### POLL TAXES COMING IN; 557 HAVE PAID

A total of 557 poll tax receipts had been issued Tuesday morning by Tax Assessor-Collector O. B. Jacobs' office. This number is well above the 333 which had been issued by the same date last year. However, it is below the 694 which had been issued by Jan. 15, 1964, the last major election year.

Jacobs said he expects a rush of Coke County residents to pay the poll tax between now and Jan. 31, which is the last day for paying.

Jan. 31 is also the deadline for paying state and county, city and school taxes without having a penalty added.

A deputy from Jacobs' office was in Bronte Wednesday and will be here again Thursday and Friday for convenience of residents on the east side of the county. The deputy will be at First National Bank to issue poll tax receipts.

Poll taxes may be paid at the tax assessor's office in the courthouse any time during regular office hours until the deadline.

## HD Agent's News Dept.

By FAY C. ROE

Older citizens need to eat well-balanced meals just as much as do youngsters. But too often they neglect to do it.

A problem that often makes cooking seem dull is using the leftovers that tend to accumulate in cooking for only one or two people. One can cut this problem down to size by using the leftovers imaginatively, instead of just serving them the same way over and over.

Home Economists with the U.S. Department of Agriculture and Extension home economists offer these tips:

1. Combine leftovers in a one-dish meal. Meat combines beautifully with vegetables, macaroni or rice. Add a cheese or tomato sauce or just plain white sauce and heat in a baking dish. Get extra flavor by adding chopped tomatoes or green onions or chives.

2. Top a tossed salad with cut strips of leftover cooked meat or poultry.

3. Mix leftover cooked vegetables with raw fresh ones, such as chopped celery, cucumber slices, tomatoes, green pepper, shredded cabbage.

4. Cream vegetables, meat, fish or chicken. Or serve them with a tasty sauce. Use a can of tomato or mushroom soup for quick and easy sauce. If the dish is a bit skimpy, a hard cooked egg may stretch it to serving size.

5. Add a bit of relish, snappy cheese or diced cucumber to a cooked dressing for meat or vegetable salad.

### A New Shrub for Your Garden

Now is the time to start planning your spring and summer garden. The autumn olive is a shrub that blooms in spring and summer and bears beautiful red berries in the fall and winter.

It is a graceful shrub with sweet scented, yellow trumpet-shaped flowers. It bears a bountiful supply of red berries which attract and feed all kinds of birds.

On a city lot, the autumn olive is best used as a single plant because it grows 4 to 8 feet tall in 3 to 5 years. Under favorable conditions it bears berries in the same time.

The USDA has developed a new variety called the "Cardinal." It is characterized by its hardiness and fruit bearing. This variety thrives on moderately well drained soil and survives on very dry soils.

### Cold Water Laundering Facts

What happens to the bacteria count when homemakers launder with cold water detergents?

Many inquiries have been received along this line, and to answer these inquiries the U. S. Department of Agriculture began new tests with actual family washes.

This was done as part of long range research on survival of bacteria in home laundering, using both hot and cold water. Earlier studies indicated that large numbers of bacteria survive laundering with both hot and cold water.

In recent tests with cold water detergent, comparisons were made with and without disinfectants. The same concentration of disinfectants were used with cold water which proved effective with hot water.

With no disinfectant, far more bacteria survived in cold water than in hot water washes. When

scientists added the appropriate amount of chlorine in the wash cycle, or quaternary disinfectants in the rinse, bacteria count was cut to 40 or less per square inch of fabrics at the end of the spin-dry cycle — regardless of the water temperature.

When laundry was washed in cold water with a cold water detergent, on the other hand, the addition of phenolic or pine oil disinfectants in the wash cycle was relatively ineffective in reducing the bacteria level.

Water temperatures ranged from 57 to 64 degrees F. during cold water laundering and 122 to 140 degrees F. during hot water laundering.

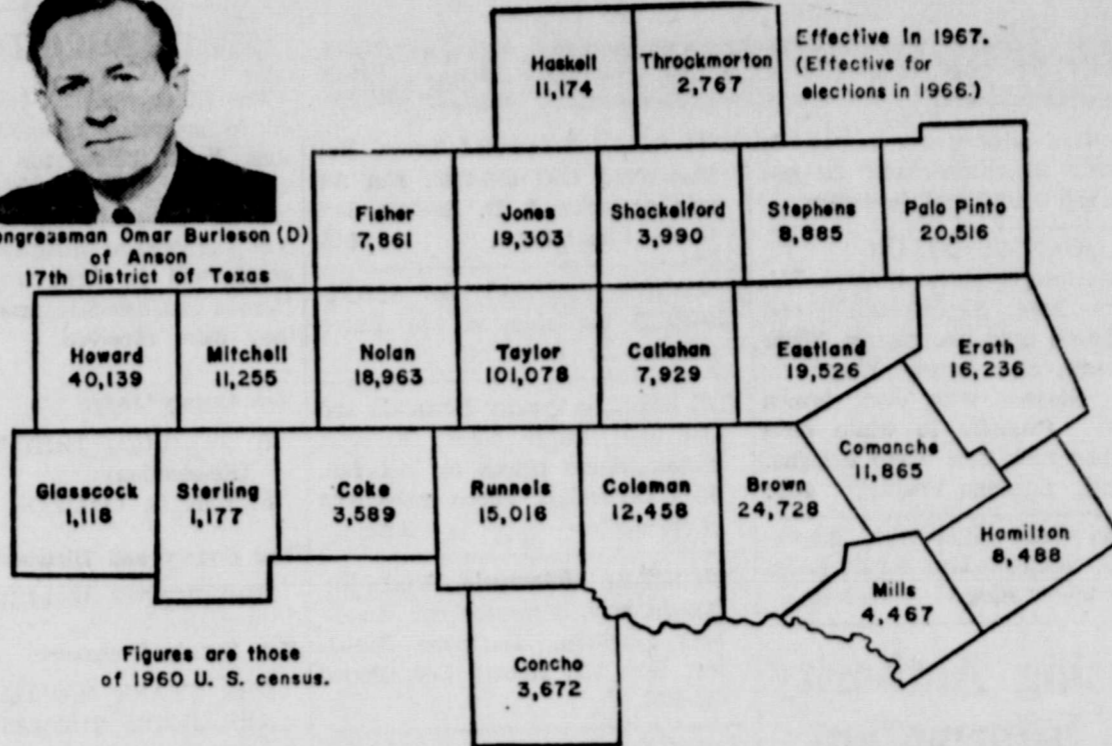

Approval of this contract puts \$3,600 at the disposal of the local authority for use in preliminary work in getting the Bronte Housing project underway.

Fancher said that all the persons with whom he talked in Fort Worth led him to believe that the housing project will not be a "hurry up" job. "There are lots of rules and regulations which must be followed," he said, "and it will take time to get everything worked out so we can actually start building."

Lee R. Buttrill, a regional project planner from the Fort Worth office, was in Bronte Tuesday. He reviewed the project with local members, inspected prospective sites and made notations from which he will make his report and recommendations.
