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## County Requested to Take Over Hospital Ownership

Plans were made Wednesday night at a meeting of the members of the Plains Memorial Hospital Association, in the Dimmitt high school auditorium, for the conversion of the hospital to a county owned and operated institution.

Approximately sixty members of the hospital association were present and voted by an overwhelming majority to petition the Commissioners Court to call an election for the purpose of voting a bond issue sufficient to pay off all indebtedness of the hospital, and by so doing assume its ownership and management.

Thomas F. Bice, president of the board of directors of the hospital association, presided at the meeting and as spokesman for

mount obstacles the task of securing doctors who are willing to work for a set salary, a practice that is frowned on by the various medical associations. He pointed out further that it was the opinion of the directors that the only conceivable method of continuing the operation of the hospital was as a county owned and managed institution.

Following considerable discussion the membership concurred in the expressed opinion of the board, and passed a resolution authorizing the directors to take the necessary steps to put the proposition before the voters of the county through a petition for an election to the commissioners court.

According to an estimate by Owen Cox, business manager, a bond issue of approximately \$70,000 will be required to pay off all indebtedness of the hospital.

## Time Is Short for Mailing Overseas Gifts to Soldiers

Postmaster Tom F. Bice warned this week that time is running out for the mailing of Christmas packages to soldiers serving overseas. Latest date for shipping packages is November 15. Packages may be sent by airmail not later than November 25.

Packages for mailing must be securely wrapped and tied, and cannot be over 100 inches in length or weigh over 70 pounds. Packages sent by air mail cannot be over 30 inches in length or weigh over 2 pounds.

Among items permissible for shipping to soldiers in Korea are food, sausage, canned items, non-perishable goods, cameras, extra films, snapshots, long letters, reading material, subscriptions to magazines and home town papers, pocket books, etc.

The 24x28 frame structure will consist of 4 rooms and a bath. Its first occupants will be Mrs. M. D. Nixon, pastor of the church, and her father, Mr. G. H. James.

The Assembly of God pastors of the district are donating the labor for the construction of the parsonage which is to be completed by December 1.

## 10 Castro County Gilts are CROP Gift to South A.

Castro County will have an interest in the swine industry in San Salvador, South America, when 10 gilts from the county are distributed to breeders in that country through the efforts of the Christian Rural Overseas Program.

The 10 gilts were taken to Lubbock by county agricultural agent Edd C. McLeroy and Frank Huseman of Nazareth. The 10 Castro County gilts with 190 head of other swine will be flown to South America Monday, November 17.

Missionaries, representing CROP and other church workers, will supervise the distribution of the animals in the area.

This is a good gesture by Plains people and it is felt by many that it is one of the most worthwhile projects to be carried out by CROP.

**IT'S THE LAW**  
in Texas  
A public service feature of the State Bar of Texas

When involved as a party to litigation everyone wants, and is entitled to, a jury of 12 disinterested and completely impartial persons—men who will try the case fairly on the law as stated by the judge, and on the evidence admitted at the trial. This kind of jury is what lawyers and judges are trying to secure when they orally examine members of a jury panel.

To be questioned and challenged by a lawyer and excused by the judge is not a reflection upon the prospective juror's integrity or intelligence. It simply means that, in one particular case, the judge may deem it proper to excuse that person.

There are many reasons why a person originally called for a jury panel might not be a fair and impartial juror. He may be closely related to one of the litigants, have a business relationship with one of the lawyers, or have personal knowledge of the case to be tried. He may show some leaning, one way or another, regarding the type of case being tried that would make it difficult for him to render a strictly impartial verdict.

Even where there is no condition producing a conscious or readily apparent bias, a lawyer may ask that a panel member be excused under the preemptory challenge allowed his client. He usually does this because he feels there is something in that person's background which might unconsciously sway his judgment, even while honestly attempting to be absolutely fair. Many apparently irrelevant questions may be asked by an attorney in reaching a decision regarding this unconscious factor.

Under the law each juror must be a citizen of Texas and of the county in which he is to serve. He must be qualified to vote in such county, except that he need not have paid his poll tax. He must own land within the State or he must be the head of the household within the county. He must be of sound mind and good moral character and able to read and write the English language.

A juror is not qualified for service if he has served as a juror within a certain specified length of time. No one who has

been convicted of a felony is qualified to serve as a juror; nor is an individual who is under indictment or other legal accusation of theft or of any felony.

The statutes of Texas exempt certain persons from the obligation of serving as jurors. Persons over sixty years of age, civil officers of the State or the United States, ministers, physicians, attorneys, publishers of newspapers, school masters, druggists, undertakers, telegraph operators, railroad station agents, ferrymen, millers engaged in grist, flouring and saw mills, certain railroad officials, firemen and certain state forestry employees may claim exemption from jury duty. This exemption must be stated and claimed under oath.

