### NEW FARM PROGRAMS TO BE DISCUSSED

New provisions of the cotton, wheat, feed grain and the Cropland Adjustment Program will be discussed in two meetings to be held in the county this week.

The first meeting will be today (Thursday) at Robert Lee at 7:30 p.m. in the Courthouse. The next will be in Bronte Friday at 7:30 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building. Question and answer sessions will be held and led by the County ASCS committee and staff.

The Crop Adjustment Program is similar to the Soil Bank program and is designed to remove acreage from the production of surplus crops for periods of five to ten years. The sign-up period for this program is from Jan. 24-May 30. Sign-up for wheat, feed grain, and cotton program will be from Jan. 24 until April 1. Jan. 17 is the final date to file an application for a New Grower Cotton Allotment.

These and other new provisions will be discussed in full at the local meetings. All farm and ranch operators are urged to attend one of the sessions.
