Funeral services for Jett Madera, 85, were held Wednesday at 2:30 p.m. in First Methodist Church. The Rev. A. S. Masterson, pastor, and the Rev. Wayne N. Stout, pastor of Central Baptist Church, officiated.

Burial was in Fort Chadbourne cemetery under direction of Williams Funeral Home of Bronte and Allen Davis Funeral Home of Balinger. Nephews were pall bearers.

Mr. Madera died at 9:40 a.m. Tuesday at his home north of Bronte after a long illness.

He was born Sept. 14, 1880 in Searcy, Ark., and was married to Winnie Clift Aug. 14, 1907 at Fort Chadbourne. The lived in Corpus Christi 40 years where he was in the real estate business. He was also connected with Swift & Co. a number of years and was census enumerator for Corpus Christi Independent School district until his retirement. They moved to Bronte nine years ago. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church.

Survivors include his wife; one brother, E. A. Madera of Plainview; two sisters, Mrs. J. A. Beasley of Lubbock and Mrs. W. P. Holleyman of Fort Worth; and several nephews and nieces.

Ten Candidates Filed In School Board Race

One of the most hotly contested school trustee elections in recent years is in prospect April 2 for voters of Bronte Independent School District. An even 10 candidates have filed, or had their names filed by petition for the three places which become vacant this year.

Nine candidates had announced at press time last week. After that

report was printed, the name of Dale Thompson was filed in the office of County Judge W. W. Thetford, to make the round number.

The list of candidates now includes Horace Taylor, James Wells, Marvin Landers, G. L. Latimer, M. D. (Dolan) Mackey, Eddie G. Collins, Joe Rawlings, Charles C. (Clyde) Lee, Bill G. Thomas and Dale Thompson.

Two balloting places will be set up on April 2, one at Bronte City Hall and one at Green's Store in Tennyson. Mrs. Otis Smith will be judge for the Bronte box and Mrs. W. T. Green, judge for the Tennyson box.

Trustees whose terms do not expire this year include Conda O. Richards, J. B. Morrow, A. E. Bell Jr. and Wayne Arrott.

BRONTE BAND WINS 1ST PLACE IN MARCHING

The Bronte Longhorn Band came home with a first place trophy from the Sweetwater festival Saturday. The band participated in the festival and were graded 1st place in the marching contest.

Band Director Russell Fuller said this trophy is the one they wanted to pick up earlier in the season when they participated in a contest at Midland. Fuller said he is well pleased with the progress made by the band during this year. "We still have a long way to go," he said, "but then we've come a long way, too."

Fuller said other competition is planned for the band during the next couple of months, in connection with Interscholastic League events.

Contract Awarded For Seven Miles City, Area Paving

A contract was awarded to E. W. Wilson to pave approximately seven miles of streets and roads in Bronte and the nearby area. Wilson lives in San Angelo and submitted a low bid of \$13,024.79, according to information released by Commissioner Howard Brock. Three other bids were received before the reading last Monday.

Included in the paving are the loop southwest of Bronte and around the Humble campsite; all the streets across the creek in southwest Bronte; the street recently opened south of the road to the park; and a few other unpaved blocks in the city. Some seal coating on East and West Railroad Streets was also included in the contract.

Brock and his county road crew already have the caliche base laid for the new paving. Brock said he plans some other small paving jobs in the near future, which are not included in the contract.

Bids were received from N. H. and A. P. Corp. of Wichita Falls, \$14,700; Price Construction Co. of Snyder, \$14,550; Reece Albert of San Angelo, \$13,893.75.

Snook Took Bronte

The Bronte Longhorn 1966 basketball team, the first local team ever to compete in a state tournament, wound up their season last Thursday morning in Gregory Gym in Austin where they were defeated 55-40 by the state champion Snook Bluejays.

The Longhorns got off to a whirlwind start and led the three-times-in-a-row state champs during the opening minutes of the game. Things were looking good for the Bronte lads when they had the Bluejays twittering about the Longhorn 10-6 lead. The Snook quintet caught up, however, before the end of the quarter. Then came the devastating second period when the

Longhorns got behind so much they could never catch up with their adversaries.

The second half was a well matched contest. The Bluejays managed to net one more point than did the Longhorns.

Royce Lee threw the ball through the basket for 15 points and Tad Richards was right behind him with 14. Larry Corley made 5, Davis Corley had 4 and Doug McCutchen had 2.

The Longhorns did a remarkable job in defending Snook's star point maker, Calvin Gerke. They held him to 19 points, which is an excellent showing, considering that he made 35 against second place Chan-

ning in the finals. Other Bluejay scorers were Ervin See, Tommy Junek and Milton Skrabanek, all with 10, and Larry Kovar with 6.

