to the governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, comptroller of public accounts, treasurer, commissioner of the general land office, secretary of state, state legislators, and ANY statutory state officer, unless a term of office is specifically provided in the consti-

In other words, an official who is not doing his job to the satisfaction of his constituents could not be removed for four years instead of the present two.

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

TO BUILD BIG ROBERT LEE DAM

(From Robert Lee Observer)

O. H. Ivie, general manager of the Colorado River Municipal Water District, was guest speaker at Tuesday's BCD meeting. He told the 23 members and 11 other guests present about plans of his organization to build the big dam on the Colorado River near here.

He gave a lot of statistics on the size of the structure and spillway, and emphasized that employees of CRMWD want to be a part of this community as they work on the project during the next few years, and operate it for many years to

An accompanying story by Joe Pickle, editor of the Big Spring Herald and secretary of CRMWD, tells some of the information related by Ivie concerning progress and plans.

In pointing out the immensity of the dam and reservoir, Ivie said that the Robert Lee Lake will be the largest west of Possum Kingdom to California. It will contain 489,000 acre feet of storage capacity, which can supply 47 million gallons of water a day, and maintain a two year emergency supply. The lake will have an average depth of 33 feet and at base of the dam will be 108 feet deep. Anyone who wishes to walk around the lake Brian Richards, Eddie Clark, Bell, will have to travel 135 miles. Wa-Don Hageman, Manfred Thompson, ter will be backed up the river Keith Morris, Gary Stroebel, Wayne 18 miles, and the widest spot will be 19,000 feet.

The dam itself will be 136 feet by Lee, T. Richards, McCutchen, high and 21,100 feet long. The spill-

which will funnel into a tunnel 20 feet in diameter.

Ivie said the construction job here at Robert Lee will cost approximately \$14.1 million. Additional expense of tying the lake into pipelines will move the total cost up to about \$30 million.

Ivie said the water district has employed disinterested appraisers to acquire land rights needed for the lake. He said, "We want to be sure that land owners involved get a fair deal." He said negotiatins with the State Highway Department for moving the Robert Lee-Sterling City highway, eight miles of which will be inundated, are scheduled for next week. He also mentioned that arrangements will have to be made with oil companies to take care of 32 oil wells which are located in the lake basin.

Core drilling on the northwest flank of the dam site will be completed within another 10 days or two weeks, O. H. Ivie, CRMWD general manager, estimated. Findings so far have indicated no foundation problems.

Surveying crews, running lines at the damsite and around the perimeter of the lake basin at flood mark, are about 30 per cent through with their work, he said.

As these reports become available, information will be turned over to George Thompson of Sweetwater and Clyde Berry of Clyde for land appraisals. When these are reported to the district, negotiations for land purchases will be-

Colorado State University at Fort Collins is well along on its scale model of the giant spillway for the lake, and within two months data from tests is due to begin flowing to the engineers, Freese, Nichols and Endress of Fort Worth.

District officials are giving preliminary studies to immediate pipeline requirements, and at the same time they are checking costs of financing the project.

Previously, Ivie had estimated

that it would be spring before bids for revenue bonds to finance the job could be received. He also thought June was the probable earliest date for letting the construction contract. By that time, however the district hones to have most of the land purchased and arrangements made for relocating about eight miles of the Robert Lee-Sterling City state highway, which will be inundated.

one which would give legislators four year terms, is also repugnant to our form of government, by the people. Passage of this constitutional change would give Texas legislators a term twice as long as U. S. congressmen now have. Do you think our state legislators are so well qualified that they should not be called to an accounting at the polls more than once every four years?

Texas voters have usually been kind to officials who are doing a good responsible job. Two years ago Governor Connally won a second term hands down over three opponents with hardly any campaign at all; Lt. Gov. Preston Smith had only token opposition in his race for a second term; Attorney General Waggoner Carr was unopposed. John C. White, commissioner of agriculture, and Jerry Sadler, commissioner of the general land office, were the only other state officials who had opponents. Both won handily. The only hotly contested race where a great deal of effort and money were expended two years ago was for U. S. senator, which already carries a six year term.

Longer terms for public officials inevitably can lead in only one direction: toward lack of responsible representation, toward indifference to public opinion and public wishes, toward a lackadaisical attitude of staying on the job, and toward a feeling that the job belongs to the official rather than the people.

We urge you to vote against 4 and 10 next Tuesday.

The other eight proposed amendments have some definite merit and deserve support.
