Funeral Held for Jim Patton, 72

Funeral services were held at 3 p.m. Saturday in First Methodist Church for Jim D. Patton, 72, with the pastor, the Rev. Austin S. Masterson, officiating. Burial followed in Eldorado Cemetery under direction of Williams Funeral Home.

Mr. Patton, who had been a resident of Bronte since 1962, died Thursday about 11 p.m. in Bronte Hospital of a heart attack.

He was born Sept. 4, 1892 in Claude. He and Miss Annie Mae Green were married Sept. 16, 1925, in Eldorado. Mr. Patton made his home in Eldorado from 1909 to 1945. The family later lived in San Angelo and McCamey, before moving to Bronte. Mr. Patton was a member of First Methodist Church in Bronte.

Mrs. Rogers died about 1 p.m. Sunday in Pecan Grove Nursing Home in Sweetwater where she had been a patient about three years.

Mrs. Rogers was born March 9, 1874 in Erath County and moved to Coke County when she was 12 years old. She married Aaron Rogers in September, 1892, at Bronte. Mr. Rogers preceded her in death in 1901.

She was a charter member of the Bronte First Baptist Church. Survivors include one son, Henry Rogers of Bronte; two daughters, Mrs. Lula Dubose and Mrs. Ara Scott, both of Bronte; eight grandchildren and 20 great grandchildren and 10 great great grandchildren.

Governor Wires Okay on Youth Work Program

County Judge W. W. Thetford received a telegram Wednesday from Governor John Connally stating that the work program for Coke County young people has been approved.

The message did not state exactly when the program will get underway, but Judge Thetford said he is sure it will be in the next few days. The judge had a telephone call in to the governor Wednesday morning but was unable to get a line through to the

Austin office. He was trying to learn exact date for starting the program and other information.

James Golson, in charge of the program here asks that all young persons interested in working in the program for the rest of the summer, meet him at the school Friday morning at 8 o'clock. He hopes to know by that time when the work will begin.

The call had not been completed at press time Wednesday.

The youth work program is part of the Economic Opportunity Act, being sponsored by the Federal Government to provide employment for youngsters 16-21 years of age.

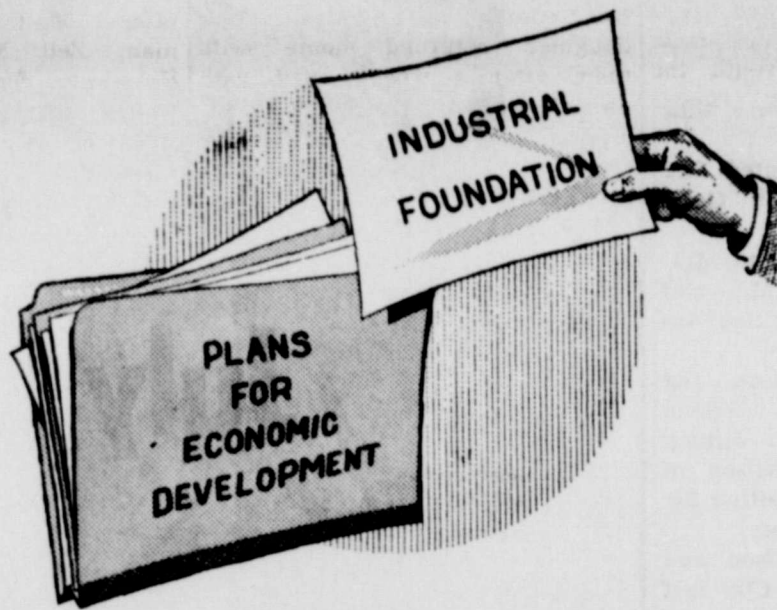