After they retired the Longhorns, Snook went on to defeat Alba-Golden 52-46, in the second round. Coach James Raughton said this was probably the best game of the tournament, as it went into overtime. Snook's next victim was second place Channing, whose team got stomped 64-40 by the Bluejays. Channing had previously defeated Deweyville, 74-53.

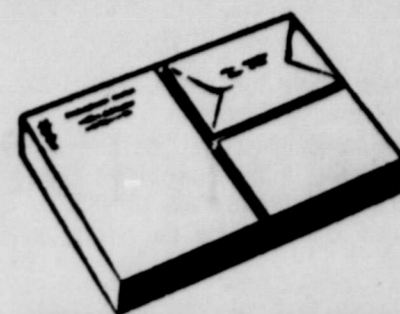

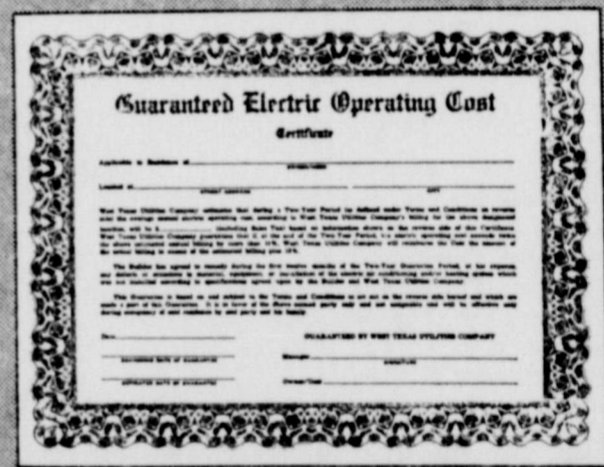

First Aid For Silk Fabrics

Here's how to apply first aid to your silk garments.

It's wise to check the fabric label and follow the care directions. If no dry cleaning care instructions are provided, and you are in doubt, have the garment drycleaned.

Problems occur with many silks when they are stained or spotted with water soluble substances. Food and perspiration are common examples of this type of stain.

When water and detergent are applied to the stained area, the dye in silk often bleeds. This is particularly noticeable in silk fabrics made with different colored yarns. The dye from the darker yarn will bleed onto the lighter yarn and create a noticeable and permanent stain.

Often a professional spotter can successfully remove stains from silk, says the Institute of Drycleaning, but he's no magician. Even if the dyes are fast, it's often hard to remove all traces of the stain.

The best solution is to take the stained garment to a profession dry-cleaner as soon as possible, and tell him what the stain is.

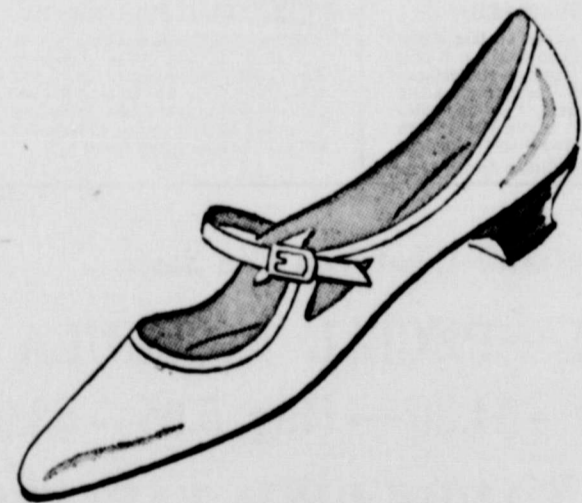

Coke County Audit Printed This Issue

Annual audit of county books has been made by Auditor Weldon Fikes and a summary of the findings is being published in this week's paper. This audit is being published in order for Coke County citizens to acquaint themselves with the county financial situation.

The commissioners court ordered its publication and members stated they would like for every citizen, particularly taxpayers, to spend a little time going over the accounts.

Briefly, the report reveals that the county, on Dec. 31, 1965, had a total balance of \$213,137.15 in all its operating funds. Interest and sinking funds carried a balance of \$189,967.31 on that date, to make the total balance at the beginning of this year amount to \$403,104.46.

The second part of the audit shows bonded and warranted indebtedness of the county. Bond issues on which the county and precincts are now paying totaled \$1,167,000.00 when issued. Of this amount, \$859,000.00 has been retired, leaving a balance owed on bonds of \$308,000.00.

A list of securities owned by the county and precincts shows a net worth of \$79,000.00.
