

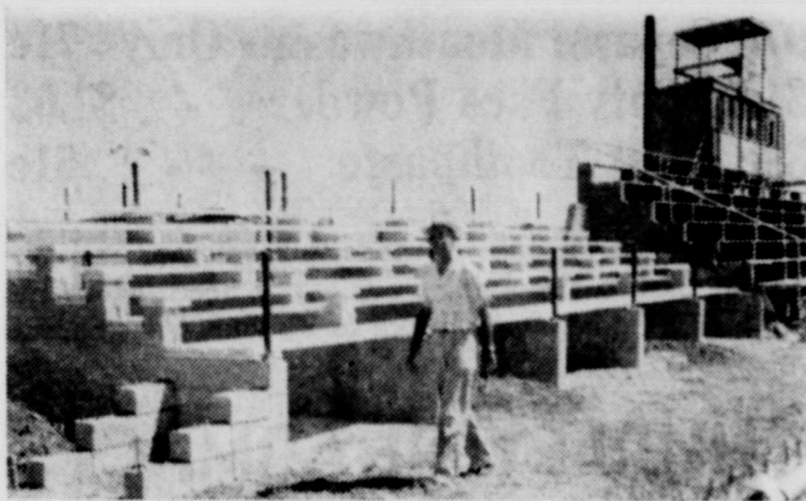

There are three ways a Longhorn can get one of the maroon stars stuck on his white helmet:

He can be selected as one of the Longhorns of the week, one of which will be a lineman and one a back.

He can recover an opponent's fumble.

He can intercept a pass.

Work in last week's game with Ozona gave stars to five Longhorns. The Longhorns of the week, who were selected by their teammates were Doug McCutchen, back, and Larry Corley, lineman.

Those who earned stars for recovering fumbles were Don Hageman and Brian Richards. Tad Richards was the lone Longhorn who intercepted a pass.

Coach Toliver said that by the end of the season, he is expecting "a lot of stars on a lot of helmets," since they will remain on the headgear throughout the season.

