Water Is Hauled At High Rate

Water hauling has finally be-

gun for another season in Baird. The giant water truck began its trips from Abilene air port to the Baird water reservoir last Sunday night, making about five trips daily. The expense of getting the water hauled is higher this year by quite a lot. Last summer the water was hauled for \$2 a thousand gallons; now it is costing \$2.50 a thousand. Cost of the water at the air port ward Baird in the matter of selling their water in the extreme summertime, and it is appreciated.

The summer rate went into effect when the supply began to fail July 1st. That was before the city had received bids on hauling water. Now the problem of how to make the sale of water pay for the hauling is slapping the city council in the face. In fairness to those who do not use a great amount of water, the minimum of \$1.00 for the first 2,000 gallons has not been changed. Neither has the rate of \$2.00 for the first 4,000 been changed. The rate for more than 4,000 gallons per month was set at \$2.00 per thousand. This will not take care of the expense of hauling the water, as is obvious, therefore water users should use water sparingly to avoid a high bill. Whatever adjustment is made in the rate scale will be announced in The Baird Star in advance of the change.

The city council does not wish to prohibit the use of water in any amount as long as the water can be hauled. It is necessary, however, to make the sale of water pay its own way.

The lowest amount of water Baird used in any month this year was in February in the amount of 1.628,500 gallons, Last month, before the demand forced the city to begin to haul water, the amount metered added to 2,219,600 gallons. The up amount of water consumed in Baird this month will not be known until the meters are read on the 20th of July, but the de-



Texas Veterans Free To Select Privately Owned Land Tract For Farm or Ranch Home

By BASCOM GILES Commissioner of the General Land Office (Editor's Note: Second of a series of articles on the Veterans' Land Program)

The recently enacted legislation implementing the Texas Veterans' Land Board will be the means of making the dream of thousands of Texas Veterans for a farm or ranch home of their very own, come true.

One of the most attractive fea-tures of this bill is that section which permits a veterant o person-ally select a tract of land suitable for agriculture or g r a z i ng held under private ownership in any sector of the State. It might be

sector of the State. It might be owned by kinsmen or by a corpora-tion—it matters not to the Board. What will matter to the Board will be that the veteran feels rea-sonably sure that it will serve his purpose and needs; that it must have at least half of the mineral rights unencumbered and that the land is worth the asking price. After the veteran has made his

After the veteran has made his selection his next step will be to furnish the Board with a complete abstract and description of the property so that it may be ap-praised. At the same time he files his application with the Board, he will pay to the Board his initial down payment of NOT less than five per cent of the total purchase to the maximum sector of the total purchase and the max be able to purchase under the full loan of \$7,500.00. The term "state owned land" five per cent of the total purchase price. In the event the application

five per cent of the total purchase price. In the event the application is rejected the veteran's money will be refunded and he will be free to make another selection. After the Board has appraised the land and approved the appli-cation for the loan for the balance, the applicant will be required to forty years at three per cent in-terest for the balance. After re-ceiving his contract of sale he will be entitled to take possession. Control to the balance dis-dise applications will be held in abeyance. private Under the provisions of this section a veteran may purchase a tract of land up to \$10,000.00 but he will be required to tender the difference above the \$7,500.00 state borrowers. Loans could not be made in any state having a state authority for telephone finance maximum.

Another provision of the bill, sponsored by Senator John Bell and Representative Reuben Sen-terfitt, permits a veteran to pur-chase a tract of land owned by the chase a tract of land owned by the State when such tracts are offered through duly advertised sales. Proper application forms will be furnished by the Board on request. Each veteran will be limited to one purchase.
