E. F. Glenn said all the bank's bookkeepers will be instructed on how to operate it.

Some slight changes in procedure went into effect with the installation of the Burroughs machine. Figures of the depositor are taken as being correct when he deposits a list of checks, and if there is an error in addition, it will be detected by the machine and the depositor will be notified later in the day by mail or phone. This procedure will enable tellers to take care of customers' deposits in a shorter time, Glenn pointed out. Another change is that checks handled during each day will not be stapled together when they are returned to the customer in his statement at the end of each month. A third change in procedure is that original copies of deposit slips will be returned to the depositor in his statement.

Another improvement now underway at First National Bank is the installation of mosaic tile on all the smooth surfaces on the south and east sides of the building. The firm also plans to

County Agents News Column

The Agricultural Census will be starting in the county soon. Questionnaires will be placed in the rural mail boxes in the near future to get the program underway.

The Census Department urges each family to study and fill out their questionnaire with the best information available. All answers are kept confidential and the combined totals are vital to the agricultural industry.

If anyone should need help in answering any of the questions, the local census taker will be glad to assist when he calls on you.

Have you ever wondered how much meat is consumed by Americans each year? The figure is staggering. Beef leads the field in amount consumed, with pork

running a distant second. Poultry meat is listed separately. It is third high on the list.

The average American is expected to eat 171.7 pounds of red meat and 38.0 pounds of poultry in 1964. Of this total, 99.0 pounds will be beef. Pork follows with 63.4 pounds. Lamb and mutton consumption is very low—only 4.5 pounds.

Since 1950 the per capita consumption of both poultry and beef has increased 54 per cent. Lamb has gained 15 per cent, while pork has fallen far behind, dropping 40 per cent in the past 15 years.

The Coke County Annual Stock Show has been set for January 11, at the show barn in Robert Lee. This leaves less than two months until the 1965 show season starts.

The 4-H Club members have quantity this year and we hope the quality will be evident when show day arrives. In all, 53 club members are feeding 187 animals. Not all of these will be exhibited at the County Show, but a high percentage will. The sheep and swine divisions are very likely to have the largest number of entries ever shown in the County Show.

The lateness of winter and the uncertainty of the screwworm has officials of the screwworm program concerned. Our latest report shows 23 cases, the high week of the year, stretching from the Rio Grande Valley to the Panhandle. McCulloch and Schleicher Counties in our area had one case reported. We hope everyone will remain vigilant and send in any sample they may find in Coke County.

The next regular meeting of the group will be held on Tuesday, Jan. 12.