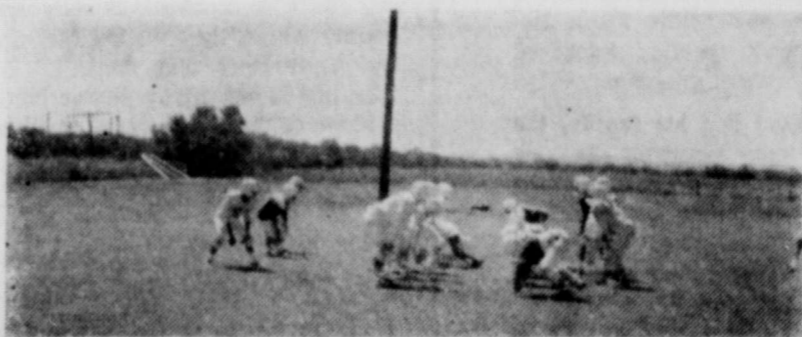

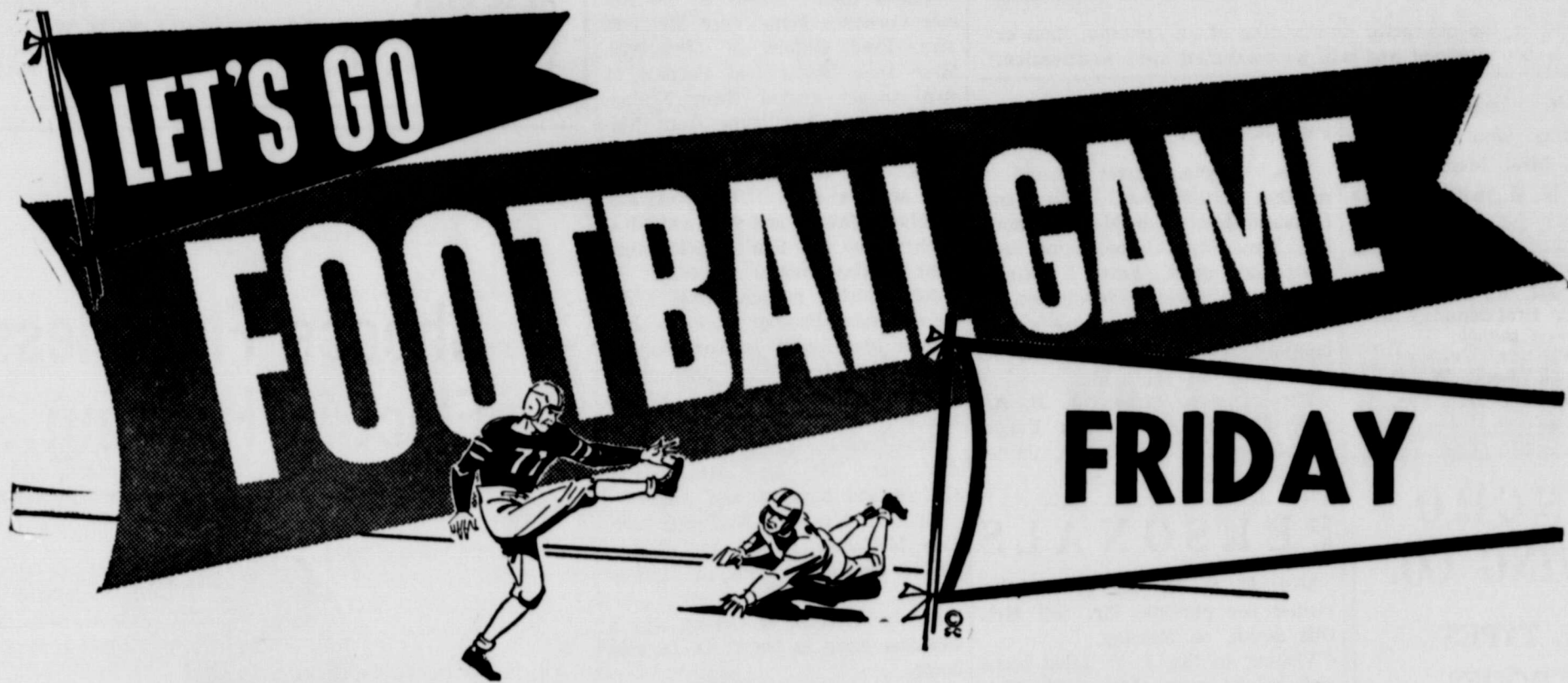

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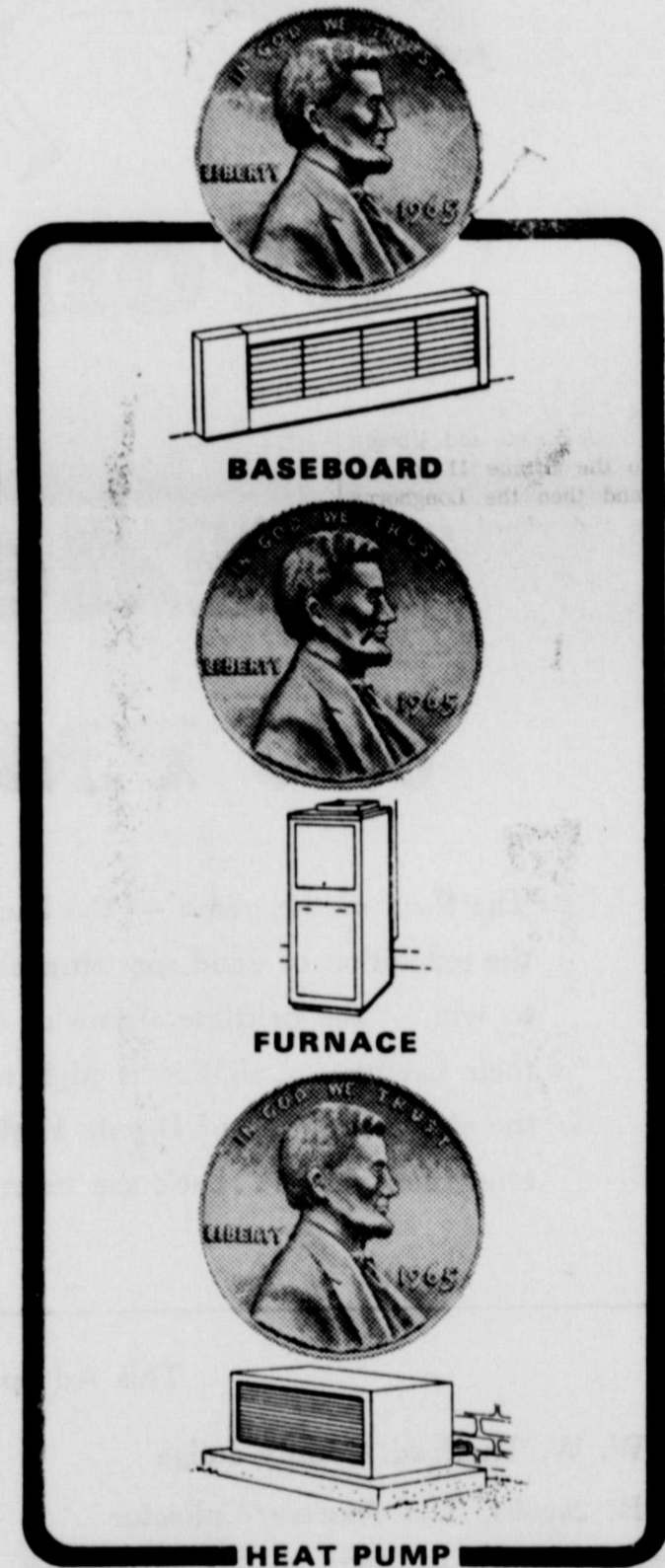
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Bronte Loses Opener To Ozona Lions, 23-0

The Ozona Lions roared last Friday night to a 23-0 victory over the Bronte Longhorns. The line looked good on defense, but had some problems in opening up holes in the Lion forward wall through which Longhorn backs could pass.

A few bad breaks for the Longhorns were used to advantage by the Ozona team to change the appearance of the scoreboard, but actually the local team played better football than the score indicated.

First Quarter

Doug McCutchen took the kickoff and was downed on the 32. After Royce Lee picked up 5 on two plays, David Glenn tossed a pass to Tad Richards for 10 yards and a 1st on the 43. In the next series, Humberto Ramos intercepted a Bronte pass and Ozona took possession of the ball on the Bronte 48. Ozona had to punt and after three tries Bronte had to do the same, but the Longhorn kick was blocked, setting the Lions up on the 5 yard line. After losing a yard on two plays, Quarterback Carson tossed a short pass for a TD and Ramos' conversion kick was good. 7-0 was the score.

The Longhorns had to punt after receiving the kickoff, but once again Lee was swarmed before he could get off a good kick. The ball went straight up and the Lions took over on the Bronte 36. Two plays later the quarter ended with the Lions pushed back to the 40.

Second Quarter

A pass to Dehoyos was good but left the Lions short. They lined up in punt formation, but Cox ran with the ball and carried it down to the 21 for a 1st. Cox and Upham moved it to the Bronte 11 for another 1st, and then the Longhorns tightened up and refused to let the Lions make the yards needed. Bronte took over near the goal line, but were unable to make many yards. A punt went straightup, going back behind the goal line to give the Lions a safety and make the score 9-0.