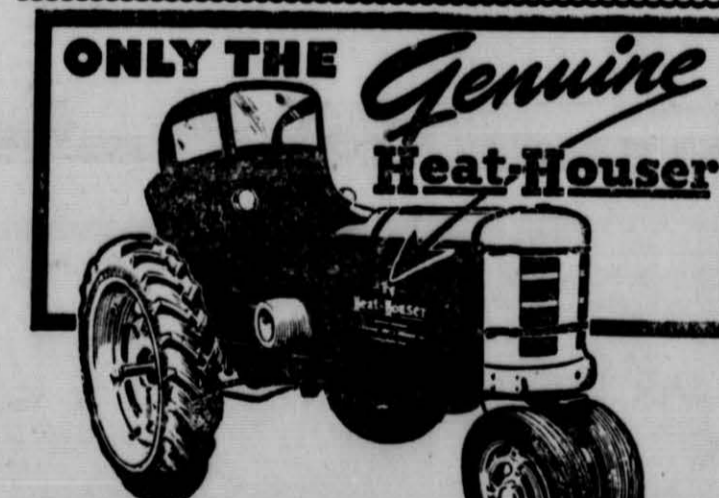

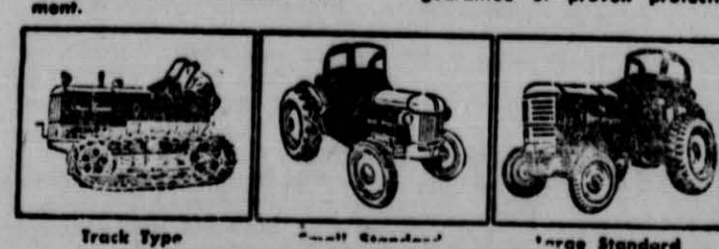

WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

By Congressman Walter Rogers

WASHINGTON AFTER THE ELECTION: The Capital City, as is usual after all presidential elections, reflects a mixed feeling of elation and gloom. This would appear rather odd to many, as it is commonly believed in many quarters that when one administration is turned out and a new one is coming in, the entire picture in the capital should be all gloom. The reason for such belief is the common view that most federal employees depend upon the administration for their jobs and are therefore jeopardized by a change of administration. However, this is not the case. The truth is that there is only a very small percentage of job holders who will be affected by the change. These are the top administrative jobs and number less than 2,000. All of the other federal employees are under civil service and are not subject to dismissal from their jobs for political reasons. Many people have thought that all federal employees were more or less affiliated with whichever political party might be in power and that the party in power could always count on a large bloc of votes from this source. However, this is also not the case. The fact is that a majority of the federal employees in and around Washington usually vote against the administration in power. This has been proven many times in presidential elections since the civil service system was established. It was conclusively proved in this presidential election. Eisenhower carried all of the sections around Washington where the federal workers live and vote. This included many precincts in Maryland and Virginia. The vote received by Eisenhower in the sections of Virginia most heavily populated by federal employees gave him a larger majority than other sections of the same state. The same is true in Maryland. The residents who live inside of the District of Columbia are not allowed to vote. However, they are in politics as much as, or more so, than in other cities of like size. It was very evident inside of the District of Columbia that had the people here been allowed to vote, Eisenhower would have carried two large sections of the District where most of the federal workers are housed. It is also well to point out that there does not appear to be any feeling of ill will among the people in the District of Columbia, whether they are federal employees or individual business people.

In fact, everyone seems to be in the attitude that the political battle is over, that it is the duty and desire of every citizen to cooperate to the fullest extent, regardless of political affiliations, to an early solution of the many tremendous problems that are faced. This attitude is something that America can be proud of. There is no other place in the world where the people can enjoy such traits of good sportsmanship and honest devotion to country. It is the reason that America has become a country great and will always remain great. It is the reason that our country has become a symbol of freedom to oppressed peoples all over the world. It is one of the many reasons why people all over the world want to leave their native lands and come to America to start a new life. In no other country of the world can freedom loving people find the hope of a new and free life that is offered by America. I have just returned from making a radio statement that will be beamed to countries behind the Iron Curtain. The statement concerned Adolph Sabeth, of Illinois, whose recent death was mourned by the whole nation and free people everywhere. Congressman Sabeth came to the United States as a Czech immigrant at the age of 15 years. When he landed in Baltimore he had \$1.36 in his pocket, but he was well armed with courage, ambition, intelligence and faith. In his first job he received \$3.00 per week, and from that time, a longer record of service than any other person in the history of the United States. The great success story of this Czech immigrant is a typical success story in America. Let us all hope that his life will be the guiding light to those of his native land and other countries now encircled behind the Iron Curtain, and to whom opportunity has been obliterated by communist oppression. The story of Adolph Sabeth could well furnish the strength to these people that will enable them to cast off the yoke of totalitarian enslavement and build in their countries the kind of government that would afford to their children the freedom and the opportunity that we in America cherish.

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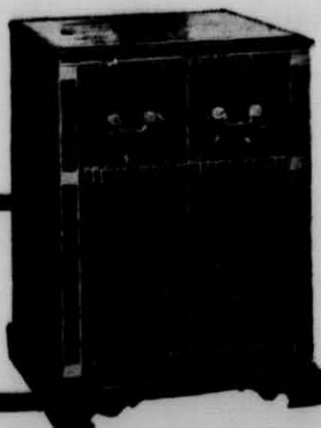
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