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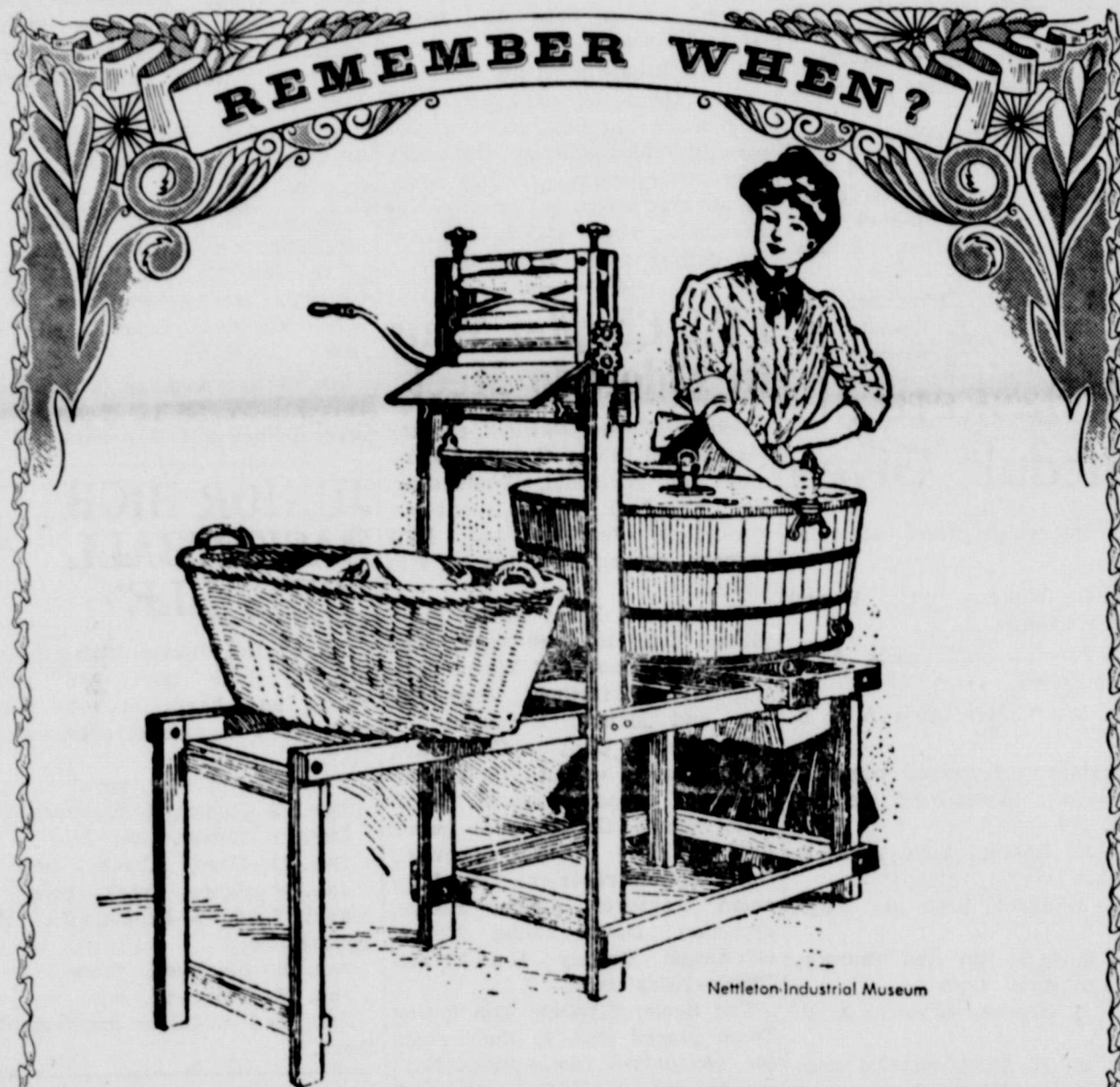
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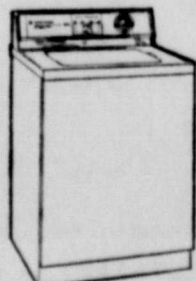

H D Agent's News Dept.

I am happy to have these adults working with the 4-H girls. I still need other leaders if all the girls are to work in food groups. Volunteers are still needed.

Foods from the milk group generally the largest single item in the food budget if sufficient amounts are bought.

Homemakers can realize a saving by using fresh whole milk for drinking and evaporated and dry skimmed milk for cooking. Dry skim milk is convenient to use because it needs no refrigeration.

It costs less than one-third as much as whole milk and is, of course, higher in calcium and protein because of the absence of fat.

With the present milk prices, a family of two adults and two children using 22 quarts of milk a week could save approximately \$1.78 a week by this allotment of milk. The reduction could be even greater if the milk drunk is

one-half fresh and one-half dry. Buttermilk, made from the powdered milk is tasty and can be drunk and used in cooking.

Add this savings to the total savings realized by wise shopping—and watch it grow.

As a result of the latest revision of the National Research Council recommended dietary allowances, a slight change is being made in the daily allowance in the milk group. This should be good news to many of my readers who have the problem of not using enough milk.

Suggested amount of milk for children, pregnant and nursing women is now as follows:

Children under 9 years of age—2 to 3 cups.

Children 9 to 12 years of age—3 or more cups.

Pregnant women—3 or more cups.

Nursing mothers—4 or more cups.