Bronte got a free kick and a Lion touched the ball, with Bronte recovering on their own 44. 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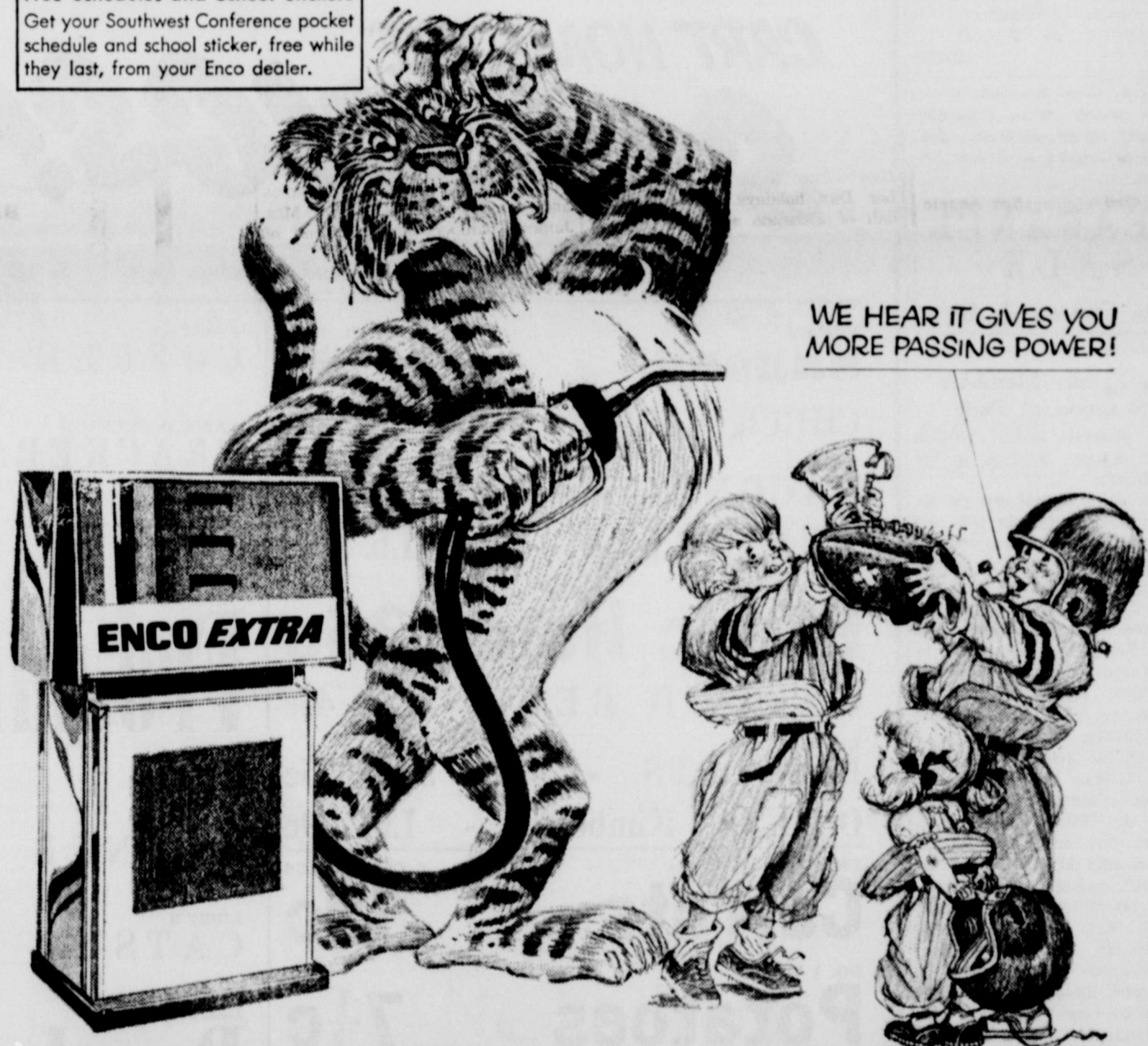