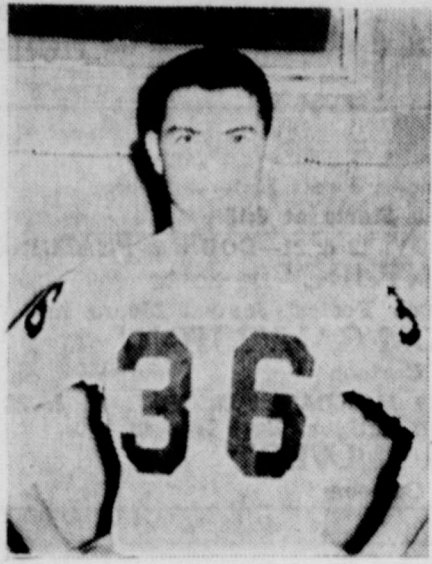

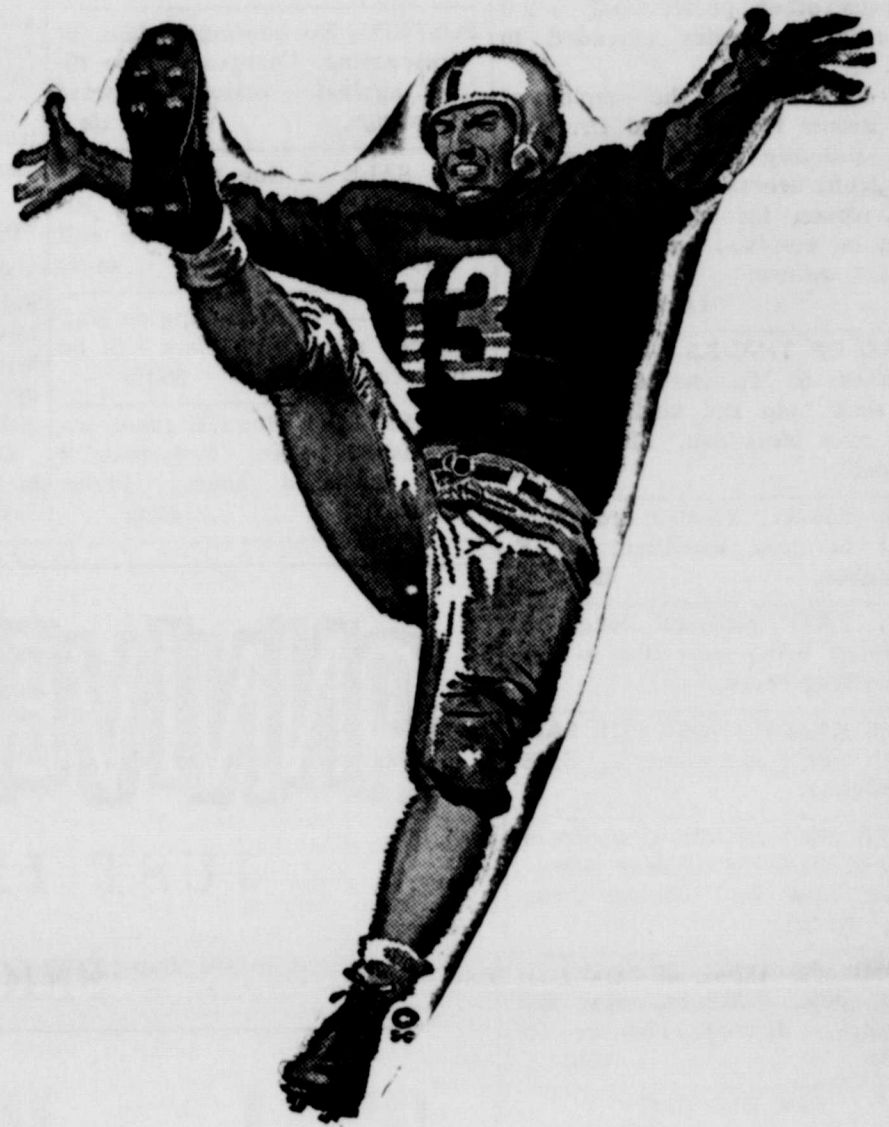
